## McLEAN CITY TAX RATE TO REMAIN \$1.25

Commission Will Meet July 27 As Equalization Board

The McLean city commission Tuesday night gave its approval to a tax rate of \$1.25 for the fiscal year beginning on Oct. 1.

An ordinance setting the amount of taxes at the same as in previous years was read for the first time at Tuesday's meeting by City Attorney Don Lane.

Another reading is required before final approval of the ordinance.

The rate means residents of the city will pay \$1.25 per \$100 valuation on their property.

**To Move Telephone**  
Aldermen set 2 p.m. Friday, July 27, as the date they will meet as the city equalization board. A study of valuations will be held at that time.

The commission approved the moving of the emergency telephone from its present location near the McLean Cafe one block west to a utility pole near the American National Bank.

The action was taken when it was learned that the ringing of the phone often disturbs persons living in apartments above the cafe building.

Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor of the McLean Methodist Church, said the invocation to open Tuesday's meeting.

## Robert Gale Barker Newest Member Of Boys Ranch Family

**BOYS RANCH**—(Special)—Robert Gale Barker, a former McLean boy, is the newest member of the rapidly growing family of nearly 300 boys at Cal Farley's nationally-known Boys Ranch near Amarillo. Gale arrived at the ranch recently where he was welcomed by his dormitory parents, a young couple with children of their own who provide as near normal a family-life as possible for the 35 boys of different ages who live with them.

Their home is a large Colorado stone ranch house, one of the several homes for boys that have been donated to the ranch, replacing the old-style Army barracks that were used for many years.

**Founded 23 Years Ago**  
Also welcoming Gale was Cal Farley, who founded the ranch 23 years ago for homeless and delinquent boys. At the present time 38 states are represented by the boys at the ranch, whose ages range from 4 to 17.

The boys leave the ranch when they graduate from high school or receive a vocational training certificate. Fourteen trades are available to the older boys of the ranch, in addition to their classes in the fully-accredited Boys Ranch School.

"Gale is a fine young man and I'm happy we are able to give him the help he needs," Farley said. "He is the kind of boy we had in mind in starting the ranch and he will someday be returning as the kind of citizen the people of Texas and McLean can be proud of."

## Citizen Hospitalized After Heart Attack

C. H. (Hack) McCurley suffered a heart attack Wednesday afternoon, and was admitted later in the day to Highland General Hospital in Pampa.

McCurley, long-time resident of McLean, has had heart trouble previously.

He was reported showing some improvement today, but his condition was still described as serious.

The seizure occurred at about 4:30 p. m. Wednesday when McCurley was working alone on his farm southeast of the city.

He started driving toward McLean alone, but met his son, Charles, who brought him on to the McLean Clinic.

After receiving treatment here, he was taken by ambulance to Highland General about 6:30 p. m.

## COUNTY HOLDS 2 SUSPECTS

Gray County authorities continue to hold two men arrested in McLean Tuesday of last week and charged with an armed robbery in Pampa.

Taken into custody here little more than an hour after the Pampa supermarket had been robbed, were Haskell Lee Raymond, 22, of Wichita, Kan., and Boswell, Oida., and Russell Lewis Watters, 31, of Portland, Ore., and Albuquerque, N. M.

They have been booked on the charge of robbery by firearms, and officers are checking to learn the criminal records of the two and where they are wanted elsewhere at this time.

Raymond and Watters were arrested in McLean, after Contable J. D. Fish spotted them in a car answering the description given by the supermarket.

**Roadblocks Set Up**  
Fish had been stationed at a roadblock at the intersection of Highway 273 and 66 at McLean's west end. Deputy Sheriff Jimmie Shelton also had set up a roadblock in Alameda, and other county officers were waiting at various intersections surrounding Pampa.

After sighting the car, Fish radioed Highway Patrolmen R. C. Parker and Charles Henderson, both of McLean, and Bill Lusk of Shamrock, who were operating radar east of the city.

At the time, Fish had planned to permit the two suspects to continue on to the radar check point before stopping them.

But it was necessary to arrest them sooner, when the two stopped on Highway 66 in McLean to pick up two hitchhikers.

Fish again radioed the patrolmen, Shelton and other officers in the area to inform them that he would have to take the two into custody to prevent the hitchhikers from entering the car.

Parker and Lusk rushed to McLean immediately, and the officers then arrested Raymond and Watters and took them to the justice of the peace office.

The lawmen found a pistol, ammunition and the money while searching the car.

## Local Boy Undergoes Surgery For Injury

Larry Boyd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Boyd, suffered a skull fracture Tuesday night when he was hit in the head by a ball during a Little League baseball game at the local park.

Larry, who will enter the third grade this fall, was scheduled to undergo surgery at 11 a. m. today in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo.

The youngster was taking his turn at bat when the ball struck him over the left eye.

He was treated at the McLean Clinic and then transferred to St. Anthony's for surgery.

The lieutenant received his bachelor of science degree from Texas Technological College, Lubbock.

Funeral services were held recently for John H. Harrel, father of Mrs. Frank Payne of McLean, in May, Okla. Interment was in the McClung Cemetery near May.

"Mr. Harrel died last Thursday. Born in Bloomington, Ind., on Sept. 22, 1875, he moved to Concordia, Kan., with his parents at the age of 9 years. He and his parents moved to Woodward County, Okla., in 1899, and to Ellis County, Okla., in 1901.

He was married in 1904 to Cressie B. Galamore. Eleven children were born to this union, three of whom are now deceased.

In addition to eight children, he is survived by two brothers, 30 grandchildren and 28 great grandchildren.

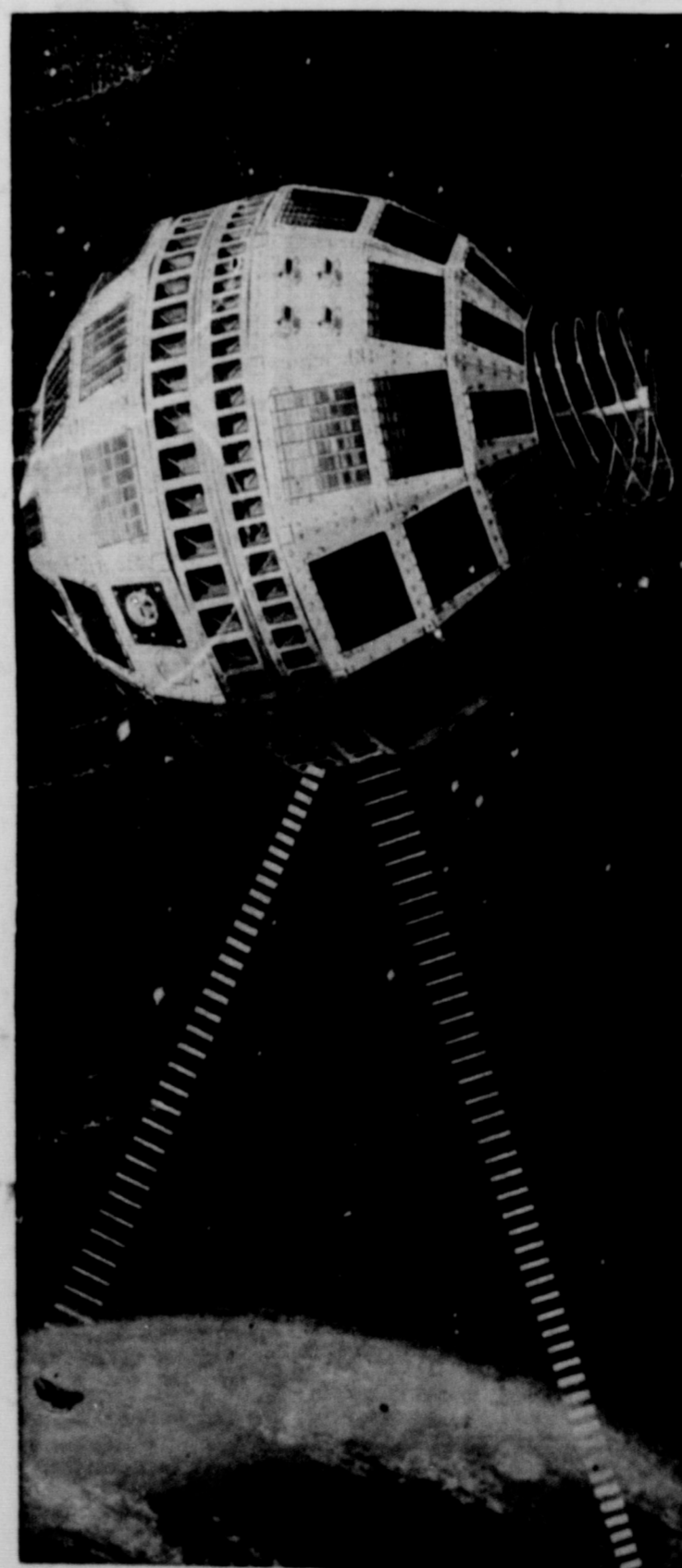

## New "TELSTAR" relays phone calls and TV pictures for first time!

Bell System microwave-in-sky satellite is latest communications triumph for America arising from telephone research

The world's first private enterprise communications satellite is now being used for dramatic experiments in relaying telephone calls and television internationally.

Its name: Telstar. It was launched from Cape Canaveral at Bell System expense by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

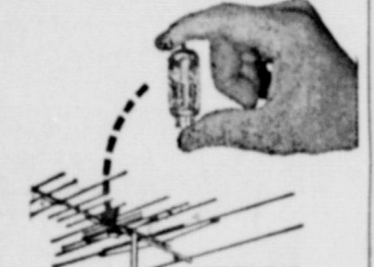

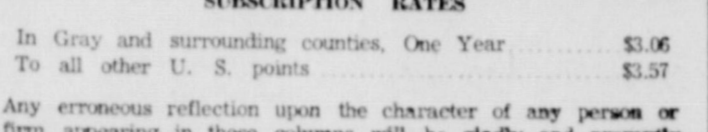

**NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT**  
 TEXAS A & M COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

**By FOSTER WHALEY**  
**NOXIOUS RANGE PLANTS**  
 A few weeks ago, I reported that O. R. Blankenship was having trouble with a weed invading his grassland place located west of McLean. I was unable to identify the plant but we sent it to Garlyn Hoffman, our range specialist at Texas A and M.

Recently I received a letter from Hoffman advising us the weed was White Daisy. Hoffman recommended spraying early in the season with 2, 4-D ester, using 1 lb in 15 to 25 gallons of water. However, he says it is rather late to be spraying to get effective control. Blank, guess you will have to get an early start next year.

I was very impressed with the generally clean mowed neat place that Blank has. Mowing and spraying your rangeland is a paying proposition. Most people have plenty of unused time on their hands to do these things, especially smaller ranchers and farmers. This is one way to increase that income which we all need. It is a way to more fully use your time profitably. Spraying is much better than mowing, in my opinion. If sprayed at the proper time you will kill the weeds too small for a mower to touch. You can actually spray hard to get to places including fence rows. There is also good evidence that 2, 4-D is also a stimulant to your grass. Try it sometime.

**BRUSH CONTROL**  
 A number of acres of brush were sprayed in the county this year. From time to time we have calls on how to control different types of noxious plants and brush. Recently we received a revised leaflet L-415 entitled Chemical Brush Control. It tells you how to control yucca, prickly pear and several other common noxious plants. In general, 2, 4, 5-T is the chemical. In most cases it is mixed with diesel.

**FROZEN FOODS**  
 We have had a few calls for an excellent publication our Extension Headquarters at A and M prints. It is called B-175 Frozen Foods. If you have a home freezer you will find this publication a must. It will tell you how to prepare everything for a freezer—fruits, vegetables and meats and

what have you. I noticed it even gives information on types of cartons that can be used. I'm leaving a few of these publications at Zero Lockers. If you want one free for the asking go by Zero Lockers and pick up one. Very few people can any more but we also have an excellent publication on canning called B-194—Home Canning. We will also leave a few of these with Carl.

**WHEAT REFERENDUM**  
 On July 24 wheat farmers will vote on whether we are to have wheat marketing quotas in 1963. Check with your ASC office for the issues. I'm sure you have or will receive information on this from the local ASC office.

**SCREW-WORMS**  
 The second screwworm case has been reported in the county. Boyd Meador sent in a sample to Mission in the mailing cartons which are provided. They were screw-worms. The incidence of screw-worms is down overwhelmingly from last season. Thanks to the screwworm program. Although it was started a little late to give 100 per cent control in 1962, we believe the knockout blow will come in 1963.

We still have a good supply of mailing cartons so be sure and pick up one at the McLean News office if you have a case.

**RAT POISON**  
 We have delivered another supply of rat poison to Smoky Price. Please report it if he gets any more than 25 cents per pound. This is what we charge him and we don't want him to make anything on it.
