RAINFALL IN JULY TOTALS THREE INCHES

Amount Declines From Last Year; August Comes Wet

Rainfall in McLean during the month of July was in a crop-boosting amount, although not quite so heavy as in many Panhandle areas.

Weather records maintained by city employees showed an even three inches of moisture dropped in McLean last month, failing to come close to the 5.27 inches in July of 1961.

The total for the year also is down somewhat. Through Wednesday afternoon, McLean had received 12.58 inches in 1962.

On the same date a year ago the amount was 16.28 inches.

Moisture has been recorded here each of the past five days, and there appeared a good chance of more to come, getting August off to a wet start.

.99 Inch Tuesday

Last Saturday started the wet period, with .05 inch falling; .15 followed on Sunday, .97 on Monday and .99 on Tuesday in two showers.

Actually, August arrived on a wet note, with rain beginning in a thunderstorm early Tuesday evening, continuing until after midnight and dumping .15 in the next month before stopping.

Much heavier rains were recorded in other Panhandle areas, and some hail was reported.

Flip Breedlove, Donley County agricultural agent, said during a visit to McLean Wednesday morning that almost four inches of rain fell in the Clarendon area.

Hail South of Town

Some hail was reported south of McLean, causing damage to young crops.

Hail also hit Pampa, and a blinding thunderstorm dumped 6.77 inches of rain on Borger Tuesday.

As expected, recent rains here have reduced the heavy use of water, which only a few days ago was reaching close to the delivery capacity.

Residents used only 222,000 gallons of water on Tuesday, the last day of July. The day of heaviest use this summer was July 14, when meters showed 803,000 flowed out of the city water mains.

Average for the month was 463,000 gallons per day.

Mr. Smith, who lived at 717 Grove Street, died at 6:55 a. m. Sunday in Highland General Hospital at Pampa.

Born in Alvarado on Feb. 14, 1905, Mr. Smith was married to Miss Gladys Holloway in Clarendon on May 12, 1926. They moved to McLean from Clarendon in 1929.

He was an oil and gas producer. Long active in civic affairs here, Mr. Smith was serving as alderman and mayor pro tem on the city commission at the time of his death.

He also was a member of the First Baptist Church and of the Lions Club and had been on the Gray County hospital board since early this year. In previous years

he served on the McLean board of education and was a past president of the board.

He was a 32nd degree Mason.

In ill health for sometime, he was admitted to Highland General Hospital early last month.

Surviving are his wife; Gladys; one son, Carey Don, stationed with the U.S. Army in Germany; a daughter, Mrs. Joyce Haynes McLean; one sister, Mrs. Frank Wade, Grand Junction, Colo., and five grandchildren.

Four brothers preceded him in death.

RABIES SHOTS TO BE GIVEN

Local and area dogs will be vaccinated against rabies in a special clinic scheduled here next Wednesday.

Dr. E. B. Range, Shamrock veterinarian, has accepted an invitation from the city commission to conduct the clinic, held each year at city hall.

Dogs should be brought to the city hall on leashes, Dr. Range said.

The cost for inoculating each animal will be \$2.50, a reduction from the regular \$3 fee charged by Dr. Range at his veterinary clinic in Shamrock.

The veterinarian said he also would bring vaccine to McLean for vaccinating dogs against leptospirosis and hepatitis. This vaccine will be given only on request.

Opens at 2 p. m.

The local clinic will open at 2 p. m., and Dr. Range said he would remain as long as necessary in order to inoculate all dogs brought to him.

Cases of rabies among skunks have been discovered at Almarred and Lela, and the city commission encouraged all residents owning dogs to have them inoculated Wednesday.

A tag and certificate will be furnished for each dog vaccinated during the day.

A long-acting modified live virus vaccine will be given to dogs here, Dr. Range said, because he believes this type gives the best protection.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas as to salaries for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time the per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have priority over the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST" the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Section 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid in reason of its anticipatory character.

Section 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums of such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

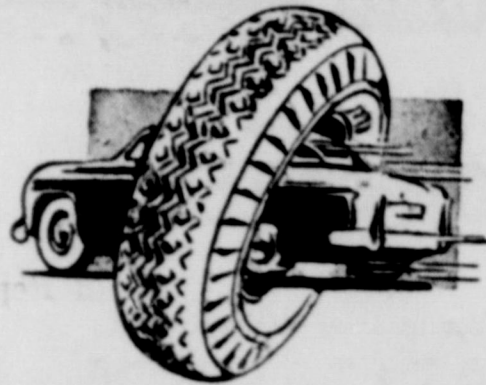

and for recreational purposes with plenty of fish in both lakes. This little project between Mr. Back and myself has proved to me that watershed programs are very useful projects.

The McClellan Creek watershed can be a nice asset to our county, in property improvements, as well as a great improvement in recreation.

I feel sure our government will not go wrong in its expenditures on this project even if the ratio of benefits to cost is \$1 against \$1.10.

I know it has spent money where the ratio was \$1 against "0." I feel sure that if we count the increase in land values and recreation, the ratio will run somewhere

in the neighborhood of \$2 against \$1.

Before a project like that proposed on the McClellan Creek watershed can be approved, it must be proved that benefits will at least equal the cost of constructing the dams and other necessary expenses.

So let's talk and pull for the program. I am sure it will raise the water level of the entire watershed—and bring benefits to everyone in this area.
