Just Between Us

We have never been more pleasantly surprised as we were with the turnout at Sunday's Sabin polio vaccine clinic in McLean.

Several of the workers wrote down estimates of the number of persons they believed would attend as the clinic got underway at noon Sunday.

Our guess, we hate to admit, was one of the lowest—713. Dr. Harold Fabian hit the grand total almost smack on the nose. His prediction: 1,200.

We hope that if you missed the first clinic, you'll make it a point to attend the second and third. Your age makes no difference. Even though you may feel you are above the age of being susceptible to polio, the vaccine should be taken anyway. You could be a carrier for polio.

Clyde Windom, one of the McLean Tigers' famed three W's of last year, is being prepared to lend his talents to Texas Tech. In a game between the Tech freshmen last week, Clyde did a terrific job on defense, handling linebacker chores. His speed and size are expected to be most useful for the Tech squad in years to come. Right now, Clyde is being trained as a center for offensive action.

The treatment of Maj. Gen Edwin A. Walker for his part in the University of Mississippi integration mess is going to be something quite difficult for the Kennedy administration to live down, it appears. More and more newspapers and citizens are joining in the outburst of criticism against the handling of the incident, even though Walker has now been released.

We should all be concerned over the way Gen. Walker has been made a virtual political prisoner, whether or not we agree with what he did.

Even the Washington Post, usually friendly to the administration and a consistent supporter of National Association for Advancement of Colored People projects, showed grave concern over the incident.

Then the Washington Star stated:

Despite the fact that Gen Walker's friends and relatives had raised the staggering \$100,000 bond set by the court to free him from prison at Springfield, Mo., "the United States attorney . . . says Gen. Walker will not become eligible for bail until after completion of a mental examination, which usually takes from 60 to 90 days. "All of this, of course, is being done over the vigorous protests of Gen. Walker's attorneys.

"But it is being done, nonetheless, and if the government can do this to Gen. Walker, it can do the same thing to any citizen."

The Post questioned the right of marshals and troops to search vehicles and individuals at Oxford, Miss., without a declaration of martial law.

It all boils down to this: In order to protect the rights of one person—James Meredith, the Negro who enrolled at Ole Miss—the constitutional rights of many persons have been violated.

Many are wondering—and rightly so, we believe—why our attorney general, Robert Kennedy, was so eager to enforce the Supreme Court ruling on integration, while showing no apparent effort to make the Communists abide by a law requiring them to register.

There's no interpretation of the Constitution involved in the Communist registration issue. It's plain and simple—the law says they (See JBU, Page 7)

Wheeler Here Friday; Queen to Be Named

McLean's Tigers swing back into action Friday night—and at an earlier time—when they face the Wheeler Mustangs.

The kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. for this, the final non-district game on the Bengals' schedule this season.

Highlighting Friday night's festivities will be the crowning of the football queen in ceremonies beginning at 7:15.

Three candidates have been se-

lected, with the queen to be chosen by the football players themselves. The queen's identity will be made known at the occasion, with the other two candidates to serve as attendants as the queen reigns over the game from her throne beside the field.

Candidates are Barbara Smith, a junior, and Jan Bailey and Linda Tindall, both sophomores.

Coach Derral Davis announced Wednesday that Jim McCarty will

see action Friday for the first time this season. McCarty suffered a leg injury in a pre-season scrimmage and has been sidelined ever since.

McCarty will be at right half-back.

Dickie Crockett, regular wing-back, is not expected to be in the lineup against Wheeler. Crockett sustained a dislocated finger in the Sept. 28 White Deer game, and his hand is in a cast.

Replacing Crockett will be Gary Graham.

David Seaney also will be unable to play, because of a blood clot in his right leg.

Starters at the other positions will be:

Johnny Fuller, right end; Ronnie Hunt, left tackle; Kenny Smith, left guard; Mike McCall, center; Mike Johnson, right guard; Bob Paton, right tackle; Eddy Windam, right end; Don Woods, quarter-

back, and John Evans, left half-back.

Davis said the Tigers have spent "lots of time" concentrating on blocking and tackling during the open-date breather.

"The boys look real good and are showing lots of improvement," the coach added.

He pointed out, however, that Wheeler has a larger and faster team than McLean, and showed fine form in defeating Esteline 38-0 last week.

TURNOUT IS HEAVY AT POLIO CLINIC

1,195 Immunized Against Disease In McLean Sunday

An unexpectedly large turnout of McLean and area residents resulted in a grand total of 1,195 Sabin polio vaccine inoculations being administered at the Type 1 clinic here last Sunday.

The clinic, sponsored by the McLean Lions Club, was described as a big success by Jim Hathaway, club president.

No make-up clinic is planned here at present for persons failing to receive their Sabin vaccine on Sunday.

While a large majority of the persons receiving the vaccine last Sunday were from McLean, there were several from other area towns and rural areas.

The next clinic will be held on Sunday, Nov. 18, and present plans call for the third type of Sabin vaccine to be administered here six weeks from that date.

More persons in the 15 to 39-year age group received the vaccine than any other group. According to record kept at the clinic, 393 persons in this group were given the vaccine.

360 Are 40 and Over
In the 40 and over age group, there were 360; 291 between the ages of 6 and 14 were immunized; 138 from 1 to 5 years old, and only 13 under 1 year of age.

Parson's Rexall Drug furnished the paper cups and Puckett's Food Market the sugar cubes for the clinic.

Dr. H. F. Fabian and Ted Raines, pharmacist at Parson's Drug, prepared the cubes.

Administering the vaccine were Mrs. C. R. Griffith, Mrs. J. B. Waldrop and Mrs. Emory Crockett.

Assisting with the other chores were Mrs. Joe Burroughs, Mrs. Dixie Jo Crockett and Mrs. Peggy King, in addition to several members of the Lions Club.

The Lions expressed their appreciation to all who helped with the project.

FRIDAY RAIN TOTALS .21

Last Friday brought McLean 21 inch of rain, the first of October, and heavy dews during the past week made it appear more moisture had fallen.

Foggy nights have been almost routine, with the air virtually dripping with moisture.

The 21 inch on Friday increased McLean's yearly rainfall total to 17.32 inches, almost exactly four inches less than the 21.31 which had fallen to this date in 1961.

Temperatures have been slightly higher in McLean the past week than in previous reporting periods. The top reading was 91 degrees last Thursday, but the mercury rose to 90 again Wednesday.

Minimum reading for the week was 50 degrees recorded on Sunday.

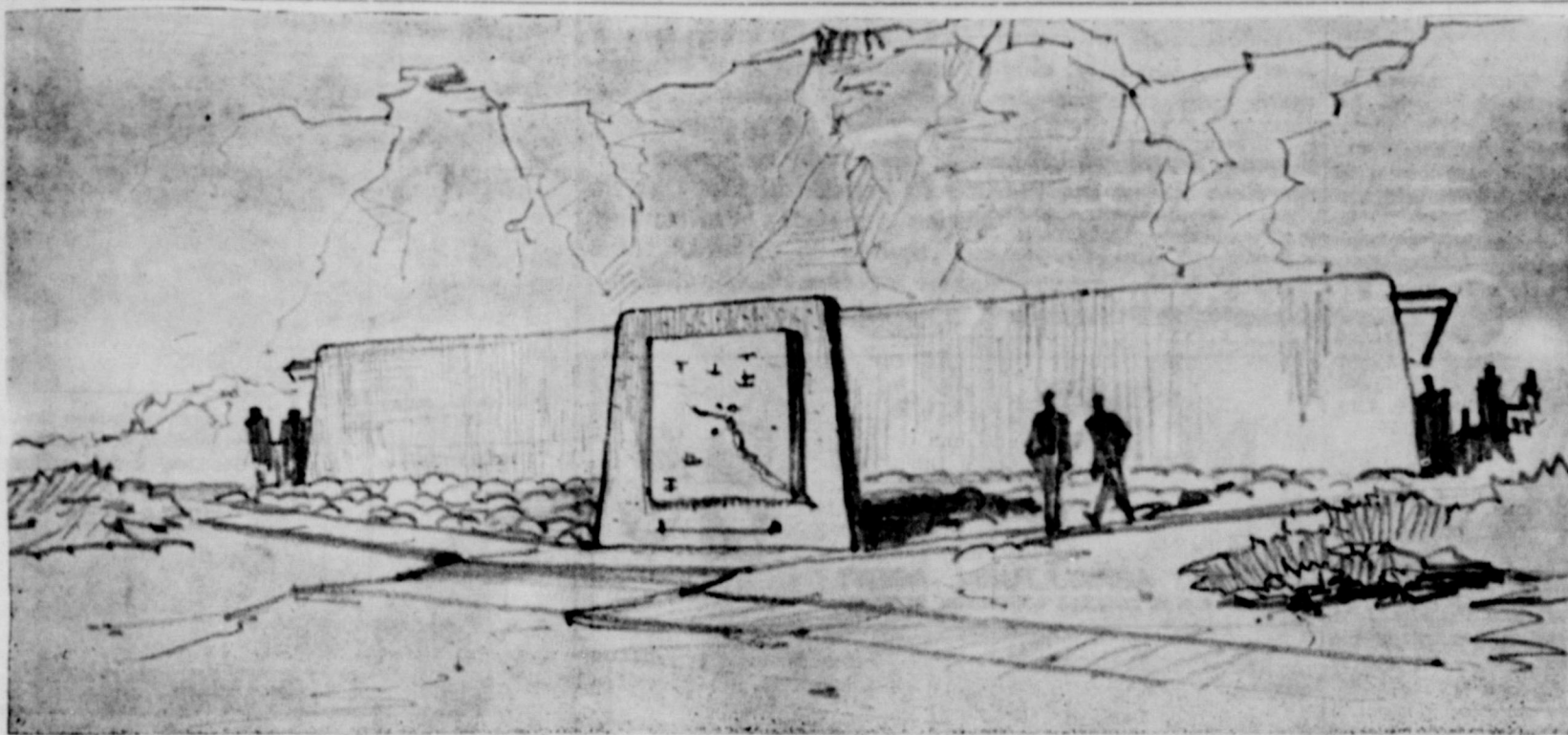

Delegates from the four county communities met last week and re-elected all present members of the committee to new term.

Paul R. Bowers is chairman; Floyd E. McLaughlin, vice chairman; W. E. Jarvis, first alternate, and Everett L. Watson, second alternate.

Miss Evelyn Mason, county ASCS office manager, announced the results of the election this week.

Miss Mason also disclosed that Nov. 1 has been set as the date on which all 1962 diverted acreage can be grazed.

Producers may begin grazing their cattle on that day and continue the remainder of the year.

The ASCS office manager disclosed, too, that cotton marketing cards are ready at her office in the courthouse annex in Pampa and can be picked up at any time.

Mailed on Request

The cards will be mailed upon request, but the worksheet must be signed before the card can be delivered.

Annual soil bank payments for 1962 have been computed and applications for payment are being mailed for signatures.

Miss Mason reported that to date the county office has not received its allocation to make annual payments.

However, when the applications are signed and the allocation received the payments will be made.

Most final payments on 1962 wheat, barley and grain sorghum are made. Miss Mason said her office expects to have all payments computed and ready to pay by the middle of October.

Midland has been planted all over Oklahoma and the South Plains of Texas.

Milton Carpenter has a planting of Midland, but he thinks a strain of common bermuda will beat it in this area.

RAT POISON

Smolty Price has a new supply of both anti-coagulant rat and mouse bait, as well as poison ervin. It is a big profit item for him, since he handles it at cost.

When no one fails to pay him he breaks even.

GRAZING DATE

Nov. 1 is the date that has been set to release all 1962 diverted wheat and milo acres to be grazed if planted to small grain.

With a ground-soaking rain soon, we look for a sharp increase in price of cattle that are already too high, if you are in the market for them.

Sellers probably think they are too cheap.

Abundant wheat pasture always sharpens the price in late October or November. Should the rest of October and November be dry, look out for a sharp slump in prices. You can get awfully close to having wheat pasture on top and miss it by not receiving that last two-inch rain.

We are close now to having good pasture, but have no definite assurance at this time.

STOCKS AND BONDS

Bondholders get their interest before any stockholder gets his dividends; and should the firm go broke, they get paid out of its assets before the stockholders get a nickel!

Preferred stock, as a rule, yields fixed dividends before the common stockholders get anything, but preferred stock dividends are payable only if declared by the corporation.

By allowing anybody to buy in or to lend to the firm, a corporation has made large scale research, production, and marketing possible while each investor can study and decide where he wants to risk his capital.

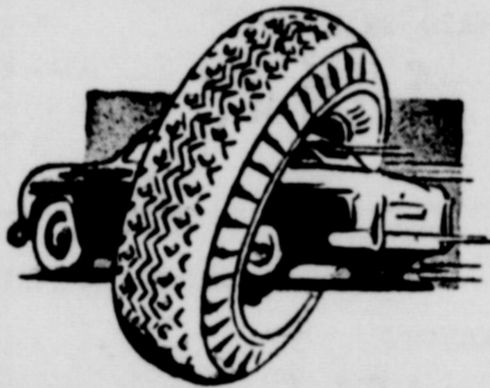

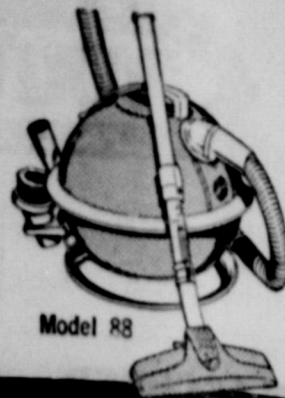
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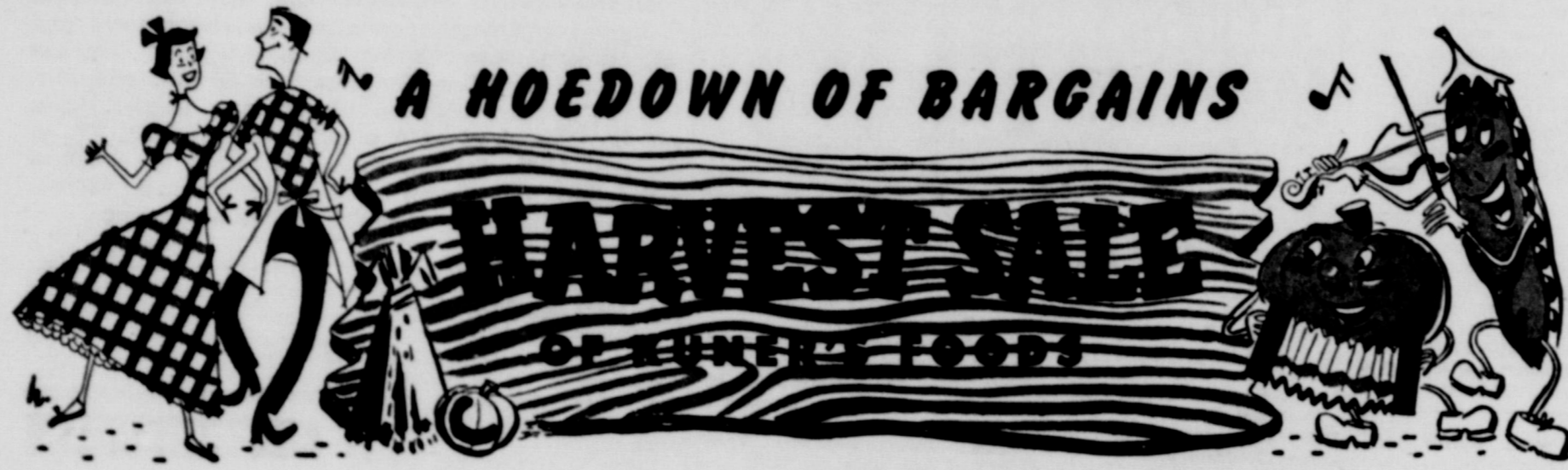
