

In 1941, the Selective Service Extension Act was passed by the House on a 203 to 202 vote. This law provided that draftees be kept in service as long as the government thought necessary. Less than four months after it passed, the U.S. declared war on Japan. Conclusion: Your vote is mighty important-don't neglect it.
