Tigers to Begin District 2-A Play on Friday at Clarendon

McLEAN WINS 20-14 OVER WHEELER HERE

District 2-A football was open Friday night, and the McLean Tigers jump right into the thick of battle with a trip to Clarendon.

The Clarendon Bronchos, a tough aggregation with a fine passing attack, rested last week through an open date and should be in good form for Friday's 7:30 p. m. kickoff.

Though crippled by injuries, the Tigers last Friday wound up non-conference action by trimming the Wheeler Mustangs 20-14 in a slugfest that wasn't decided until the final horn.

Coach Derral Davis called the game McLean's "best team effort" this season, saying that it is impossible to single out any individual player as being outstanding.

The Tigers spotted Wheeler two touchdowns, then came roaring back to delight McLean fans with three determined scoring drives.

Evans Hurt

John Evans, local halfback, left the game almost as soon as it started, after receiving three broken ribs. A short time later Line-man Mike Johnson also had to leave the contest with a bruised hip bone.

But the Bengals made up for their loss by displaying even more determination.

The visiting Mustangs started their first goalward march after recovering a fumble on McLean's 37. They immediately took to the air. Two passes failed to find their mark, but then End Randy Callan hauled down an aerial and raced into the end zone.

Mendall Hunter took another pass for the two-point conversion, and the Mustangs had an 8-0 lead with 4:56 remaining in the first quarter.

Pass Scores Again

After an exchange of punts, Wheeler started moving again from its own 37. Dunk Porter raced across to the McLean 48, but a clipping penalty put the Mustangs back on their own 36. Hunter took a pass on the next play and went all the way.

The points-after attempt failed, but Wheeler had a 14-0 lead with 10:56 left in the first half.

The Tigers quickly recovered and marched to their first TD.

Starting after the kickoff on the Wheeler 49, Jim McCarty—playing for the first time this season—Dickie Crockett and Donnie Woods forced their way downfield. McCarty set up the scoring play on Wheeler's two, and Crockett smashed across the middle. Bob Patton added the extra point, and the score was 14-7 with six minutes left.

Nuremburg Trials Attorney Is Brother Of McLean Resident

W. A. Dickinson Sr., a prosecuting attorney for the Nuremburg trials following World War II and brother of Dick Dickinson of McLean, said in an Amarillo interview Monday that Hitler's Germany was a "Frankenstein" that "very nearly destroyed all the world."

Dickinson came to Amarillo from his home in Cape Charles, Va., for a family reunion. While in Amarillo he was interviewed by an Amarillo Globe-News staff writer, who quoted the attorney as saying the rise of nazism in Germany before World War II was the "most damnable ever perpetrated upon a country."

Someone Joins Them
This proves, he added, that "the fanatics and foolish can always find some other fool to join them in anything."

Dickinson directed the ministry (cabinet officer) division of the Nuremburg trials in 1946-47, when Nazi war criminals were tried.

The veteran lawyer said that "there is not a question but what Hitler rebuilt Germany. But in doing so he built a Frankenstein that destroyed Germany and very nearly destroyed the world."

While in Amarillo, Dickinson visited with his mother, Mrs. C. M. Hundley, and sister, Mrs. A. W. Brown, both of Amarillo, and his three brothers, Dick of McLean, Jesse of Trinidad, Colo., and John of Sayre, Okla.

Funeral services for T. W. McPherson, father of Mrs. Jim Boyd of McLean, were held Wednesday afternoon in Snyder.

Mr. McPherson died early Tuesday morning. He lived in Snyder. Surviving, in addition to his daughter here, are his wife, of the home, and one grandson, Jimmy Boyd of McLean.

Highway Patrolman R. C. Parker said Mrs. Palmer failed to negotiate a curve on FM 1221 some 12.4 miles north of McLean.

The car overturned twice and rolled into a deep concrete culvert on the right side of the road.

It was the second accident occurring in this area in less than a week.

Voters Advised To Study Amendments Before Balloting

McLean Lions were cautioned Tuesday to think carefully before they vote on the proposed constitutional amendments at the polls on Nov. 5.

Don Lane, Pampa attorney, said no voter should merely mark his ballot for or against the amendments without first studying them.

He suggested, however, that the voters inform themselves before the election, because of the time which would be required to read all 14 of the amendments to be voted on.

Most interest is being generated by the 14th proposed amendment, Lane reported. Some well-informed persons have charged that the amendment would destroy the separation of power in the state government.

Others have said the amendment is needed to better define the administrative branch of government.

At any rate, Lane said, adoption of the amendment would "have a great effect on the structure of our state government."

My wife had me cleaning out the old trunk in the storage room the other day, and I ran across a huge old family Bible that I had not thought about for years.

My great grandmother had kept the journal of the trip across the Great Plains with a wagon and team when she and great grandpa were youngsters coming out to California in the great migration. Great grandma wrote about it as the wild, new land, rich and abundant in mythical opportunities.

On the trail she wrote of sickness and hunger, and heat and dust and thirst, and the and births like beads strung

And when she viewed the new land she wrote in simple word pictures of the cities and farms and schools, and happiness that would some day bloom in the greatness of the vast new land. She wrote of her tomorrow and my today.
 The ink was badly faded, but the message was clear. As I read, I began to think about America and being an American and what it all stands for; and I thought about our enemies and what they intend to do to America, to those rich lands and farms, to the cities and the people, to its freedom and its hope.
 And, suddenly, I realized that I am a sick American. I mean really sick. I am sick of panaceas and of backing up. I am sick of reactions where there should be initiative. I am sick of bureaucrats who tell me that my enemy is not really my enemy, and that I should live together with murderers and tyrants.
 I am sick of government that hasn't the guts to clean traitors out of its own offices. And I'm sick of being a nice, patient guy about it. I am sick of placidly accepting excuses instead of successes; of being a silent gentleman for fear of controversy. I am sick of my country being ridiculed all over the world. I am sick of pink-livered politicians who place personal career above the fate of the flag.
 I am sick of 40 years of relentless, creeping, cancerous, communistic godlessness that never once has wavered from its avowed purpose of conquering that flag and seeing it trampled in the mud under Russian boots. I am sick of my genteel desire to stand pat and pray while the enemy advances.
 I am sick of educators who teach tolerance of subversion and of clergymen who would have me quail at the specter of battle and turn my cheek in fear of what our enemies might do.
 In all honesty, the thing of which I am most sick is the man who let these things come to me—myself.
 And by the living God who made me, sir, I am a sick American who intends to get well.

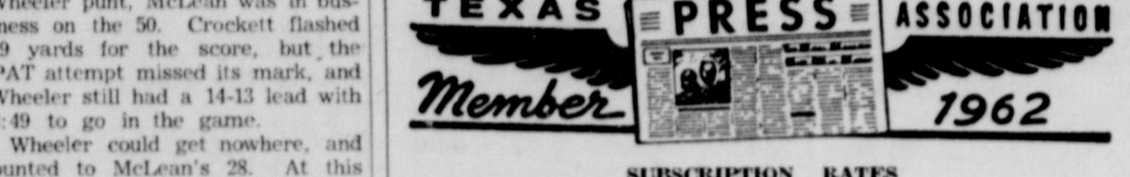

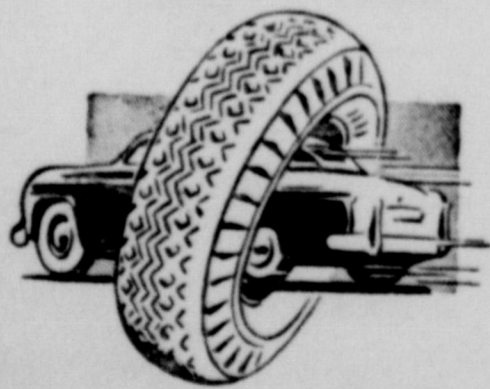
