Most Republicans Lead Voting Here

Democrats kept control of top state and federal offices in Texas Tuesday, but McLean and Gray County went along with the Republicans in most contests.

Heated campaigning brought out an unusually heavy off-year election vote in McLean, where a total of 478 ballots were cast in the congressional race.

The campaign between Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa and Jack Seale of Amarillo was the biggest attraction

of the election. Seale, who lost his bid to unsea the veteran congressman, received 259 votes to Rogers' 219. In Gray County Seale had a narrow lead of 3,420 to 3,385, but Rogers was

far ahead district-wise. In the state representative's race Incumbent Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler snowed under Republican Warren Fatheree of Pampa across the three-county district, but the count was closer here in McLean.

7-Vote Margin McIlhany had 237 to 230 for Fatheree. By late Wednesday afternoon, with two boxes yet to be reported, McIlhany led his op-ponent 2,082 to 1,979 in Gray

Regulations prohibit a wheat payment on any farm if the producer exceeded his wheat allotment on any other of his farms. Dec. 14 is the deadline for signing up for the program.

Miss Mason suggested that farmers drop by her office and let personnel there compute the payment on their acreage at 20 per cent and at 50 per cent, before a decision is reached. She said the program is "entire
