HOSPITAL BOND ISSUE ASKED

Petition Will Be Circulated Soon

Circulation of a petition asking the Gray County commissioners court to call a \$150,000 bond issue to construct a hospital in McLean will begin here within the next few days, Mayor John C. Haynes said Wednesday.

The decision to request the bond election was made by the McLean city commission recently following a meeting with the county hospital board.

The proper petition form is now being prepared and should be ready for circulation very soon.

All property owners in McLean, Alameda and throughout this area are urged to sign the petition, which also will be circulated in other parts of the county—including Pampa.

Between 700 and 800 county property owners must sign the petition before the commissioners court can legally call the bond election. It is hoped that far more than the required number of signatures will be secured.

Convenient to Sign

When copies of the petition are prepared, they will be left at various places in McLean and throughout the area, making it convenient for residents to sign.

If the bond issue election is called and approved by the voters, a branch of Highland General Hospital will be constructed in McLean, providing proper hospital facilities for this part of the county for the first time ever.

At present, patients must be transported either to Pampa, Shamrock, Groom or Amarillo to receive the kind of care available only in a hospital.

The mayor and city alderman in a recent meeting with the hospital board expressed the opinion that such a hospital in McLean would pay its own way and not be a burden to the county.

Preliminary drawings for the hospital here—which would contain 24 beds, as now planned—have already been prepared. The new two-story building would be connected to the present McLean (See PETITION, Page 5)

TRUSTEES TO BE ELECTED ON SATURDAY

Only thirty-seven residents of McLean exercised their voting privilege Tuesday in electing a mayor and two city aldermen.

Another tight vote is expected Saturday in the annual school election. Voting for the McLean Independent School District will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. at city hall.

Two district trustees are to be elected to the McLean board of education, and one to the county school board.

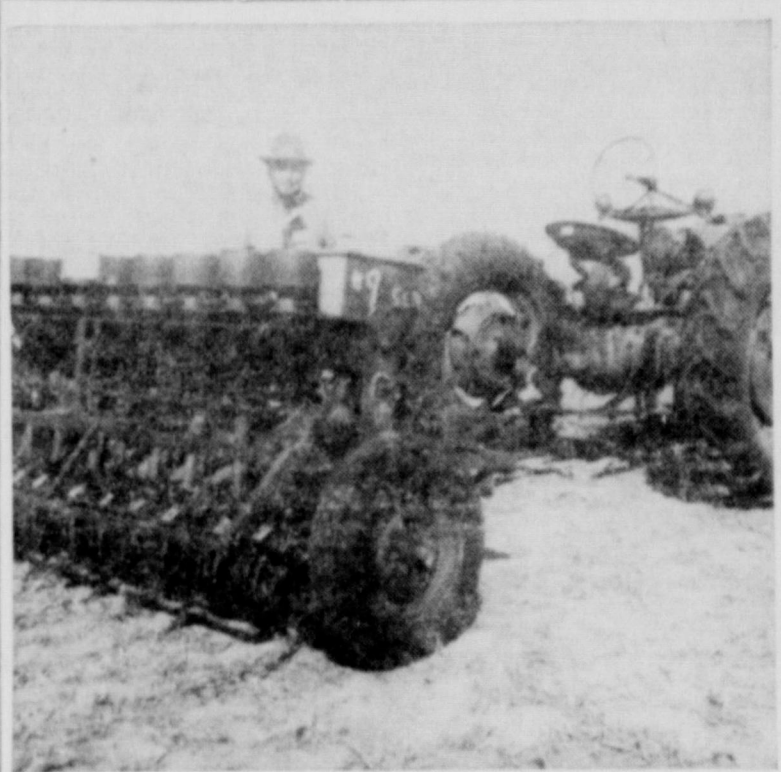
Incumbents Leslie Dacey and Sammy Haynes are seeking reelection to the local board, and John M. Haynes is a candidate for the county board.

All are unopposed.

Mayor John C. Haynes was re-elected to his third term on Tuesday, while Boyd Meador also was elected to another term as alderman.

Jewel Meacham was also unopposed for the other alderman's position to be filled this spring.

All city officials and school trustees elected this week will assume their duties next week.

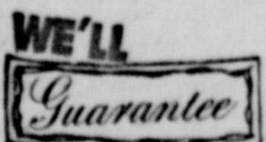

TEXAS A & M COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

By FOSTER WHALEY SCREWORM PROGRAM

Contributions continue to come in on the screwworm program. You may leave yours at the bank or with Guy Beasley.

The following report comes from the information office of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program with headquarters at Mission, Texas.

"Sterile fly release totaled 98,192,950 for the week ending March 23.

"Twelve screwworm infestations were confirmed for the week; five in Brooks County, one in Duval, two in Hidalgo, two in Kenady, one in Mexico and one in New Mexico. Investigation showed the New Mexico case had been collected last fall.

"Non-screwworms totaled 90 or 88 per cent of all samples submitted; two of the non-screwworms were detected in New Mexico.

"Telephone screwworm reports are increasing and the majority of callers have specimens at the time the report is made. Dr. M. E. Meadows says. He wants producers to continue to collect samples before calling, since reports without

samples are of little value." RAT POISON

Much is being said about the election to be held by the Department of Agriculture on the 1964 wheat programs.

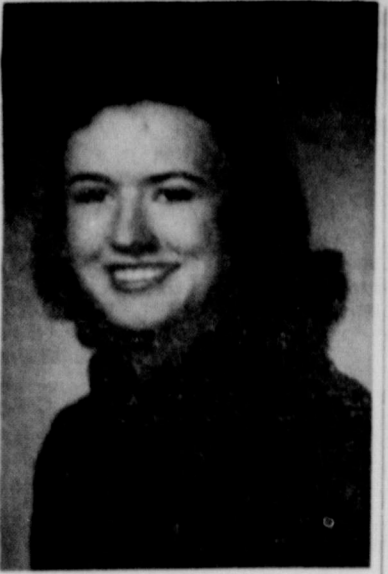
Meetings have been set up by the ASCS committee for Grandview, McLean, Laketon and Pampa. Members of the committee plan to keep these meetings on an objective basis.

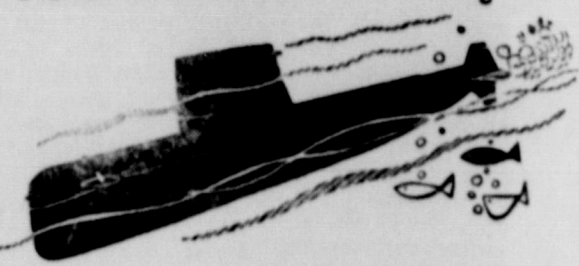

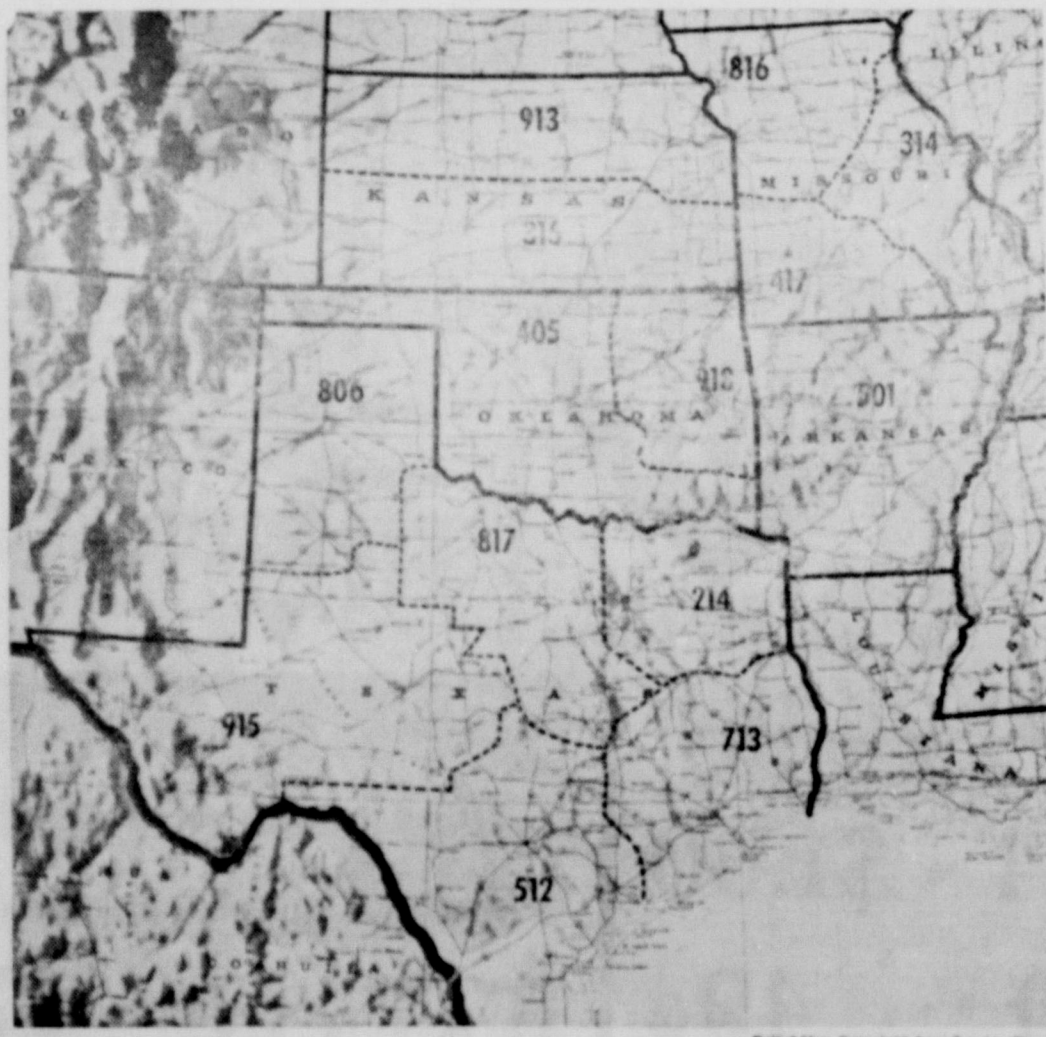

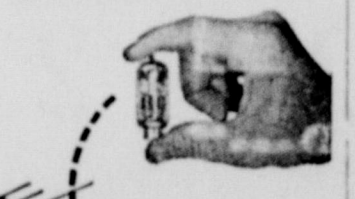

Farm Facts

J. A. Hyslop of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1958 compiled an estimate of losses caused by some 60 different kinds of insects in the United States. Total damage, including control costs, amounted to more than \$1.6 billion annually.

Hyslop's estimate, however, was based on prices much lower than those of today and did not include all the injurious insects. Even so, these losses would amount to about \$12 for each man, woman, and child in the country—or \$1 per month per person.

The hell weevil alone has nicked farmers to the tune of \$500 million in some seasons, and losses average about \$200 million a year. Destruction of crops by grasshoppers amounted to more than \$100 million in 1956.

Livestock pests take an annual toll estimated at \$500 million, mainly attributed to wasted feed, lower meat and milk production, and damaged hides.

Insects are ranked along with fire as destroyers of forests. They destroy an estimated 5% of the stored grain, \$150 million worth of packaged and processed goods, and clothing and household furnishings valued at from \$200 million to \$500 million.

Insects cost us \$1 per month per person.
