## Rain Spoils Rodeo; Many at Celebration

### 20-YEAR-OLD TOP FIDDLER IN CONTEST

Once again, rain played havoc with McLean's 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration, all but washing out festivities Friday and Saturday nights.

But rodeo performances were the only parts of the event to suffer, with the Horse Show described as the best ever held, some 183 persons registering for the Old Settlers Reunion and the Old Fiddlers contest setting the town's feet to tapping.

Still, the weather brought a financial setback. Just how much the celebration ended up in the red had not been determined by Wednesday afternoon, but for the second straight year rain washed out any hopes of a profit.

**Clear 2 Nights**  
Clear weather brought sizeable crowds to the Felton Webb Arena Wednesday and Thursday nights; then threatening weather kept many of the fans away the next two performances.

A fifth rodeo show was held Sunday afternoon.

More than 140 entries were reported in the rodeo.

Saddle winners were: Bob Sherrod, McLean, saddle bronc; James Martin, Spearman, bull riding; Corky Berry, Tullia, bareback bronc riding; Bob Thompson, Paducah, calf roping; Doc Sellers, Abilene, heading and heeling; Buddy Cockrell, Amarillo, bulldogging.

For Thompson, this was the fourth year to win a saddle as top performer in an event.

Mary Ann Stockstill of Pampa, took top honors in the girls barrel racing. Second went to her sister, Nancy Stockstill, also of Pampa, and Glenda Light of Amarillo and Sis Newsom of Mobeetie tied for third.

Cost of the rabies vaccination is \$2.50 per dog.

The commission encourages all residents to have their dogs inoculated to prevent an outbreak of rabies among animals here.

### \$100,000 for New Building

## Alanreed to Vote On School Bonds

Patrons of Alanreed Independent School District will vote Saturday on a \$100,000 bond issue for a new school building.

The Alanreed board of education called the election in a recent special meeting after receiving a petition from a group of Alanreed citizens.

The number of persons signing the petition for the bond election far exceeded the 20 required to call the election.

A special community-wide meeting has been called for 8 p.m. Friday in the Alanreed gymnasium to discuss the proposed bond issue.

Alanreed Supt. George D. Smith said all citizens are cordially invited to attend the meeting and express their opinions on the bond issue.

Dr. Floyd Golden, educational consultant for Rittenberry and Rittenberry Architects, Inc., of Amarillo, will be present at the meeting to discuss the bond issue and answer any questions which might be presented concerning the proposed election.

"All interested persons should certainly attend this meeting and receive the correct information first hand as it will be presented at the polls on Saturday," Smith said.

If approved, the bond issue will be used to construct a modern new building to replace the school building in use at Alanreed for many years.

## RAIN DAMPENS CELEBRATION

June continued to be wet through the past week, with another .70 inch of rain falling.

This was the official amount of moisture received by McLean since last Thursday, but more than this was reported in areas outside the city.

Thunderstorms dampeded festivities at the rodeo arena Friday and Saturday nights to cut sharply into attendance at the 66 Rodeo again this year.

A .37-inch rain fell Friday night, followed by .25 on Saturday.

The week's moisture increased to 7.55 inches the total for the year through Wednesday afternoon and to 2.67 inches the amount for June.

A year ago at this time, McLean had received 6.54 inches.

Temperatures were staying mostly in the 90's during the day this week and slipping to the cool 60's at night.

## MRS. CARTER IS LIBRARIAN

### Due to Assume Duties July 1

Mrs. Wheeler Carter was hired by the city commission Tuesday night as librarian at Lovett Memorial Library.

She will succeed Mrs. Guy Hester, who resigned the position last month, on July 1 at a salary of \$175 per month.

Mrs. Carter was among 10 applicants for the job. She is presently employed by The McLean News.

Also during Tuesday night's meeting, the commission approved a recommendation by the city library board that Lovett Memorial Library be kept open from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

In the past the library has been closed all day on Monday, but the board felt the evening hours would be convenient for adults, as well as many students.

**Equalization Board**  
In other action, the commission appointed itself as the city equalization board, and set Tuesday, July 2, as the date for a meeting to study the tax rolls.

Ordinance No. 116 was read for the second and final time and approved unanimously by the commission to set up a city traffic commission.

The ordinances provides that the McLean superintendent of public works, Pete Fulbright, will serve as chairman of the commission.

Mayor John C. Haynes appointed two other members of the city commission to serve on the traffic board—Jewel Meacham and Jack Shelton.

The traffic commission is empowered to study the traffic situation in the city and make recommendations to the city commission for correcting any hazards.

**Signs Placed**  
The possibility of erecting two large metal signs—on Highway 66 to the east and west of the city—publicizing McLean was discussed.

Appointed to a committee to make arrangements for the signs were Aldermen Creed Lamb Jr., Joe Burroughs and Boyd Meador.

It was announced during the meeting that Dr. Charles E. Deyhle, Clarendon veterinarian, will be in McLean next Monday to vaccinate dogs against rabies.

Dr. Deyhle will be at the city fire station from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday to vaccinate animals brought there.

Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor of the McLean Methodist Church, said the invocation to open the meeting Tuesday night.

## Just Between Us

A decision is due to be made Monday on the date of the \$150,000 bond issue to construct a 24-bed hospital in McLean.

Lane explained that the commissioners may pick either a Tuesday or a Saturday.

Once the date is set, another meeting will likely be held to discuss a get-out-the-vote effort here to assure success.

## Residents Reminded Of Storm Warning

With the city in the midst of the storm season, Fire Chief Boyd Meador this week reminded residents of the tornado warning signal.

Two blasts on the sirens are a warning to residents that McLean is in a severe weather area and there is a possibility of a tornado in the area.

Meador explained that when this signal is heard residents should watch the clouds closely and use their own judgment about seeking shelter.

More than two siren blasts means a fire has been reported.

## ALLOTMENTS REMAIN SAME 10 Per Cent Will Not Be Returned

Wheat allotments will remain in effect on the 1964 crop even though marketing quotas were voted down in the recent nationwide referendum, according to the Gray County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Miss Evelyn Mason, ASCS manager, this week explained the various portions of the wheat program that are effective despite the fact that the quotas were disappointed.

There will be no diversion payment, no price support payment, and no certificate wheat—and there will be no marketing quota penalties.

The wheat allotment shown on the individual farmer's notice remains in effect, and the 10 per cent will not be added back to the allotment, Miss Mason said.

**50 Per Cent of Parity**  
"If you plant within your wheat allotment, you will be eligible for price support at 50 per cent of parity (approximately \$1.25 national average)," she continued. "You will receive no payments for planting within the allotment."

Farmers who plant more than their wheat allotments will not be eligible for price support, but they can sell all the wheat they produce on the open market.

However, those farmers with land in the soil bank will violate their contract if they exceed their wheat allotment (or 15 acres, whichever is larger).

### Can Be Reduced

"Your future wheat allotment will be reduced if you exceed your wheat allotment in any year," the ASCS office manager added. "If you exceed your 1964 wheat allotment by any amount, your 1966 wheat allotment will be seven to eight per cent less than it would be if you do not exceed your 1964 wheat allotment."

Loan rate for 1963 Gray County wheat is \$1.78 per bushel, plus a premium for wheat with high protein and sedimentation content. A discount will be deducted for wheat with a low protein or sedimentation content, and if the wheat is stored in an elevator storage charges will be deducted.

Miss Mason reminded county farmers that the 1964 feed grain program will be in effect, and said her office would furnish details as soon as they are received.

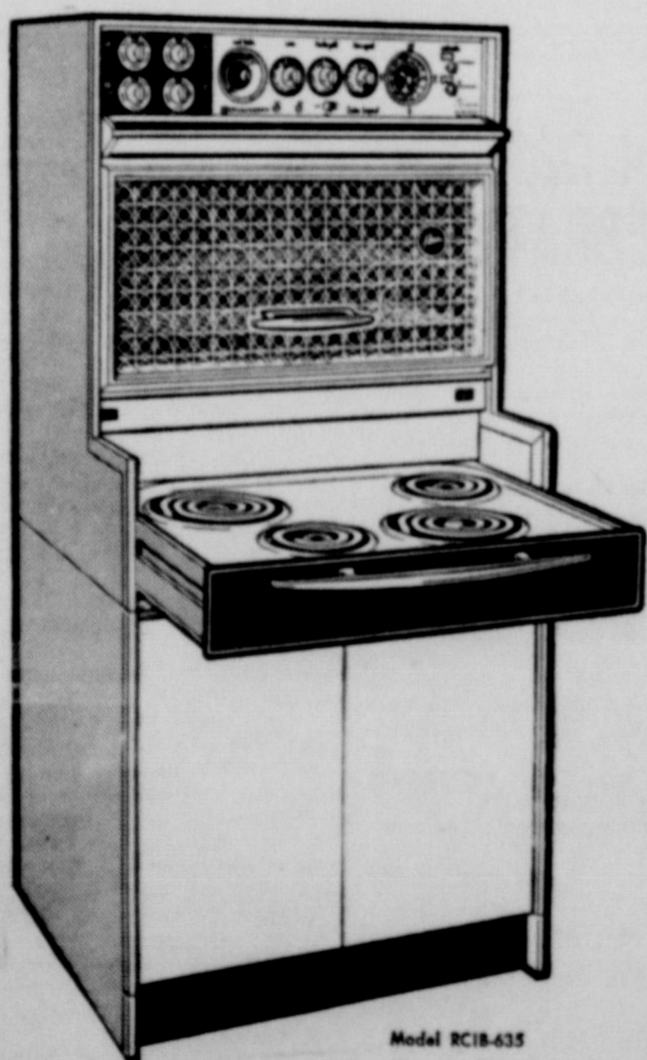

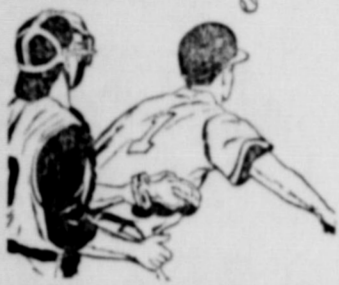

R. W. Adams plans to irrigate some bottomland pasture on his farm west of Kellerville. Under fertilization and irrigation this land will be very productive. Also, it will provide green pasture during the entire summer.

James Cliett's irrigated Indian-grass, northeast of McLean, looks real good. He has it cut up in five pastures so that he can rotate grazing. This gives him an opportunity to defer, fertilize and irrigate each pasture before grazing.

Mrs. Adie Lea Hopkins plans to seed a waterway on her ranch south of Pampa next fall.

Grassed waterways provide safe outlets for terraces and will carry runoff and irrigation tailwater without erosion.

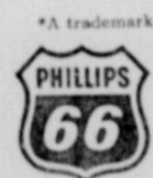
