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

Once again, rain played havoc with McLean's 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration, all but washing out festivities Friday and Saturday nights. were the only parts of the event to suffer, with the Horse Show described as the best ever held, some 183 persons registering for the Old Settlers Reunion and the Old Fiddlers contest tapping.

Still, the weather brought a fi nancial setback. Just how much the celebration ended up in the red had not been determined by Wednesday afternoon, but for the second straight year rain washed out any hopes of a profit.
