The delay now is for a good ason - a search for additional ands to assure construction of a 20-bed hospital.

It's sad, but that's the way it The \$150,000 bond issue voters here and all over Gray County approved last July won't provide enough money for the size hospital we all thought would be built.

A meeting of the Gray-Pampa Foundation was scheduled for 4 p.m. today in Pampa to discuss the possibility of obtaining a grant from the foundation to help pay

for the hospital. It is a meeting that had been sought for sometime. Whether the foundation will see fit to furnish all or any portion of the estimated \$20,000 needed for the 20bed hospital won't be known until after the discussion is over. It goes without saying, we hope the foundation directors are generous. This is the same source funds used to construct Lovett Memorial Library came from. -jbu-

If the entire \$20,000 isn't provided by the foundation, perhaps the county commissioners court can be prevailed upon to take the remainder from the Highland General Hospital fund.

So far, there has been a reluctance to do this. The hospital fund, at last report, contained close to \$200,000.

When plans for constructing a hospital in McLean were first being sisted by Rev. David Thomas, discussed some two years ago, the city commission attempted to secure the money from this fund etery under the direction of Lamb for the entire project.

SUPERSONIC JET: The Concorde supersonic jet will be the successor to the Caravelle, France's first passenger jet achievement, and one of the world's most popular aircraft. The Concorde is now being designed by French aeronautic firms. It is to fly at 1,450 miles per hour and carry 204 passengers. Inaugural flight is scheduled in 1969. The supersonic jet will be 169 feet and 11 inches long, with a wing span of 77 feet and one inch. Plans call for it to pass the sound barrier at 39,400 feet altitude, reach cruising speed at 53,000 feet and continue to rise gradually to 63,000 feet.
