The average payment rate per more of the base will be higher than in 1963. Participants who The maximum diversion of feed divert 40 to 50 per cent of their base (or 25 acres, whichever is larger) will earn higher payments

for all acres diverted. The rate will be based on the farm's normal yield times one-half he total county price support rate. The latter consists of the price support loan rate plus the price support payment rate.

Farmers diverting the minimum 20 per cent will receive a pay ment based on the normal yield imes one-fifth of the county support rate.

Farmers diverting more than 20 but less than 40 per cent will be paid at two rates. For the first 20 per cent, the rate will be the normal yield times one-fifth of the county support rate. The rate for acreage in excess of 20 per cent will be the normal yield times one-half the county support price. Payments may not exceed 20 per cent of the value of the land



FEATHERS stems from the author's own family name. Featherston, and the book is based on the family's many experiences so typical of the "poor but proud" family of the time.


