## Three-Year Contract Given Superintendent Of Alanreed School

George Smith, superintendent of the Alanreed School, has been given a three-year contract by the board of education.

The board's action came at a recent special session to discuss renewal of Smith's contract and progress on the new school building being erected in Alanreed.

Foundation for the \$92,000 structure was poured this week by the contractor, John Jones Construction Co. of Clarendon.

The recent heavy snow delayed work on the building, but construction is expected to be completed in time for the 1964-65 school term.

This Friday Alanreed seventh and eighth grade students are scheduled to take a field trip to Amarillo to visit a Southwestern Public Service Co. power plant.

They will be accompanied to Amarillo by Jay Thompson, local SWPSC manager, and Smith, who teaches the class.

Selection of the outstanding players in the district was made in a meeting of coaches here Wednesday night.

Only one other Tiger was chosen by the coaches for the mythical squads annually picked. He is George Green, who showed steady improvement all through the season just completed and won a berth on the second team.

Welch is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Welch, and Green's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Green.

One of the state's leading scorers the past two years, Welch chalked up the almost unbelievable average of 33.2 points per game in the 1963-64 season.

In 27 games the 6-6 performer tossed in a total of 897 points, despite the most determined efforts of every team the Tigers faced to keep him under control.

A senior, Welch has attracted the attention of several colleges and universities. He has not yet decided where he will enroll next fall.

Green is a sophomore. Only one other player was the unanimous choice of the district coaches—Terry Bromlow of Lefors.

On the first team with Welch and Bromlow are Don McCool, Lefors; Roger Weems, Wellington, and Jim Odom, Memphis.

## Citians' Grandson Is Tops With M-1 Rifle

Bob Greer, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Greer of McLean, fired a near-perfect score recently with the M-1 rifle in Air Force competition at San Antonio.

Greer, assigned to Headquarters Squadron of the 803rd Combat Support group at Davis Manthor Air Force Base, Phoenix, Ariz., scored 299 out of a possible 300 with the .30-calibre M-1.

He is possibly the first man to come this close to a perfect score with the rifle.

The son of N. H. Greer of Panhandle, the young soldier was featured in a picture published in the Davis Manthor AFB News. Greer was shown looking over the bullseye targets used in the competition on the 1,000-inch range.

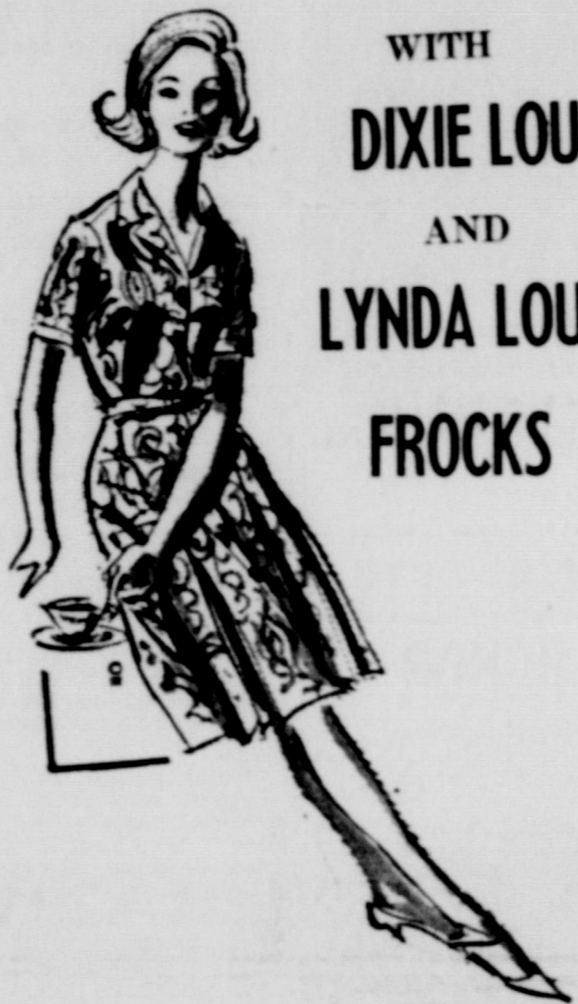
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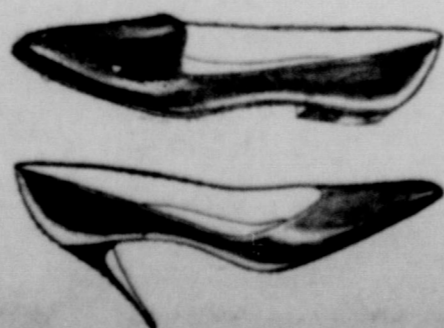

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

### By FOSTER WHALEY McLEAN JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

The McLean Lions Club and merchants are to be congratulated for their fine sponsorship of the McLean Junior Livestock Show.

To be the first show in many years, I thought it was well attended and a very nice show. A separate article gives a good run-down on the entire affair.

#### PROTEIN SUPPLEMENT

I was out with a rancher in the McLean vicinity the other day. He put out a few bales of feed and then grabbed a sack of cake and started feeding.

When I asked him how much he was feeding daily, he said about three pounds per cow. Then he asked how much the experiment station recommended.

I didn't know how to answer, but agreed to check for him. Here is what the Spur Experiment Station has to say:

"From June, 1960, until June, 1963, cows fed no supplement gained 39 pounds of weight. Cows fed 1 1/2 pounds cotton seed cake during the wintering period weighed 61 pounds more. Cows fed three pounds gained only 50 pounds during the same period."

It appears that any cake fed over and above the 1 1/2 pound rate might be wasted. I believe these results are about the same as other experiment station tests in Oklahoma and other research centers that have worked on this subject.

Protein not needed by an animal is expelled through the kidneys.

We have a cow population of over 10,000 head in Gray County. If everyone overfeeds by 1 1/2 pounds per day, this would mean about 7 1/2 tons of cake worth about \$600 is going down the creek in the form of urine.

This is something to think about.

To place in the merit group, Archer competed successfully with over 2,700 other field agents. Rankings are based on total volume of new business and premium income.

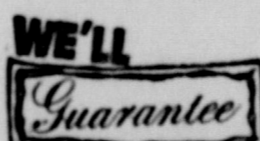

Soil conservation boards from both Carson and Gray Counties met in the agricultural building last Tuesday to plan activities that would speed up the McClellan Creek watershed project.

I was asked to attend a meeting in Amarillo sponsored by their Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee last Monday night. They are attempting to get interest in swine production for this area.

They say thousands of hogs are imported into this area weekly from the Corn Belt by local packers.

The meeting was very revealing. They claim they complete financing for a 50-sow unit. Representatives of the building industry were present, as well as two very successful commercial hog men.

Even at 15 cents, one of the commercial breeders claimed a net of between \$9,000 and \$10,000 annually could be expected with a 50-sow unit.

## NEWS OF CONSERVATION

By VAN MILLS

Stan Kretzmeier, who farms northwest of Pampa, is a firm believer in conservation. Stan said, "I have gotten a 50 per cent increase in yield due to terraces, contour farming and stubble mulching."

Last summer when some of the fields in Stan's area suffered severe water erosion, Stan did not lose any of his valuable topsoil.

C. M. Herrington of Borger plans to construct four diversions, three miles of standard terraces and a farm pond on his place east of McLean. This place is operated by Leslie Darsey.

Clyde Magee of McLean plans to shape some gullies on eroded cropland on his ranch southwest of

McLean. After the gullies are shaped Clyde plans to establish a dead litter cover and then seed to adapted grasses.

**Do You Farm or Ranch For Drought Conditions?**

The normal rainfall from 1892 through 1961 at the Amarillo Weather Bureau is 20.75 inches.

Rainfall was below average 37 of these years and above average 32 of these years. Rainfall was below 15.75 inches 13 years and above 25.75 inches seven years.

From the above information, we can see the droughts or dry years are just as normal as years of high rainfall. We should make provisions for these drought conditions in our long-range farm and ranch plans.

Last summer many farmers and ranchers were out of grass and feed before the summer was over. If our stocking rate is based on the wet years we will be out of grass during the drier years.

Our long-range plans should call for enough feed reserve in form of ensilage, hay or reserve grassland to last at least one year. If we do not have at least this much we are skating on very thin ice.

Moisture - conserving measures such as brush control, proper range use, contour farming, terracing and stubble mulching will help to offset the effects of a drought or dry spell.

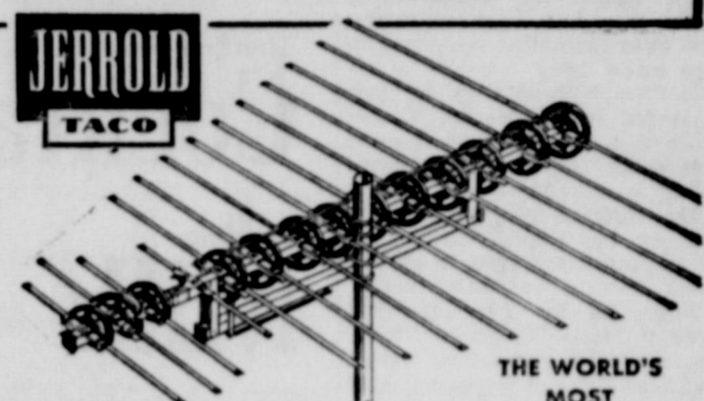
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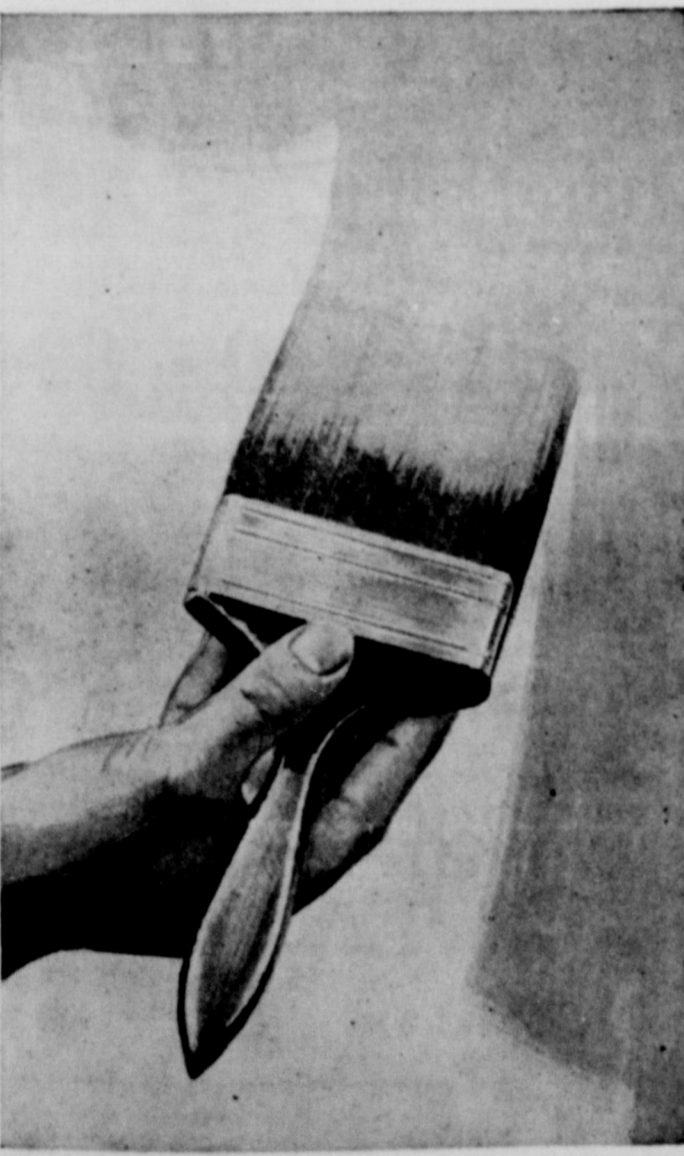

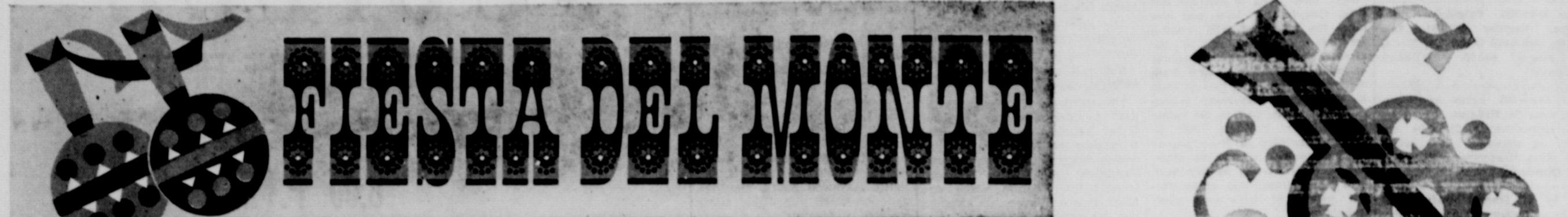
