## City Board Opposes Halting Two Trains

The McLean city commission voted Tuesday night to protest the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific's decision to discontinue two trains now serving the area between Amarillo and Memphis, Tenn. A resolution asking the Interstate Commerce Commission to stop the proposed action by the railroad was adopted by the board. A copy of the resolution will be sent to ICC in Washington, D. C. In a notice posted in the Rock Island Depot in McLean, the railroad announced that effective April

5 passenger trains Nos. 23 and 24 will be discontinued. Both are early morning trains through McLean—one arriving daily at 12:40 a.m. from the west and the other at 5:02 a.m. from the east. Stopping the two trains would hamper mail and passenger service here, the city commission pointed out, leaving only one train from each way daily—at 10:59 a.m. from the west and 4:57 from the east. The railroad's notice states that "person desiring to object to the proposed discontinuance should

notify the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C., of such objection and the reasons therefor at least 15 days before the effective date." March 21 is the final date a protest can be lodged. The city commission was informed at its meeting Tuesday night that the new water well has been completed, and is rated at 300 gallons per minute. The well is 172 feet deep and contains 75 feet of water. It was described as a "good well."

Three positions are to be filled in the city election on Tuesday, April 7.

When we moved out to the Short Grass Country we also faced the problems of adjustment. But what disturbed us was the wind blowing all the time and the lack of mountains and trees.

Now when we go back in the summer, we wish for a wind that just might blow some of the humidity away.

Those mountains, though, are still wonderful.

# WALTER ROGERS REPORTS

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Enactment of the tax bill this week means that the cuts will be reflected beginning next week in the take-home pay of salary and wage earners. Persons in doubt about what the tax bill means to them personally will begin to see the effects for the first time.

I agree with President Johnson that enactment of the tax cut is "the single most important step" taken to strengthen the economy since World War II and that the cut "will strengthen our economy and bring a better way of life to our citizens."

The new law marks a most important milestone in our economic development because it constitutes a strong endorsement of the free enterprise system. Behind it is the principle that capital freed for spending by the private sector of the economy, by consumers and by business, can bring greater economic stimulus than could a higher level of spending by the public sector—by the government.

Texas Gov. John Connally, his arm still in a sling as the result of the grievous wound he suffered when President Kennedy was slain in Dallas, honored the Texas delegation in Congress with a visit this week. The governor was returning to Texas from New York, where he dedicated the Texas Pavilion at the World's Fair site.

Gov. Connally said he hopes it will not be necessary to call the Texas Legislature into special session and everything is in read-drawing the boundaries of the state's congressional districts.

In his view, he said, redistricting is necessary and should be a priority matter for the session of the Legislature beginning next January. But he said he hoped the matter could be better handled in a regular session of the Legislature.

The Texas delegation expressed its unanimous conviction that the Texas Legislature is perfectly able to handle the matter in whatever situation arises.

When will Congress adjourn? Possibly in late June or early July, in time for the Republican national convention scheduled to begin July 13 in San Francisco. At the moment there is a rush in the Senate and the House to try to clear from committee consideration bills affecting local areas in the country.

Many members feel pressed about this because the Senate is preparing to begin its debate on the civil rights bill, and this debate—accompanied by a filibuster of history-making proportions—is certain to consume weeks if not months of time on the Senate floor.

The problem is this: The current session, the second session of the 88th Congress, is the last of the two-year Congress. All bills introduced in this session will die if not enacted by the time the session concludes.

Many bills have been passed by the House and are awaiting consideration in the Senate—and obviously many of them cannot be considered before the civil rights debate begins.

After that debate is over, the Senate will be hard put to act upon appropriations bills acted on by the House in the meantime. It's going to be a very difficult matter for the business of Congress, particularly that on the Senate side, to be concluded in time for adjournment in early summer.

It is possible that the Congress will be recessed for the Republican and Democratic national conventions and then return to Washington in late summer or early fall. If the Congress follows this course, I predict that it will be difficult to keep the members' minds on congressional business; after all, this is a presidential election year and the focus of the country's attention will be on that.

Why I was asked this week, are \$1 silver certificates being withdrawn from circulation? They are being withdrawn over a period of years so that the silver back of them can be used to coin half dollars, quarters and dimes.

There is a shortage of silver that would create a prohibitive price rise if we attempted to buy it on the market. To insure against the possibility of eliminating all \$1 notes from circulation, legislation was passed last year permitting Federal Reserve Banks to issue notes below \$5.

Federal Reserve Banks did not previously have that authority. Some \$2 billion in silver certificates remain in circulation, however, and they are being replaced as they wear out. That's the reason some of your money is looking different lately.

To persons writing for them, I will be glad to send copies of two publications prepared by Congress. One is Senate Document No. 46 containing eulogies to the late President John F. Kennedy delivered in the rotunda of the United States Capitol on Nov. 24, 1963. The other is House Document No. 225, a most attractive reproduction of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag—and the musical accompaniment for it—as well as a history of the famous pledge.

School teachers and their pupils might be particularly interested in having copies of this.

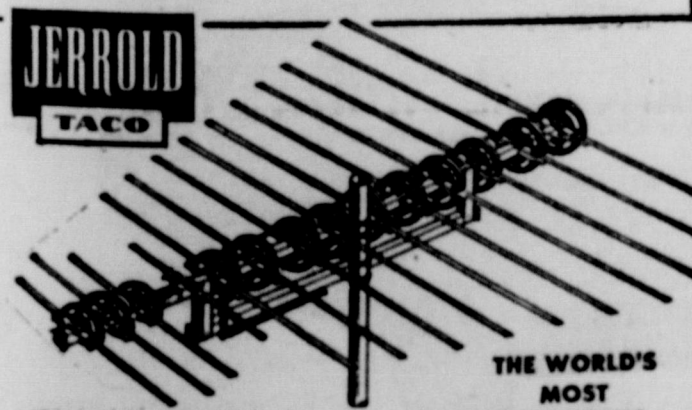

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

As everyone knows, the American silver dollar bears the inscription, "In God We Trust." Presumably this legend will remain for some time unless the Supreme Court gets around to deciding that this, too, is too much of a religious manifestation.

And if the Supreme Court ever gets around to this, it would perhaps be well to consider reverting to the inscription, "Mind Your Business." These old coins are now rare museum pieces. Neither is there extant much background why this motto was used.

But it was used during a time when the American people and government shared one burning belief. They realized what they had fought to achieve, and fervently believed if they worked together to promote the best interests of the United States of America, life would be good.

However, the path of the American people was diverted to minding everybody else's business, with the result that more than \$100 billion has been dissipated in foreign giveaways.

Still to be solved is the loss of the U.S. gold supply. Today, with only \$15 1/2 billion in gold left in reserve, of which \$12 billion must back the currency, there are dollars in foreign hands which could result in claims on U.S. gold for \$20 billions. Like old Mother Hubbard when she went to the cupboard, the cupboard is bare.

Yet in 1955, even after the tremendous financial drain of World War II, and Korea, the U.S. still had 59% of the world's gold supply. Where has this gold gone? Just glancing at the gold reserves of a few nations that have shared in the frantic U.S. foreign give away programs yields an answer.

Between 1935 and 1961 the gold reserves of France jumped approximately 250%, of Germany 400%, of Italy 650%. There is no reliable information on what gold reserves there are in Vietnam, in Cambodia, in Congo, and so on down the long list where American dollars have been poured like sap out of Vermont maples on a warm March day.

Thus, it is an understatement to say that the greatest single problem facing the American Republic today is recapturing an adequate gold reserve.

There has been much made of the fact that the gold outflow rate has been slowed down. The most recent report indicates U.S. is losing gold in millions of dollars instead of billions. There are some attempts made to point to this as an encouraging sign, but this still glosses over the fact that the U.S. is not only steadily losing gold, it is also failing to increase its reserves.

This Pollyanna reasoning is much the same as would occur if a doctor cheerily told his patient "You'll be glad to know you will not die of cancer, instead, you are just slowly bleeding to death."

the top 3805 pounds. When you select your milo to plant, keep the above in mind.

### PLANTING DATE—MILO

Wait until at least June 15. I prefer June 20. The critical period on milo is from the 25th day of age to the 90th day. On the 36th day, milo hits its peak period of daily water use. It will use up to as much as 35 of an inch of moisture per day. By delaying your planting, your milo will not be exposed to as many hours of sunlight or nearly as high a temperature when planted late as compared to an early planting date. More on this next week.

Results from the Bushland Experiment Station show the following hybrid milos to be the top 10 yielders under dryland conditions out of 28 varieties tested in 1963: C-4b, 3805 pounds, first; Richardson 202R, 3705 pounds, second; Horizon 78, 3605 pounds, third; R.S. 610, 3685 pounds, fourth; Scott 450, 3620 pounds, fifth; Advance 14, 3575 pounds, sixth; R.S. 626, 3555 pounds, seventh; W.M.G.S. 45, 3530 pounds, eighth; Standmaster 3290 pounds, ninth; NK 227, 3270 pounds, tenth.

An average of 1962-63 showed RS 610 on top and C-4b in second place. Any of the above varieties would be excellent for planting in the McLean area. It is interesting to note that Martin, a non-hybrid, trailed all hybrids in the test. It yielded only 2455 pounds as compared to C-4b which yielded

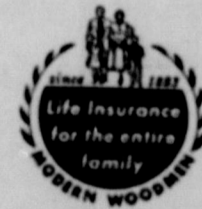

**Advantages of Feed Grain Program Are Listed by the ASCS**

Farmers who participate in the 1964 feed grain program will have definite advantages over those who do not, according to the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.  
 Miss Evelyn Mason, manager of the Pampa ASCS office, pointed out that the participating grower earns a diversion payment for reducing his 1964 acreage of corn, barley or grain sorghum, thereby assuring himself of a substantial income from the diverted acres regardless of drought, flood, insects, hail or crop disease.  
 This is also true of the price support payment which is made on the acreage planted in 1964 to one or more of the three feed grains—no matter what disposition is made of the crop, the price support payment is assured.  
 Also, price support loans and purchase agreements will be available on a participating farmer's entire 1964 production of the three feed grains.  
 If requested by the participating farmer, an advance payment of part of the diversion payment will be made at the time of the signing up, or as soon as possible afterward.  
 Growers participate in the feed grain program by diverting at least 20 per cent of the farm's feed grain base acreage into an approved conservation use and carrying out other provisions of the program.
