Many Benefits Explained

Flood Prevention Program Stressed

Residents of Gray and Carson Counties must show a greater interest if the proposed McClellan Creek watershed upstream flood prevention program is to become a reality.

Representatives of the two counties were told this Tuesday night in a well-attended meeting at Groom.

FULLER 2ND IN SPELLING

Steve Fuller, McLean eighth grader, ranks as the second best speller in Gray County.

The youth took second place in the annual county Spelling Bee Tuesday afternoon in Pampa.

Three other local students were among the 28 entries in the contest.

Seventh grader Mike Haynes placed fourth; Judy Watson, fifth grade, 14th, and Bill Davis, sixth grade, 15th.

First to Pampa
First place was won by Robert Lee Junior High School of Pampa, with Pampa Junior High taking third.

Judy was coached by Mrs. Lucille Gething, and Mrs. Vera Back coached the other three McLean contestants.

The winner from Pampa will enter the regional Spelling Bee in Amarillo. The top speller there will then be eligible to compete in the National Spelling Bee in Washington, D. C.

Curtis Schaffer, a member of the Gray County Soil Conservation district board of supervisors, said that a "crusade" is now beginning "to find out if you people are interested. If not, we'll forget it."

Preliminary work on the project began in the late 1950's, but because of the big demand for funds for such programs all over the state little progress has been made.

Billy Davis, chairman of the project steering committee, told the group, "We are now waiting on a survey party."

At present there are only two such survey parties in the entire state of Texas. Each can complete work on about three watersheds a year.

More Parties Possible
Davis said he had been told that there is a possibility the state will provide funds for additional survey parties in order to "speed up the process."

Currently, work is done on the watershed projects according to priorities set by the State Conservation Board.

New priority numbers are given the individual project applications each year, according to the greatest need.

Davis said the Gray and Carson County SCD's feels a higher priority number could be secured for the McClellan Creek project if more interest is shown.

The districts are now attempting to "sell" the City of Groom on the idea of using one of the planned reservoirs as a municipal water supply.

Would Improve Chances
"If Groom should agree to use one as a water supply," he explained. (See FLOOD, Page 2)

ICC Investigates Railroad Plans

Rock Island Railroad's plan to discontinue two trains through McLean in April will be delayed at least four months.

The Interstate Commerce Commission Wednesday ordered the railroad to continue service as it is for up to four months while an investigation is conducted into the proposal.

Rock Island had planned to discontinue the trains on April 5.

Numerous protests from cities and towns along the route of the trains—which operate between Amarillo and Memphis, Tenn.—were believed to have caused the ICC to take action.

If the railroad is permitted to go through with the proposal, McLean's mail service would be cut in half. Two early morning trains would be stopped.

Ground Water Use Grows in Panhandle

Additional development of ground water from the Ogallala formation in a part of the Texas Panhandle is described in a newly released publication.

The recent study on Carson and Gray Counties, in the mid-section of the Panhandle, reveals continued development of ground-water resources in this area during 1960-62.

The study was conducted by the U. S. Geological Survey in co-operation with the Texas Water Commission and the Ground Water Conservation District No. 3, south of the Canadian River.

Published by the Commission as Bulletin 6402, the report presents data on fluctuations of the water table and the chemical quality of the water as well as ground-water

development.

The report states that during the 1960-62 period 60 irrigation, industrial and municipal wells were drilled. By January, 1963, there were 431 such wells either in use or available for use.

Approximately 290,000 acre-feet of ground water was pumped from these wells over the two years, constituting a withdrawal from the underground reservoir of about one per cent of its estimated total water in storage.

Two-thirds of all the water withdrawn in these two counties was used for irrigation, an integral part of the Panhandle's economy, the report points out. This use of ground water resulted in lowering the water table by a maximum of 11.4 feet in the heavily irrigated part of Carson County during the period 1960-62.

In Gray County, where irrigation pumpage is relatively small, the water level declined only 2.7 feet during the same period.

Fluctuations of water levels in wells in the counties also are presented in the paper, as is information on municipal and industrial use of ground water.

Attention also is given to the chemical quality of the water. The mineral content in the water is uniformly low, it was found, except in one northeastward trending belt wherein the ground water has a high sulfate and chloride content.

This belt of more saline water is of natural occurrence, the report indicates, although salt-water disposal pits, sometimes used for oil-field brine, have contributed to the salinity of ground water in some areas.

Bulletin 6402, entitled "Geology and Ground-Water Resources of Carson and Part of Gray County, Texas, Progress Report No. 2," is available free of charge from the Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 12311, Austin, Texas 78711.

24 Reservoirs
The Sandstone Creek project includes 24 flood detention reservoirs—some comparable in size to Lake McClellan, near here.

"You wonder why a banker runs around the country doing this (boosting conservation)?" Males asked.

"It's not because I'm a good Joe; it's good business."

Males has presented the illustrated talk on conservation all over the United States—including two times in McLean.

"You can't have water conservation without soil conservation," he explained.

Break Up Raindrop
"I believe," he continued, "that the solution lies out in the field where the raindrop falls."

If the soil is in the proper condition, the raindrops will be broken up and soak into the ground with very little runoff. Thus the water is stored in the ground, instead of carrying rich topsoil with it to a river and eventually to the Gulf of Mexico.

The reservoirs on the watershed are constructed in such a way as to prevent rapid runoff—and, thus, reduce flooding downstream.

Males said that when newspapers tell of the amount of flood damage in towns and cities, "you can multiply this figure by three to learn how much damage was caused to the watershed where the rain fell."

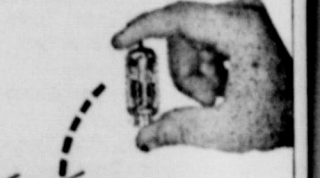

BRUCELLOSIS (Bangs Disease)
 Several people have been asking me, "Why hasn't Gray County been included in the testing program for brucellosis?" since reading two area releases concerning the status of testing in the Panhandle.

The news stories in effect stated that some action is taking place in all counties west of the 100th meridian with the exception of Gray County.

Again we would like to state our official position with regard to a county coming into a bang's testing program.

The Extension Service is an educational agency and is prohibited by law from sponsoring petitions, etc. We stand ready to explain any phase of the testing program.

But the decision on whether Gray County enters such a program rests entirely with the cattlemen of this area.

A number of people have recently called my attention to a recent article and editorial that appeared in the April issue of The Progressive Farmer magazine.

I quote The Progressive Farmer magazine, page 170:

"Clean Up Brucellosis—Time Is Running Out—Time is running out for those states and cattlemen who are dragging their feet in getting rid of brucellosis. The handwriting is on the wall. It says this: Cattlemen who don't have approved

free herds by 1965 are facing the real possibility that they may have to drink all the milk or eat all the beef they produce themselves. Clean states eventually will close their borders to cattle of any kind from areas that harbor 'dirty cattle.'

"The tools to clean up brucellosis are at hand and proved. Those who are not doing anything are trying to hide behind the argument that tests aren't any good, etc. They are whistling in the dark. The 85% of U.S. already cleaned up has proved this argument wrong. By the end of 1964, 90.92%—or more—of U.S. will be modified certified.

"Beef and dairy cattle owners who have stamped out this disease don't want to suffer losses again. They also know what it is to be free of the disease. To protect their gains, they are vigorously urging state and federal regulatory agencies to take whatever steps are necessary to prevent brucellosis from making a comeback.

"We strongly urge cattlemen, dairymen and agricultural leaders in states not now modified certified to get behind the Brucellosis Eradication Program and push hard to clean up by 1965."

THE PLIGHT OF THE INDIANS

"Pockets of poverty" is a phrase that you'll be hearing more and more as debate and discussions continue on the President's anti-poverty program formally presented to the Congress last Monday.

It remains to be seen how the Congress will act on the proposed "Economic Opportunity Act of 1964," the measure in which President Johnson spells out his plan for what he called "a national war on poverty." Committee hearings have begun on its provisions.

No one can be certain how the American people and their Congress will view the proposed legislation, but this much is sure: Discussions about it will bring to light many aspects of the problem President Johnson's program is aimed at correcting.

The President told the Congress, "There are millions of Americans—one-fifth of our people—who have not shared in the abundance which has been granted to most of us, and on whom the gates of opportunity have been closed."

Many of these citizens on whom, as the President said, "the gates of opportunity have been closed," live in "pockets of poverty"—areas in which levels of income, employment and education are extremely low.

Among the groups on whom the focus of attention is falling is that comprised by descendants of the "first Americans"—the American Indians. Poverty is not limited to city slums and so-called "distressed areas"—it exists in the wide open spaces of east and west, on the lands Uncle Sam set aside as Indian reservations.

Phileo Nash, the commissioner of Indian affairs in the Department of the Interior, states the situation bluntly: "Most Indians are poor, desperately poor—as poor as anybody we know of in this rich country of ours."

According to the 1960 census, there were 552,228 Indians and Alaska natives, 509,147 Indians in the United States excluding Alaska. More than half of the total live on reservations. Approximately 380,000 Indian people come within

the scope of the programs of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and most of these live on reservations in sparsely populated rural areas far from cities where industrial employment might be available.

This is the situation affecting Indians on reservations:

- * Unemployment runs between 40 and 50 per cent—seven or eight times the national average.
- * Family income on the reservation averages between one-fourth and one-third the national average. Average Indian reservation family income was \$1,500 for 1962.
- * Nine out of 10 Indians live in housing that is far below minimum standards of comfort, safety and decency.
- * Average schooling of young adults on reservations is only eight years—two-thirds the national average.
- * The average age at death on the reservations is 42 years, two-thirds the figure for the national population.
- * Indians do, indeed, make up one of the nation's "pockets of poverty." Publicity concerning the Indians has centered on that small minority of tribes and individuals which have received enormous sums from oil and gas and other minerals.
- * But the great majority of Indians lack the vocational training needed to compete for the few skilled jobs that can be found in their home areas. Unskilled agricultural jobs are growing fewer as more and more farmers follow the trend toward mechanized operations.
- * A young Indian adult with no more than an eighth grade education is lucky to get a job of any kind—but he must generally content himself with a low-paying job which leads nowhere in terms of salary and advancement. Much worse is the plight of the Indian who has less than an eighth grade education or no education at all.
- * Through vocational training programs, programs aimed at improving housing, programs to improve grazing and agricultural resources, programs aimed at providing credit for business and individual development, encouragement of tribal enterprise and school construction programs, the Bureau of Indian Affairs is tackling the arduous and complex and long-term job of helping Indians help themselves into a brighter future.

Fuller is district field superintendent for El Paso Natural Gas Company, and resides with his family in the El Paso Camp east of McLean.

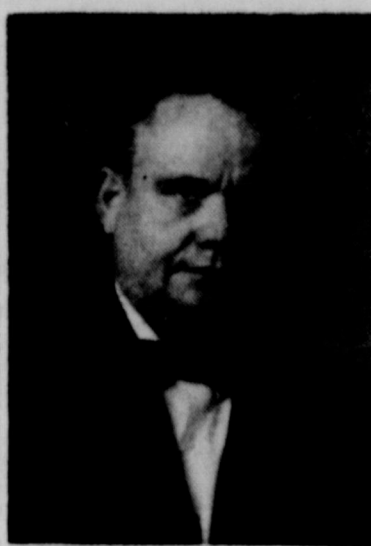

18 ACCIDENTS IN FEBRUARY

Eighteen accidents were investigated on rural highways in Gray County during the month of February, Sgt. J. W. Wilson, Texas Highway Patrol supervisor for this area, announced Wednesday.

The mishaps brought death to two persons and injured 17 others, while causing property damage estimated at \$19,105.

Sgt. Wilson said the traffic accident summary for the first two months of 1964 shows a total of 32 wrecks, resulting in two persons killed, 24 injured and property damage of \$23,830.

Darkest Hour
In all its glorious history, Texas reached its darkest hour in traffic fatalities during 1963, the patrol supervisor reported.

The preliminary death count now stands at 2,703, which is 282 more lives lost than in 1962. This figure also is 92 greater than the previous all-time high of 2,611 in 1956.

When all reports for the past year are received, it is expected that the toll will reach a staggering 2,725.

The death count for this year now exceeds 400, which is an 11 per cent increase over the same period for 1963.

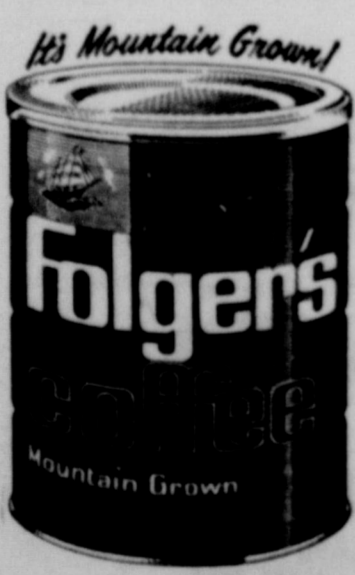
