This is why he encourages God's people in Phil 4:6, 7: "BE ANXIOUS FOR NOTHING BUT IN EVERYTHING BY PRAYER AND SUPPLICATION WITH THANKSGIVING LET YOUR REQUESTS BE MADE KNOWN UNTO GOD:

AND THE PEACE OF GOD, WHICH PASSETH ALL UNDER-STANDING, SHALL KEEP YOUR HEARTS AND MINDS THROUGH CHRIST JESUS."

"LET US THEREFORE COME BOLDLY UNTO THE THRONE OF GRACE, THAT WE MAY OBTAIN MERCY AND FIND GRACE TO HELP IN TIME OF NEED" (Heb. 4:16).




