Tiger Band Wins Sweepstakes At Enid's Tri-State Festival

The McLean Tiger Band, performing almost to perfection, won the sweepstakes award in its class last week at the nationally famous Tri-State Music Festival in Enid, Okla.

Accumulating a total of 365 points, the McLean youngsters thus for the first time received a sweepstakes award. No other local high school band had ever before been a sweepstakes winner.

Last year the junior high band

took the sweepstakes award at the Gruver festival.

The Tiger Band scored an overall grade of 97.8—out of a possible 100 points—in the marching contest, and in the "Million Dollar Parade" was rated only slightly lower with 97.4 points.

In concert one of the three judges rated the band as Division I. The other two judges gave the local musicians Division II ratings. The band received eight A's, nine

B's and three C's.

Texas bands walked off with most of the trophies from the contest. Bands from this area who received honors were Pampa, Hereford, Spearman, Tulia and the three Amarillo high schools, in addition to McLean.

The McLean band will be featured in a concert honoring the senior students on May 15. At this time the medals, trophies and plaques (See BAND, Page 2)

An outstanding all-around student, Miss Beasley has been active in the Tiger Band during all four years in high school.

She is a member of the band's clarinet trio which will enter the state Interscholastic League competition at Austin this weekend.

Miss Beasley also won second place in ready-writing in the regional II, contests at Canyon last month, also qualifying for state.

She is a member of the Future Business Leaders of America and annual staff.

McCarty, an outstanding athlete and band student, has been on the football, basketball, track and golf squads the last four years.

He has received All-District honors in football and All-Regional honors in band.

McCarty served his class as president the past two years. He also is a member of FBLA and of the annual staff.

Goldwater also led in county voting, being favored by 1,218 voters. Mrs. Smith had 27, Rockefeller 42 and Harold Stassen 24.

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WASHINGTON AND 'SMALL BUSINESS'

The posthumous disclosure by General Douglas MacArthur is perhaps the biggest bombshell to explode in Washington since Pearl Harbor. The fact that there was treachery in Korea which cost thousands of American lives and ended the fiasco in a stalemate was perhaps not particularly new.

But the facts as to how the "sell out" was accomplished are interesting. While on one hand, this can be viewed as an indictment of the British, it is perhaps well to put things in their proper perspective.

During the time of Korea the British Labor government was in power, which takes in the so-called liberals. Right after World War II the liberal agitators were able to remove Winston Churchill and put into control the Labor Party.

This was an interesting period in British history. The railroads, trucking, and other industries were nationalized. Socialized medicine came into effect. It also developed responsible posts in the British government were given to sex deviates who defected to Russia, and the daughter of a government leader married an African.

After about six years of this, the British people threw the Labor Party out of power and sought to remedy as much of the damage wrought as possible. England still suffers from the affects of this rule.

It was during this time that

General MacArthur's battle plans were given to the Chinese. Thus, this treachery was quite in keeping with the rest of the era of disgraceful conduct in Britain as it all goes together in one ball of wax.

Of course, when the British people revolted against such scandal and put back into power a responsible government, the U.S. State Department did its best to destroy the government, being even more bitter than it has been since Gen. DeGaulle ousted French Socialists.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Curtis Schaffer, Elmer Balch and Robert Sailor recently used the new **SKD** carryall to do earth-moving work on their farms. It has a capacity of two cubic yards and has proved to be satisfactory for small earth-moving projects. Landowners and operators that plan to use the carryall should contact Dolores Johnson, secretary for the Gray County Soil Conservation District.

Livestock Water Ponds — Jack Bailey staked a pond for construction on his farm northeast of McLean. A livestock pond was staked on the Johnson Ranch west of Albreed.

Pete Setz constructed a pond on his farm east of Laketon.

Jinks Shaw is constructing a dam on his ranch northwest of McLean.

There have been several stock ponds constructed in Gray County this year. Due to droughty conditions last year, livestock water was a problem. Landowners that have this problem should make plans now for additional livestock water.

Range Seeding—Jack Bailey recently seeded 170 acres of native grass northeast of McLean.

Roy McCracken seeded 86 acres on his farm east of McLean.

George F. Jackson seeded approximately 40 acres of grass on his farm west of Kellerville.

Lester Bailey plans to seed 60 acres on his farm west of Kellerville.

Approximately 1,200 acres of old cultivated fields and poor condition rangeland have been seeded to native and improved grasses in the McLean area this year. Cost-share assistance is available for grass seeding through the Great Plains and ASC programs.

Brush Control—Several ranchers have indicated that they plan to spray competitive brush this year. Areas to be sprayed should have good moisture conditions and the brush should be in a healthy state of growth for best results. Native grass should be deferred 90 to 120 days following spraying.

The checks, according to an accompanying letter, represent "a final dividend of 1.2696 per cent on your approved general creditor's claim against Citizens State Bank, McLean, Texas, in liquidation."

The bank closed its doors many many years ago—in 1929, someone said. Now, 35 years later, those who had accounts in the bank when it folded are getting the meager returns.

Sending the checks out was the Texas Department of Banking.

FISH
 If you have a stock pond that need stocking with fish, we have application cards for fish in our office.
 We have had numerous telephone calls in Pampa about the procedure for obtaining the fish. They are free for the asking. They are provided by the State Game and Fish Commission.
 Their closest fish hatchery is Dundee, Texas, and most of the shipments are made from there. They are delivered to the county seat once or twice yearly.
 If you do apply for fish, you will be sent a notice telling you when the truck will be in the county seat.
DON'T BE LATE
 Usually these trucks are right on time. Just as soon as the fish are distributed they leave immediately. This is necessary for two reasons: They keep a tight schedule. The second reason is the fact that the fish will die if

not placed in a pond in a certain length of time.
 I've seen a lot of people get out of snuff because they were late, and the Game and Fish truck had just left.
RAIN
 There is nothing like windy, dusty, dry weather to make people have long faces.
 There is a very much over-worked term these days that goes like this: "There's nothing wrong with the cow business that a good rain won't cure."

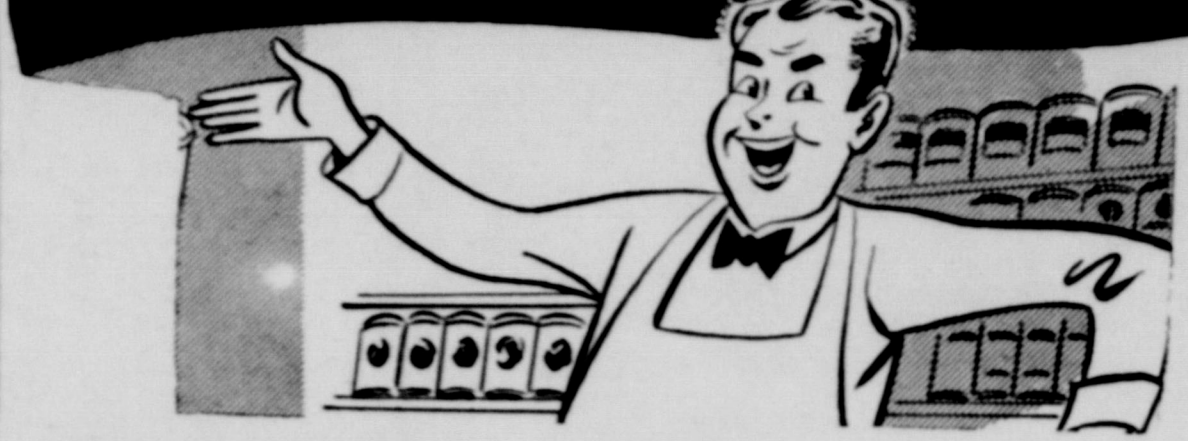
