To Play Basketball for Indians

Welch Takes OCU Scholarship

Derrith Welch, McLean's All-State basketball player, has accepted a four-year scholarship to attend Oklahoma City University.

Sought by several colleges and universities which place emphasis on basketball, Welch made up his mind this week to play for the OCU Chiefs.

Oklahoma City University has long been one of the nation's top basketball schools.

Welch is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Welch and will graduate next week from McLean High School.

Coach Derral Davis, who has tutored the Tigers through the past four years—all of Welch's high school career—said Wednesday he was very pleased to see the youth choose Oklahoma City University.

"It will be close enough for us to all go over and see Derrith play," Davis said. "I'm happy OCU thought enough of Derrith to offer him a scholarship, and I'm pleased that he is staying so close to McLean."

"Derrith is the first boy I've had to go on to college on a basketball scholarship, and I'm real tickled about it," Davis added.

The coach also pointed out that Welch is the first youth he has coached who was selected to play in the Texas Schoolboy All-Star Basketball Classic.

He was chosen for this honor by the High School Coaches Association.

The classic is scheduled for Aug. 7 in Fort Worth.

Welch received All-State honors the past two years and was on the All-District 2-A team for three years. He also was named one of the outstanding players in the U.S. by a nationally circulated sports magazine last year.

The six-foot-six youth has the highest scoring average of any player in the All-Star Classic. In the 1963-64 season, he scored 897 points in 27 games for an average of 33.2.

TREW LAUDED FOR WORK IN CONSERVATION

Delbert Trew, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Trew of Alanreed, has been named the Ochiltree County Soil Conservation District's outstanding conservation farmer of the year.

Trew received a special award last Friday at the annual Bankers Award Banquet in Perryton.

Trew was chosen for the honor, according to the Ochiltree SCD, "because he has done more conservation work on other people's land than most people do on their own."

An SCD article listing the reasons Trew was named the outstanding conservation farmer continues:

"He is a tenant farmer, but takes pride in the land and does not like to see it wash or blow.

'Steady Pace'
"Conservation work has been going at a very steady pace all year for Delbert. He started in March of 1963 by planting 128 acres of grass on some rolling and shallow land of his grandfather's. C. B. Trew. Later he built a fence to protect this area from grazing while it is being established. He has recently started the construction of a farm pond on this place.

"In July, he benched leveled 30 acres of land on his land, Chris Brune's place. In October, he built a five-acre grassed waterway to take care of outside water and to empty a diversion.

"A tract of land owned by the Swingle and Outters was next for him to help improve. In November he planted a 5,400-foot diversion structure to increase water intake and prevent wind erosion. He farms on the contour with the diversions on the places he farms and uses his grass properly.

"Trew is interested in helping all phases of agriculture in the county. He worked hard to get a small plot of land for the Future Farmers of America Chapter to carry out projects and demonstrations."

Best Offer From Amarillo Firm

The J. C. Page Construction Co. of Amarillo was apparent low bidder today on the construction of the new McLean Hospital.

Page's offer of \$150,774 was the lowest received by the Gray County Commissioners court, which opened bids at 2 p.m. today.

On Alternate No. 1, installation of facilities to pipe oxygen into each room—Page bid \$2,990. The company offered to complete the project in 240 days.

County Commissioner Truitt Johnson of McLean telephoned the results of the bid opening to the News, and at press-time no contract had been awarded.

Johnson said the commissioners will study the bids and check with the low bidder before letting the contract.

A total of nine bids were submitted, ranging to a high of \$168,600.

McLean was represented among the bidders. Kenneth Hambricht, local builder, submitted a figure of \$161,037 on the project, with Alternate No. 1 offered at an additional \$3,603.

Dr. Durham, on the Texas Tech faculty for several years, is well known for his research and experiments in livestock and poultry.

TV FRANCHISE IS AMENDED

An ordinance amending the McLean Community TV System's franchise was approved Tuesday night by the city commission.

At the request of Dale Greenhouse, owner of the system, the franchise was amended to permit residents who desire to have their homes connected to the television cable without paying the \$40 connection fee formerly required.

As amended, the franchise sets the rate at \$6.50 per month without the connection fee or \$4.75 for those who prefer to pay the fee.

Greenhouse pointed out that the change makes it possible for persons moving to McLean for only a short time to receive cable service without having to pay the \$40 fee.

During their monthly business session Tuesday, the city aldermen also discussed cleaning up the local dumpground.

The commission authorized Mayor John C. Haynes to make arrangements to hire a bulldozer to clean up the grounds, located at the east edge of the city.

Plans call for the burying of the debris at the dumpgrounds in a sanitary land-fill project.

Bike Safety Drive Will Be Saturday

Scotchlite safety strips will be attached to bumpers of bicycles by the Junior Chamber of Commerce in McLean Saturday.

The bike safety project is scheduled from 2 to 5 p.m. in front of the Southwestern Public Service Co. building on Main Street.

All bicycle owners are invited to bring their bicycles to the safety check, according to Bob Subbelfield, Jaycee president.

There will be no charge for the Scotchlite. A strip will be put on the front fender and a strip on the back fender of each bicycle.

D. W. Swain has completed 37 acres of graded borders on his farm south of Kingsmill. These borders are level from side to side, and have a grade in the direction the water flows.

These borders will allow for a uniform distribution of water. D. W. will plant his 37 acres to Midland bermudagrass. Border irrigation is best suited for watering crops such as alfalfa, wheat and grasses.

A pit-type pond was completed on the Jack Bailey Farm northeast of McLean. A pond and diversion terrace were also completed on the Jinks Shaw Farm west of McLean.

C. M. Herrington is constructing diversion and standard terraces on his farm west of McLean. C. M. is carrying out a complete conservation plan under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

A diversion terrace was completed for Bob Massey on his farm west of McLean.

An irrigation ditch was staked

for Irvin Cole on his farm south of Pampa. Irvin recently completed a new irrigation well on this farm.

Ercy Cubine seeded an old cultivated field on his stock farm west of McLean to sidecoats grama, Indiangrass and mixed bluestem. These are native grasses.

This old field had not produced any grazing. It had grown up in junk grasses such as silver bluestem, needle grass and sand dropseed. Ercy ran wide sweeps under the junk grass and then drilled the native grass mixture into the existing cover.

Ercy is doing this conservation work under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

RM 2857 Project Contract Awarded

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COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A & M COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

PRICKLYPEAR CONTROL

Tom Rogers, who farms just east of Pampa, called about methods of controlling pricklypear.

There is an old established method of taking a spade or other device and grubbing them from the ground. A much newer and less back-breaking method is through the use of a spray.

Four pounds of 2,4,5-T herbicidal spray mixed in 50 gallons of diesel sprayed to the point of slight runoff will kill these pests. We mailed Tom a copy of Leaflet 414, entitled "Brush Control with 2,4,5-T."

PRE-EMERGENT SPRAYS FOR COTTON

Irvin Cole plans to use one of the new pre-emergent sprays on his cotton this year. These sprays can save up to \$12 to \$15 per acre in hand hoe bills. It requires some additional rigging if applied at the time of planting.

We are attempting to get some assistance from Dr. Allen Wiese, agronomist, Bushland Experiment Station.

CATTLE OILERS

Glen McConnell, Pampa, was by our office last week talking cattle oilers. At his request we wrote Dr. R. E. Patterson, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station headquarters, to see if they would be interested in testing the type cattle oiler which Glen has been selling in this area.

BEEF CATTLE IMPORTS

I was visiting with a good friend recently that I enjoy arguing with a great deal. He took issue with my letter concerning the beef import situation whereby I quoted figures showing that we sold Australia \$111 million more goods than they sold to us in 1962.

He had some good points. First was that we export very little meat. That the beef cattleman was getting the short end of the deal.

This is very true. However, there would never be any kind of world trade if all we did was trade like products for like products. For instance, what is the point in the U.S. shipping two ship loads of wheat to West Germany if we are to receive two ship loads of wheat of like quality in return?

The only way a beef cattleman can console himself on this issue is the fact that a great many beef cattlemen are also wheat farmers. One-half of this beef cattleman's wheat was exported to foreign countries in 1963.

Chances are three out of every

four bushels of a High Plains wheat farmer's production went into export because of its high quality for milling.

Large quantities of our milo production in the High Plains are being shipped all over the world. Japan is one of the larger importers.

In return manufacturers in the U.S. of transistor radios, etc., have had some severe economic adjustments to make. Many of them have put factories in Japan and other foreign nations.

Increased world trading by the U.S. has drawn bi-partisan support for a number of years.

The second thing my friend mentioned was the fact that beef imports were hurting beef cattle prices in the U.S.

No one will deny this. The USDA in its November, 1963 issue of "Livestock and Meat Situation Report" stated that a 20 per cent increase in meat imports over the 1962 level would probably result in a drop of 80 to 90 cents per 100 pounds on cows in this country.

Many beef cattlemen producers believe prices have been depressed far more than the USDA estimate. However, there is some indication the USDA figures might be over-estimating the drop in prices as a result of a given volume of imports.

For instance, choice steers averaged \$26.08 per CWT in Chicago during January and February of 1964. Prices of choice steers in January-February, 1964, had dropped to an average of \$21.92.

Beef imports were 11 per cent less in January-February, 1964, than during the same period in 1963.

Thus, while beef imports averaged 11 per cent less in January-February, 1964, as compared to the same period in 1963, a drop in cattle prices of over \$4 per CWT occurred.

Too many feedlots, too many cattle in U.S. (106 million, as of Jan. 1, 1964), too many fat cattle in U.S. make the meat import situation look like a snorter dwarf.

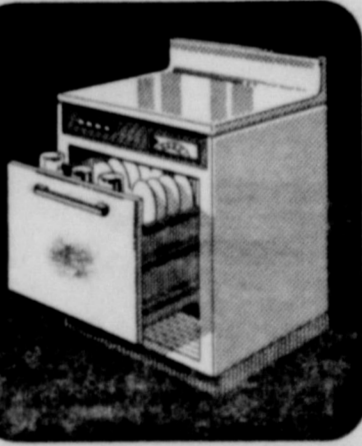

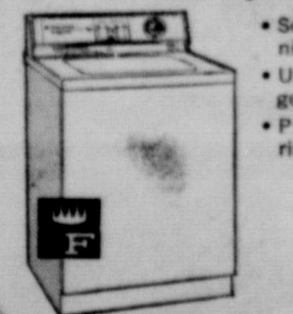

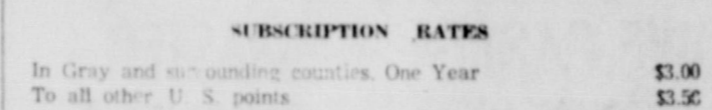
