## Just Between Us

That "pore old" Texas Constitution will really be undergoing some changes this fall, if the state voters go along with the Legislature's thinking.

Texas will go to the polls on Nov. 2 to vote on at least six, and possibly 18 amendments.

According to Vern Sanford, manager of the Texas Press Association, six proposals for constitutional amendments already have cleared the Legislature, and 10 to 12 others appear to have a good chance of being approved before the end of the session.

Senators and representatives introduced 128 proposals for amendments.

Most interest will be centered on the proposal to increase to four years the terms of governor, lieutenant governor and other officials elected statewide.

As much as we approve of many of Gov. John Connally's proposals for the state, we don't particularly care for this one.

The four-year term would be easier to take, if these officials could not succeed themselves.

Other proposed amendments to be decided by the voters next Nov. 2 would:

Extend the Veterans Land Program.

Permitting the Legislature to set the salaries of the lieutenant governor and speaker of the House (at whatever level the Legislature chooses) and raise its own per diem expense allowance from \$12 a day for 120 days to \$20 a day for 140 days.

Allow the state to issue bonds for loans to college students.

Exempt Hermann Hospital in Houston from payment of ad valorem taxes.

Permit the teacher retirement system to invest its money in corporation stocks, as well as in bonds.

That per diem expense allowance business would almost double the amount legislators now receive. The cost per lawmaker now is \$1,400; if the amendment passes, this would increase to \$2,800.

Of course, this is in addition to the \$4000 per month salary paid to the senators and representatives.

We're wondering how the legislators managed to vote themselves retirement pay a couple of years ago without the approval of the people who put them in office.

To refresh your memory, the retirement plan provides for a senator or representative who serves eight years to draw \$100 per month the rest of his life when he leaves office—either by being defeated at the polls or voluntarily stepping down.

Now, if the lawmaker survives the political wars past the eighth year, then his retirement pay increases \$10 per month for each additional year.

With the state so hard-pressed for cash, it seems the lawmakers' interest would be on other matters more than on helping themselves to what little money there is.

## LOWRANCE IS GIN MANAGER

### Holland Retires After 11 Years

Henry Lowrance of Erick, Okla., has been employed as manager of the McLean Gin, replacing B. F. Holland.

Lowrance took over operation of the gin on Monday, and he and his wife will establish residence in McLean soon.

The couple has one son, who is a teacher in Altus, Okla. Lowrance, who has 16 years of experience in the ginning business, said Wednesday that extensive work is planned at the McLean Gin to prepare the equipment for the 1965 cotton harvest.

Holland, manager of the local gin for 11 years, is retiring. His resignation was accepted last week by Ivy Brown, manager of the Chickasha Gins Corp., Elk City, Okla., Division.

Holland came to McLean from Briscoe, where he had managed the Chickasha Gin for 12 years. He has been in the ginning business since 1925.

Mr. and Mrs. Holland own their home in McLean, but he said Wednesday that their plans are indefinite.

"I plan to get in a lot of fishing, though," Holland said.

## Thunderstorm Brings .19 Inch of Moisture

The annual spring thunderstorms started moving across the Panhandle early this week, and McLean benefitted with some moisture from the first showers Monday afternoon.

While the city was under a severe weather alert, a thunderstorm sped over the area, leaving light hail and .19 inch of rain.

It was the first moisture in May and increased to 2.85 inches. On total received here in 1965. On this date a year ago McLean had recorded 3.64 inches.

April was considerably wetter this year than in 1964. A total of 1.46 inches of rain was measured last month, compared with .02 in April, 1964.

### MAYOR ASKS ALL RESIDENTS TO TAKE PART

"McLean Clean-up Week" begins next Monday, and Mayor Boyd Meador has asked all residents to participate by cleaning up and beautifying their property.

Two "Haul-Away Days" have been designated by the city commission. City employees will haul trash, tree limbs, etc., to the dump grounds without charge on Friday and Saturday of next week.

All residents are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to clean up their property.

The special week was set by proclamation of Mayor Meador. His proclamation states:

Whereas, the residents of the City of McLean take great pride in the appearance and cleanliness of their city and property; and

Whereas, each year the residents of the City of McLean, in a spirit of cooperation and community pride, participate in a clean-up week to clean up, beautify and fix up their respective properties; and

#### Join Together

Whereas, two days of said week are to be designated when all residents will join together with their trucks, pickups and wagons to haul away trash and rubbish accumulated in the cleaning, painting and repairing of said property; and

Whereas, as Mayor of the City of McLean, acting by and through the authority vested in me by the City Commission, I do desire to set the time for the clean-up week for the year 1965;

I, the Mayor of the City of McLean, do hereby proclaim and ordain that the week of May 10-15 be, and is hereby set aside as McLean's CLEAN-UP WEEK for the purpose of cleaning, painting, repairing and beautifying the property, streets and parks of the City of McLean and do further designate Friday and Saturday, May 14 and 15, as HAUL-AWAY DAYS.

White Supremacy.  
Protection of pure womanhood.  
Just Laws and Liberty.  
Closer relationship of pure Americanism.

The upholding of the Constitution of these United States.

The Sovereignty of our State Rights.

The Separation of Church and State.

Freedom of Speech and Press.

Closer Relationship between Capital and American Labor.

Preventing the causes of mob violence and lynchings.

Preventing unwarranted strikes by foreign labor agitators.

Prevention of fires and destruction of property by lawless elements.

The limitation of foreign immigration.

The much needed local reforms.

Law and order.

in several newspapers, points out that the "Communists have taken over the 'Civil Rights' movement."

According to Anderson, "The first thing Ralph Bunche said on TV after the completion of the march (to Montgomery, Ala.), was: 'By God, we are here!'"

Anderson goes on to say: "It is not surprising that our representative to the godless United Nations should thus use God's name in vain, publicly."

"At the International Organizations' Employees Loyalty Board hearings (a committee established by President Eisenhower) in May, 1954, both Manning Johnson and Leonard Patterson testified under oath that they knew Ralph Bunche as a Communist."

In one of his recent columns, Anderson names some of the other personalities and institutions represented in that march:

... Mario Savio, one of the prime instigators of recent University of California riots at Berkeley, wherein students demanded the right to stop obscene four-letter words on campus bulletin boards and opposed any restrictions on political and sexual activity; Unitarians of Washington, D. C.; James Baldwin, writer of obscene books; ... John Davis, a white male wanted in Florida for rape and for parole violation and passing worthless checks in Georgia; Joseph Rauh Jr., head of ADA and disciple of H.H.H. (Hubert H. Humphrey); Carl Braden, member of many pro-Communist groups; Rev. C. T. Vivian, who was a speaker at the 14th anniversary dinner of the National Guardian, a Communist paper in New York, which has been identified by HUAC as a "virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia"; John Love, Negro from New York and project director for S.N.I.C.K., who wore lipstick, earrings and high heel shoes while appearing as a government witness in federal court in Selma in December, 1964 (this "man" received an invitation to President Johnson's inaugural ball, so he must be accepted in social circles); Bayard Rustin, convicted homosexual and Martin Luther King's longtime lieutenant. The wags call Rustin Martin Luther Queen."

Anderson asks if it would be "bigoted to wonder whether a true man of God would surround himself with sex perverts, criminals and Communists?"

"I do not know nor do I particularly care whether Martin Luther King is a Communist," Anderson continues. "But I believe he is as apt to be a Communist as a Christian. And no one can be both. Does a real Christian belong to and support pro-Communist groups? King has and does. I believe in guilt by association. If he looks like a duck, waddles like a duck, quacks like a duck, swims like a duck and lays duck eggs, I don't believe him when he claims to be a rooster."

The column concludes with: "'Civil Rights' means perhaps the beginning of the end of state government and individual freedom in America."

As this is written, no one can tell if the Vietnam situation will wind up with complete U. S. withdrawal, continuation of status quo, or major warfare.

But whatever happens, there is going to be criticism. Unfortunately, the criticism will be directed at some recent act, either committed, or not committed. This is wrong in perspective.

International bargaining is a great deal like playing poker. This is especially true when the monstrous enemy of communism stalks the world. In a poker game nobody who believes the fellow across the table holds a royal flush will raise the ante.

If the American nation is to be the stabilizing force of the Western World then there must never be doubt American leadership holds flush cards.

In Vietnam American servicemen were slaughtered. This fact precludes everything else. The nation struck back on a limited basis to establish that the U.S. will refuse to accept the killing of Americans.

But immediately, mass demonstrations against that American action were undertaken, practically free of molestation, in U.S. cities. State Politicians fired telegrams all around the world seeking foreign support for these protests.

No one knows for sure what the impact of this evidence of National Federation of Independent Business

internal revolting accomplished abroad to tear down the American image. It must be born in mind that in both European and Asiatic wars, each side has depended upon treason, internal revolt, and other factors as a weapon for victory. In World War I the Germans provided safe, secret conduct for Lenin from exile into Russia, knowing that he would be more valuable to the German war effort against Russia than several divisions.

This should give many politicians some moments of serious consideration and reappraisal. All who have either encouraged, or condoned mass demonstrations, rioting, seizure of public property by students or any other group, are guilty of spilling American blood.

While this is not an attempt to appraise the Eisenhower years, it is significant that during those years there was a better than average world tranquillity.

This is no doubt due to the image projected by this singularly uncomplicated personality. He knew and abhorred war. Yet there was no question in anyone's mind that he was a pushover.

Whether one agreed or not with his administration is immaterial. What is material is that he never encouraged mass demonstration, or any manifestations of civil disobedience to curry favor with any group of present or potential voters. No one, on either side of the Iron Curtain could gain the idea that there existed any divided American will.

Moral integrity does have superiority over political acumen.

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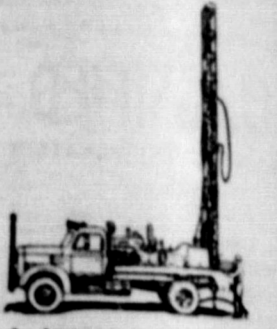
