Whether this will be enough to get the Southwestern Public Service Co. manager, we don't know.

But he did sound at mid-week like he wasn't too eager to continue his football career.

Following Monday's workout, there was a line of waiting players at the Tigers' whirlpool, as muscles and bones began to ache.

All this effort by the over-age football players is for a good cause, though. The local Lions will pay the Shamrock Lions in a flag football tussle at Duncan Field Saturday, Oct. 19.

It should be interesting, as well as exciting.

No one seems able to explain just why, but we've never seen more and apartments in a town fill up so quickly as they have in McLean.

It was less than a year ago that a survey revealed more than 20 vacant houses and apartments in our city. We know of only one during the past 10 days there have been three persons by the McLean News office asking for assistance in finding places to live.

Two were women—one from Borjone, the other from Shamrock—who have jobs at the Marie Foundations factory. The third housekeeper was a man from Amarillo wanting to move to McLean.

We tried to find suitable residences for each, but to no avail.

An increase in drilling activity in this area has caused part of the influx of new residents. Highway work has moved still others here.

But we doubt that this explains all of the population rise. It's a real fine feeling, knowing that things are on the move again in McLean. Such a shortage of housing could become serious, however, and delay further growth.

Two new homes are well on their way to being completed. The attractive and spacious new residence of the George Saunders family at the Elton Johnsons should be ready for occupancy by early November.

Winners in the McLean Grade School and Junior High Fire Prevention Week poster and theme contests will receive their awards in a special assembly Friday morning in the gymnasium.

## Tigers Will Return to Action At Wheeler Friday Night

In near-perfect condition after a two-week rest, the McLean Tigers face their final non-district test of the season Friday night when they invade Wheeler.

Kickoff is scheduled for 8 p.m. Wheeler's Mustangs, with a perfect record for the season, eased to a 28-0 victory over Follett last Friday night, while the Tigers were taking a breather.

Showing real offensive and defensive power, the Mustangs' first team scored four quick touchdowns soon after the game opened, then rested while the substitutes played Follett to a standstill.

The Class B Mustangs have rolled over each of their opponents this season by wide point margins.

In their last tilt, Coach Derral Davis' Tigers were handed their first defeat, 14-0 by White Deer.

In Wheeler the Bengals will be facing one of the heaviest lines and speediest backfields they'll collide with all season.

However, Coach Davis said Wednesday that McLean should be in top condition for Friday's tussle at Wheeler.

**'Riddle of Light' Demonstration Due Twice on Tuesday**  
Glen Scott, public information supervisor for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., is scheduled to present two "Riddle of Light" demonstrations in McLean next Tuesday.

So it will speak at a high school assembly at 9:30 a.m. and also at the Lions Club luncheon at noon in the Methodist Church.

A true-to-life replica of Telstar, the Bell System's communications satellite that brought "live" television programs from Europe, will be featured in the demonstration of space communications.

George Newberry, local manager for Southwestern Bell, said Scott will show a scale model of Telstar and explain how light from the sun provides the power it needs to relay telephone conversations, television and other signals to the other side of the world.

**Optical Maser**  
The audience will also see a replica of an optical maser, an invention by Bell Telephone Laboratories researchers that is regarded as a major scientific achievement, ranking with the development of the transistor in importance.

Scott will tell how the maser produces a special kind of light capable of simultaneously transmitting millions of telephone conversations on a small beam.

"In addition to its tremendous communications uses," Newberry said, "the maser has important possibilities in many other fields, such as medicine and scientific studies."

## Architect Hired For New Hospital Here

The Amarillo architectural firm of Shiver and Meger has been employed as architects for the new McLean Hospital.

In a special meeting last Friday in Pampa, the Gray County commissioners court voted to approve the recommendation of the county hospital board in hiring the architect.

Members of the hospital board also met Friday to make their recommendation.

Shiver and Meger will prepare final plans and specifications and also supervise construction of the

hospital. The architectural firm is expected to have its work on the hospital plans completed within a few weeks.

Upon completion of the architectural plans, the commissioners will advertise for bids on the new building.

Gray County property owners voted a \$150,000 bond issue on July 16 to pay for the new two-story structure to be constructed in McLean.

The building will join the present McLean Clinic, which also is owned by the county, on the north to form a 24-bed hospital, complete with

operating room.

The McLean city commission recently purchased a five-lot tract of land at Fourth and Main from the Holloway Estate for use as a parking area for the new hospital.

The property is located almost directly across the street from the new hospital site.

During their meeting Friday, the county commissioners also awarded a contract to Sullins Plumbing Co. of Pampa to repair the heating and air-conditioning system at Highland General Hospital in Pampa. Sullins' bid was \$34,847.75.

## CANADIAN IS FOE TONIGHT FOR THE CUBS

Coach Bob Schneider's McLean Junior High Cubs thrashed Memphis' Whirlwinds 22-8 here last Thursday for their second district victory.

The locals travel to Canadian tonight for what may be their toughest district game, with kickoff time scheduled for 7 p.m.

Coach Schneider said Wednesday that Canadian reportedly has one of the strongest junior high teams in the district.

The McLean Cubs, fresh from a 50-32 win over Clarendon, held the Memphis youngsters scoreless until late in the game.

It took just three plays after the on-kickoff for the Cubs to chalk up their first score.

**Fuller Scores**  
Steve Fuller, hard-running McLean fullback, had raced from his own 35 to the Memphis 20 on the first play, and Halfback Jimmy Hester moved the ball to the 14.

Fuller got the touchdown on his next carry, with 6:59 remaining in the first quarter. The conversion failed, but McLean still had a 6-0 lead.

Joe Redwine, Calvin Van Huss, Randy Richards, Bryan Goings, Fuller and Hester played tough on defense to keep Memphis bottled up on the visitors' series of downs, and McLean was in possession again on the Cubs' 31.

Fuller broke loose on the local's first play from scrimmage and galloped all the way. Quarterback Butch Davis crossed into the end zone for the two-point conversion, fashioning a 14-0 margin for McLean with 3:31 to go in the first period.

# NEWS OF CONSERVATION

R. W. Adams completed a well on his farm west of Kellerville. Also he recently completed a pond for better distribution of grazing. F. E. Bull plans to construct two ponds and a well on his ranch west of Letors.

Dependable livestock water is essential in a good range management program.

E. J. Bradley has completed two more terraces on his farm south of Pampa. He has done a lot of conservation work to control water erosion in the past few months.

**Range Management**—Native grass is very important in a well-planned stock program to provide roughage for livestock during cold winter months. Cured grasses in most cases is the same as untreated hay; however, grass covered is essential for protection of young grass seedlings as well as mature plants.

The residue protects the plants from freezing and the soil from wind and water erosion. The expression of leaving grass to get green is very true. Range managers realize that maximum production comes from strong healthy plants. To maintain a healthy plant, adequate grass residue should be left for plant protection and to keep the root system in a healthy state of growth.

It has been determined through experience and experiments that to obtain maximum range production, 50 per cent of the current year's growth by weight of native grasses should be left for plant and soil

protection.

### SCREW-WORM PROGRAM

During the week of Sept. 22-28 in 1963 there were 225 cases of screw-worms in Texas. During the same period a year earlier there were 1,288 cases.

In checking, I found some very interesting facts that concern the screw-worm program and its magnitude.

Over 107 million sterile flies were dispersed during the week of Sept. 22-28, 1963. To produce 75 million flies, the following amounts of material are necessary—40 tons of meat, 4,000 to 5,000 gallons of blood and 13,000 gallons of water.

You can see why it will cost \$12 million to eradicate the pest in the Southwest.

### CATTLE PRICES

Although we predicted earlier a drop in cattle prices for this fall, we did not believe that it would be nearly as severe as is being talked.

As has been pointed out by our extension economist, Mr. John McIlhenny, a spreading drought could be the key to whether prices would hold or fall drastically.

The drought covers the entire Southwest. I am hearing a lot of people say from in the north of Fort Worth and in the San Antonio country this is the driest year on record.

If we could get a three-inch rain all over Texas, I believe you would see one of the fastest recoveries in the stocker-calf business that you have ever seen.

Actually, the condition could change overnight. Most people have their wheat up to a good stand all over the Panhandle. An inch of rain will make wheat pasture for some that have had good summer rains.

Personally, I believe it would pay a cattleman who still has his calves to hold for that October rain that usually gets here in the neck of time.

## WALTER ROGERS REPORTS

### CUBAN SITUATION REPORT

Cuba remains a Communist thorn in the side of the Western Hemisphere, but progress is being made to bring about the economic and political isolation of the Castro regime, to make Cuba an increasingly expensive burden for the Sino-Soviet bloc to maintain and to prevent the spread of Castro-directed subversion in Latin America.

Guerrillas within Cuba are becoming more active. Hit-and-run actions by small bands of Cuban patriots will not in themselves bring down the Castro regime.

But they keep it off balance. They keep the Red militia under arms and out of more productive endeavors that could bolster the faltering Cuban economy. They provide a nucleus around which a more active resistance movement may someday form. These anti-Castro activities on the island are said to have "a professional touch."

As if to punctuate the increasing discontent within Cuba, a bomb exploded in Havana a week ago as Fidel Castro told a political rally that the United States is, in his words, "tightening the economic problems afflicting the few factual statements he made in what otherwise was the usual Castro diatribe against the United States."

I am in favor of every action we can take, alone and in concert with our allies, to restore freedom to Cuba. I believe that continuing pressure on the economic and political front can one day bring this result without the need for overt military action.

Here are facts pointing out the economic problems afflicting the Castro regime: Cuban trade to the free world has slowed to a trickle. Free world exports to Cuba in 1962, Castro's first year in power, totaled \$580 million; in 1963 they were \$85 million and declining this year.

Free world purchases from Cuba, primarily sugar, have similarly declined. Cuba's trade with the Communist bloc (Cuba now does more than four-fifths of her trade with the Communist world) will total \$1 billion, \$500 million in bloc exports to Cuba and about \$400 million in Cuban shipments to the bloc.

This trade gap must be financed by the Soviets, and it is expected to be equally large next year. The Cuban gross national product last year was estimated to be 25 per cent below the 1958 level.

With most basic foodstuffs rigidly rationed, the average caloric intake of Cubans is estimated to be 15 to 25 per cent lower than it was in pre-Castro years. Consumer goods are in short supply. Spare parts for the Cuban industrial

machine are scarce and often unobtainable.

The Castro failure has been most apparent in agriculture, particularly in the production of sugar. This year's harvest was 3.8 million tons in contrast with the average of five million tons in the last five years.

Castro in betraying his own people has yoked Cuba to the modern-day of Soviet imperialism. Russia uses its colony, Cuba, as a source of raw materials and a captive market for manufacturers.

These are among recent actions taken to cause Castro further trouble.

On July 8 the Treasury Department instituted blocking controls against Cuba, restricting the movement of dollars to and from Cuba. The action, modeled on controls in effect against Communist China and North Korea, is expected to tie up more than \$100 million of Cuban assets.

United States owned and controlled oil companies are voluntarily refraining from furnishing bunkers to vessels and aircraft determined to be in the Cuban trade.

Free world shipping available for service to Cuba has dropped nearly 70 per cent in the first eight months of 1963 as compared to the same period last year. Free world ships paid only 28 calls to Cuba in August, a marked decrease over the 45 calls made in July and the lowest monthly figure since March.

Earlier increases were related to the seasonal export of sugar—and many ships arrived in Cuba in ballast. Shipping to Cuba is more and more becoming restricted to small firms having no commerce with the United States and firms with vessels under long-term charter to the Sino-Soviet bloc.

To cripple further Cuba's ability to trade I introduced a bill in the House of Representatives to close U. S. ports to any ships engaged in carrying cargoes to or from Cuba. This bill is now before the House Foreign Affairs Committee, and I believe its enactment would tighten the screw. There is no question but that the blight of Castro-ism must be eliminated.

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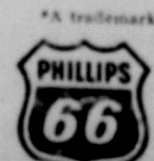

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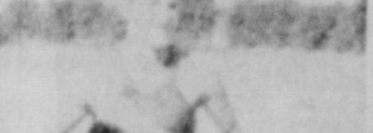
