



Thus, all attention will be focused on California when the needs for harvest labor reach their peak. For in California alone, there is over a million tons of tomatoes, a half mil-lion tons of peaches, more than 21/2 million tons of grapes, not to mention pears, apricots, and other crops which must be picked and processed when ripe

It is expected that the union will now have a field day, and either crops will rot in the fields and orchards unharvestwill be most prohibitive.



Loss of credit earned under Social Security may be the result of using an incorrect Social Security number," warned Hal Geldon, Social Security district man-

"Do not depend on memory; be sure every employer actually sees the social security card," he said, When an employe gives his employer an incorrect Social Security number it may prevent the employer from properly reporting the wages paid the employe. This will, at best, delay the posting of the employe's earnings to his social security record.

Gelden stated that there is no need for an individual to memorize the Social Security number issued to him. If the card is lost it can easily be replaced by the Social Security Admisistration after he completes a simple application form. The application forms are available at any Post Office, as well as any Social Security Administration office.




