

There are literally hundreds of uses for the remaining 15% of the corn crop. The "dry milling" industry, for instance, makes corn meal, hominy, and breakfast foods of many kinds.

Feed manufacturers take a lot of this 15% of the corn crop and put it into concentrated rations for livestock and poultry. Distillers turn their share into alcohol. Corn refiners grind about 150 million bushels of corn a






