METHODISTS TO FURNISH ROOM AT HOSPITAL

Commissioners Set Sale of Bonds For Monday, Aug. 26

The McLean Methodist Church has voted to furnish one of the rooms in the new hospital to be constructed here.

Members of the church's official board decided in a meeting Monday night to purchase furnishings for the room, according to Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor.

Special envelopes are being prepared for the congregation to make contributions to the project. The Methodists thus became the first church organization to take such action.

Meanwhile, another step toward construction of the new hospital was taken last Thursday by the county commissioners court.

Interest Bids

In their regular first-of-the-month meeting, commissioners set 2 p.m. Aug. 26 as the date for the sale of the \$150,000 worth of bonds voted to construct the hospital.

Interest bids on the bonds will be opened in the county courtroom at that time.

As set up by the firm preparing the bond issue, the bonds are to be paid off at the rate of \$25,000 the first two years and \$30,000 each of the next two years.

The first payment will be due next Feb. 15, and the payment date is to be Feb. 15 each of the three succeeding years.

County Commissioner Truitt Johnson of McLean told The McLean News that by 1967 Gray County (See HOSPITAL, Page 2)

Seniors—8 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesday, Aug. 20.

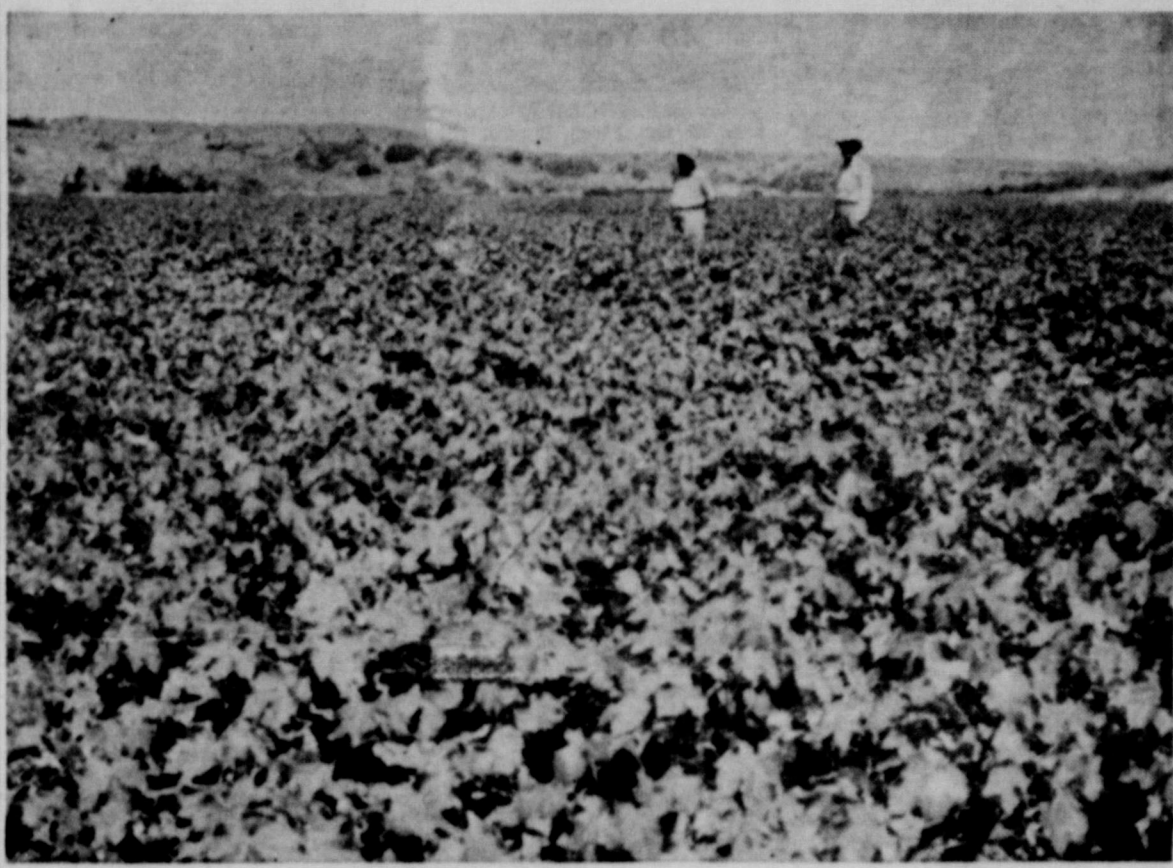
Juniors—1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 20.

Just Between Us

We stand corrected! In this column last week, we noted that nothing apparently had been done to move the McLean hospital project toward the construction stage since Gray County voters approved the \$150,000 bond issue early in July.

Actually, last Thursday—the day the News appeared—the county commissioners court did, indeed, take action.

Our commissioner, Truitt Johnson, telephoned Thursday night to report that the court had set the sale of bonds for 2 p.m. Aug. 26.

Now if the court will hire an architect to prepare the final plans, the project can move right along... and we will be happy.

It would appear, however, that County Judge William J. Craig—with his customary "Pampa yes, McLean no" attitude—will continue to free The McLean News to dig for any information it wishes to print on the subject.

When the commissioners court voted to call the bond election, only the Pampa News was chosen to publish the election proclamation, despite the fact that there are two other legal newspapers in the county—The McLean News and The Lefers Progress.

We discussed this matter with Commissioner Johnson, who in turn brought it to Craig's attention. The judge said he could see no reason for publishing the proclamation in any other newspaper. One would do... and, naturally, that one was the Pampa paper.

A legal publication also is required announcing the forthcoming sale of the bonds. You can easily imagine where it, too, will be published. (See JBU, Page 2)

RAIN STILL SCARCE HERE

Disappointed McLeaneites watched thunderheads cross the area Wednesday afternoon, leaving no more than a few drops of much needed moisture.

But the clouds did lower temperatures quickly, and remained around later in the day to give hope of showers.

The official Weather Bureau thermometer had edged to within a fraction of a degree of 100 shortly before 2 p.m. Wednesday, but fell back quickly when the potential rainmakers softened the sun's rays.

Drew Word of Alanreed is the second rancher to report a case of screwworms in Gray County, according to County Agent Foster Whaley.

The Word place was marked Tuesday with a 50-foot cross of lime, and another aerial drop of sterile flies has probably been made there by today.

2 McLean Students On Tech Honor List

Two McLean students at Texas Tech in Lubbock have received certificates for qualifying for the Dean's Honor List during the second semester of the past school term.

James S. Allison, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Allison, and Phyllis Flowers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Flowers, were named to the honor list for attaining grade-point averages of 3.0 or better.

Both will return to Tech next month for the 1963-64 term.

The first screwworms in the county were discovered last week on the Wilbur Lee Wilson Ranch, four miles southwest of McLean. James B. Stephens, stationed in Tampa temporarily for the Screw-worm Eradication Program, rushed to the Wilson Ranch and marked it for the air drop.

The huge 50-foot cross makes the ranch easily identifiable from the air.

A sub-headquarters for the eradication program has been established at Sweetwater, Texas, Whaley reported. Airplanes originate from there and make drops in the area of newly reported infestations.

Stephens calls on the ranchers and assists with spraying of the cattle with one of the latest insecticides. Power sprayers and insecticides are furnished by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation at no cost to the individual rancher.

Now at Childress Presently the sprayer is headquartered in Childress. If the need arises, it will be brought closer.

To date only one other case has been reported as far north as Gray County. This was in Hutchinson County, and the outbreak was subdued sometime ago.

Meanwhile, highly favorable reports are coming from south Texas, where a 70-mile wide buffer zone has been maintained since late winter. Few or no cases at all have been reported in all of the buffer zone area.

Weekly drops of millions of sterile flies have been maintained for many months in this area.

lished, if it hasn't already been. Then when bids are invited on the construction of the hospital in McLean . . . not in Pampa . . . it is a safe bet that the legal publication will find its way to the Freedom Chain representative in Pampa, as well.

We don't like it, but that's the way it is with the judge. He is quite consistent in his dealings for the county.

Almost since the day we came to McLean three years ago, we have attempted to get this point across to the judge and other county officials: McLean is just as much a part of Gray County as Pampa.

In fact, the only visit we ever paid to Craig's office was to discuss this very subject. Why, we asked, are the business people of McLean ignored when county business is handed out?

There was the expected half-hearted denial, and pressing the point further was in vain.

We were advised to contact the individual county officers.

Knowing more about the lack of county business at The McLean News than anywhere else here, we wrote County Clerk Charlie Thut and later discussed the same subject with the veteran clerk over the telephone.

That informed us that he turns the list of printing, office supply and office furniture needs over to the judge, who—the clerk thought—asked for bids.

Truitt Johnson can never remember seeing any such bids opened in a commissioner's court meeting. So who is getting this thousands of dollars per year worth of business?

By law, bids are not required before the commissioner's court purchases anything costing \$2,000 or less. Frankly, we don't approve of this figure, for this is one big wad of money for any county official to spend without letting the public know it is to be spent. A limit of \$500 or less would be better, in our opinion. But the Texas Legislature has set the \$2,000 figure.

Back to the subject at hand . . . After talking with the county clerk, we wrote the judge to advise him what Thut had said. In the letter, we wrote that we weren't begging for county business; we felt we were entitled to some consideration, and it was our intention to get that consideration. This was possibly some two months ago. To this day we have not received an answer.

If Judge Craig doesn't desire to discuss this matter further with us, a letter to The McLean News addressed to the public would be welcome. We would be most happy to publish such a letter without charge.

Of course, if he doesn't feel an explanation is due, he can choose to forget the whole thing . . . but we won't!

Lt. Howard is to receive nine weeks of training in the fort's finance school before going to Korea.

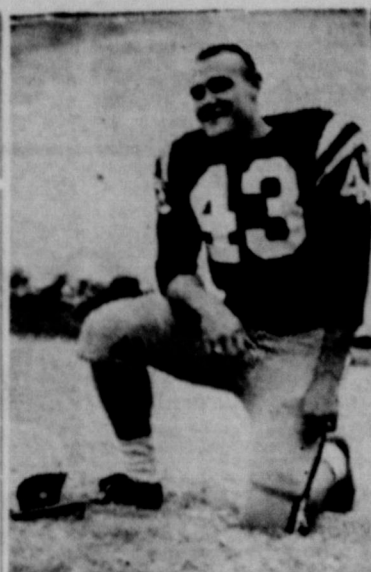

Farm Facts

In a good year, the corn crop totals about 4 billion bushels or more. About 85% of it is fed to hogs, beef cattle, and poultry.

There are literally hundreds of uses for the remaining 15% of the corn crop. The "dry milling" industry, for instance, makes corn meal, hominy, and breakfast foods of many kinds.

Feed manufacturers take a lot of this 15% of the corn crop and put it into concentrated rations for livestock and poultry. Distillers turn their share into alcohol.

Corn refiners grind about 150 million bushels of corn a year and make starch, syrup, sugar, oil, and feeds.

Starch is one of the most important by-products of corn. According to the Corn Industries Research Foundation, about 8% of the average year's output of corn starch goes to U.S. consumers for food and laundry use.

Papermaking consumes about 23 pounds of corn starch per ton. Processing of a bale

of cotton into textiles accounts for an average use of 35 pounds. Starch also is used in foundry molds, "oil well mud," asbestos board, cosmetics, insect powders, soaps, cleaners, match heads, and aspirin.

TERMS A. O. & C. DELAWARE EXTENSION SERVICE

ELM LEAF BEETLE

Earlier we reported a severe infestation of the above named insect.

Clyde Magee has had some shade trees severely damaged, as well as S. A. Cousins and Wilson Boyd. These pests are hard to control and may require more than one spraying.

Because of the damage they are causing I have submitted a separate news release to your editor, which I hope he has a spot for either this week or next. Watch for it.

The article mentions the fact that control measures can be obtained by getting a copy of Leaflet 199. I am placing a few copies of this publication at The McLean News, which are free for the asking.

Since I had only a few copies I will reprint the recommendations below which were taken from this publication.

There are about five different insecticides recommended. I believe I would use a combination of DDT and Malathion. Use two pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder and one pint of 50 per cent Malathion per 100 gallons of water.

Use a power sprayer that can develop enough pressure to thoroughly wet the entire tree. A re-spray application between 10 days and two weeks may be necessary.

After reaching McLean on Tues-

day I had a call waiting for me from Mrs. J. L. Hess. She also was having trouble with insects.

SCREWWORMS

Drew Word has a case of screwworms on his place north of Alameda.

A separate news story in this issue was prepared to explain how the Southwestern Animal Health Research Foundation goes into action when a case is spotted. A free spray job to anyone reporting screwworms is a part of the deal. So we hope everyone will be on the lookout for new cases.

Better still, keep your cattle sprayed with Coral or some other good systematic insecticide and help stamp out screwworms for good.

NEW PUBLICATIONS

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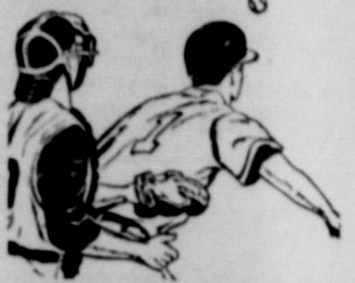

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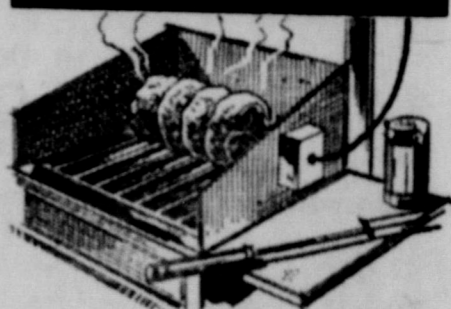
