## C. A. CRYER RITES PENDING

Curtis A. Cryer, former superintendent of schools in McLean, died Tuesday afternoon of a heart attack while on a hunting trip in Gunnison, Colo.

Funeral services were pending Wednesday night in Amarillo, where he had made his home for several years.

Mr. Cryer, born March 22, 1894, in Floresville, Texas, served as superintendent of schools here for nine years before leaving in the early 1940's to become head of the Borger schools.

He was the first president of Frank Phillips College in Borger. He retired in 1955.

A Lions Club member for 33 years, Mr. Cryer was active in the local club while a resident of McLean.

He is survived by his wife, Ethel; one daughter, Mrs. Jane Alice Logan, Portales, N. M.; two sisters, Mrs. Arthie Rothwell, Mt. Vernon, Mo., and Mrs. Altha Stair, Faxon, Okla.; three brothers, Marvin Cryer, Bloomington, Ill., John Cryer, Mt. Vernon, and Dale Cryer, Corpus Christi; his step-mother, Mrs. Ary Wilkerson, Midland, and two grandsons.

## 35 BALES OF COTTON GINNED

Thirty-five bales of cotton had been ginned at the McLean Gin by Wednesday afternoon, and Manager B. F. Holland said the harvest is "right upon us."

Holland said 14 of the bales were brought to the gin by Ervin Cole, who has an irrigated farm near Pampa. Five of the bales were ginned Monday, six Tuesday and three Wednesday.

More local cotton is expected to be harvested in the near future.

D. D. Pennington and Bernard McCellan have defoliated two cotton. Holland said, and the crop should be ready for the stripping machines soon.

All of the cotton brought to the local gin has been of good grade.

### DAY RECEIVES HIGH AWARD AT McALLEN

A quarter of a century has passed since he was quite active in this field, but a McLean resident was honored highly last Friday for contributions to soil conservation efforts in Texas.

Cliff H. Day, now justice of the peace in McLean, received the recognition at the 23rd annual meeting of the Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors in McAllen.

Mr. and Mrs. Day attended the meeting, accompanied by their son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Day of Brownfield.

The certificate of award reads: "This is to affirm that the name of Cliff H. Day is on the honor roll of illustrious Texans who worked selflessly and tirelessly to give Texas its soil conservation law. . . . They served Texas well. . . . Presented at the 23rd annual meeting of the Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors, McAllen, Texas, Oct. 11, 1963."

**Reject Federal Plan**

The certificate is signed by John D. Wells, president of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts, and J. Frank Gray, chairman of the Texas State Soil Conservation Board.

It was in 1937 that the federal government sent a suggested plan for organizing soil conservation in Texas.

But Day, then president of the Texas Farm Bureau and living at Waco, and other agricultural leaders refused to accept this plan, because it would have given the federal government too much control.

As a result, the agricultural leaders themselves prepared a soil conservation law for Texas, making such activities in the state independent of federal controls.

The law was passed by the Texas Legislature in 1939. Day served as Farm Bureau president through the period 1937-39.

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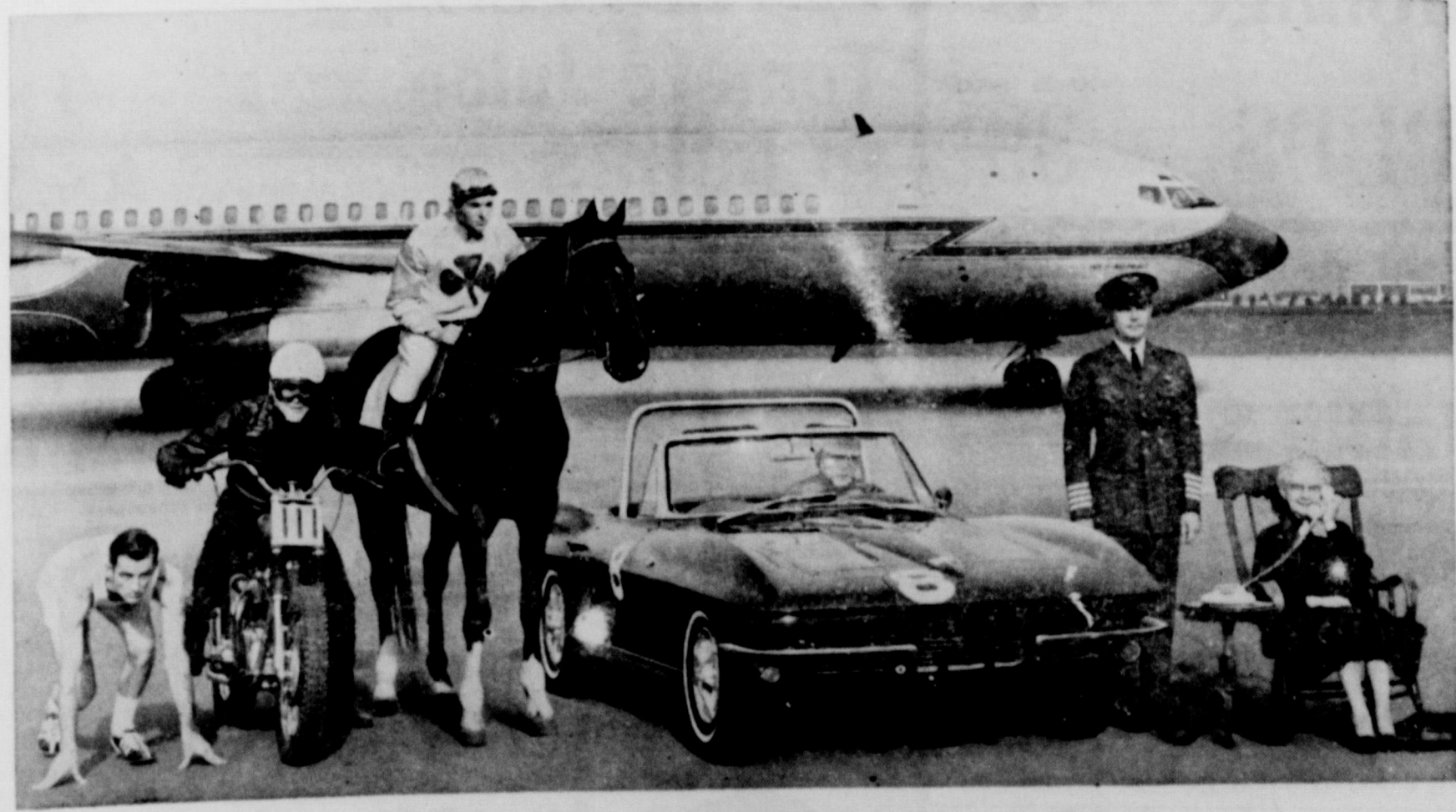

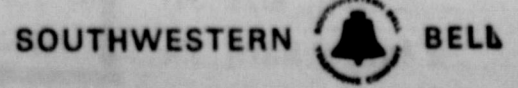

 "The Australian Meat Board reported that the Anna Bakke sailed Sept. 7 to arrive Seattle Oct. 27 with 396,480 pounds beef and 2,240 pounds mutton; Tacoma Oct. 29 with 98,560 pounds beef; Portland Nov. 1 with 365,120 pounds beef; Los Angeles Nov. 7 with 188,160 pounds beef, and San Francisco Nov. 11 with 479,260 pounds beef.

"The Antarctic Ocean sailed Sept. 14 to arrive New Orleans Oct. 10 with 624,960 pounds beef; Philadelphia Oct. 14 with 1,648,640 pounds beef; New York Oct. 16 with 2,105,600 pounds beef and 67,200 pounds mutton; Boston Oct. 18 with 383,040 pounds beef, and Norfolk 253,360 pounds beef to be transhipped.

"The Cap Viland sailed Sept. 15 to arrive Charleston Oct. 9 with 212,800 pounds beef and 11,200 pounds offal; Boston Oct. 13 with 521,920 pounds beef and 31,360 pounds mutton; Norfolk Oct. 15 with 33,600 pounds beef; Philadelphia Oct. 18 with 734,720 pounds beef and 29,120 pounds mutton, and New York Oct. 20 with 2,896,320 pounds beef, 60,480 pounds mutton and 13,440 pounds offal.

The above comes from a weekly USDA market report which I receive. If my seventh grade math is correct this would be the equivalent of 37,948 head of 800 pound slaughter steers. If this same number comes into the U. S. weekly this would mean about two million head are being imported from the Australian area alone.

This added to meat imports from Mexico and many other exporting nations of South America, coupled with a spreading drought, is having its effect on a sick cattle market.

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organizations are very much opposed to this heavy importation of meat products.

One of the big international fights going on now is the fact that certain European nations have banded themselves together under the European Common Market. They are raising the tariff wall on certain agricultural products from this nation that has about wrecked the market of these products.

Chickens are nothing more than a test case. Should they succeed, no doubt other high protective tariffs will be added to give the European farmers a big protection in price.

Thus lowering the price the American farmer gets and raising the price the European farmers get.

Should the American cattleman succeed in getting the protective tariff placed on beef, in effect he would accomplish the same goal as the European chicken farmer.

My knowledge of the complexity of matters on an international basis is too limited to venture an opinion on what is right or wrong.

But it all goes back to the question of whether we shall use high protective tariff, restrict world trade or have free moving world trade.

The auto industry could ask that we make the tariff wall so high the little bugs wouldn't be imported.

What is your opinion?

**COTTON GINNING**

As of Tuesday, Oct. 15, a total of 30 bales of cotton had been ginned at the McLean Gin.

Irvin Cole, who farms south of Pampa, had brought down 12 bales. Irvin said his cotton was turning out about one bale per acre. He has a total of 50 acres of cotton. It was his irrigated cotton which he was harvesting. This has been a most unusual year weatherwise.

Irvin did not defoliate. Usually we are wanting that early frost to hold off until the bolls are mature. Here it is two weeks before the average frost, and the bolls are mature and opening.

**SCREW-WORMS**

A total of 447 screwworm cases were reported in Texas the week of Sept. 29-Oct. 5. This was the largest infestation in any one week in 1963.

No explanation was given in the release which I received as to the jump in number of cases. With the research information obtained this year, and with a favorable winter, I believe a knockout punch can be given the screwworm fly in 1964.

I was amused by a statement made by George W. Mings, vocational agriculture teacher at Valley Mills School in Bosque County, concerning the acceptance of this program in what is normally a hot bed for screwworms.

He said, "The results are unbelievable. Even the hard heads admit it is the finest thing that has happened in this area."
