CELEBRATION TO BEGIN NEXT WEDNESDAY

Rodeo, Horse Show, Barbecue Slated

McLean becomes the center of attraction for outstanding cowboys, Quarter Horse showmen and rodeo fans beginning next Wednesday afternoon.

That marks the beginning of the annual four-day McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Celebration, with most of the activities scheduled at Felton Webb Arena northwest of the city on SH 273.

Sponsored by the Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Association—which combines the Lions Club and Roping Club—the celebration each year attracts hundreds of visitors to the city.

The affair kicks off Wednesday afternoon with registration for the Old Settlers Reunion, followed at 4 p.m. by the traditional parade through the city.

Several riding clubs are expected to be represented in the parade, and local organizations and business men are invited to enter floats and other vehicles.

Barbecue Saturday
A new feature added to this year's celebration is the giant barbecue, set for 5 p.m. Saturday, June 6, at the City Park.

Rodeo performances will be held at the arena each of the four nights, starting at 8 p.m. Six events are planned, with a purse of \$400 in each—plus a \$25 trophy saddle to the cowboy having the best average in each event.

Cowboys will compete in saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heeling and bulldozing.

In addition there will be a girls barrel race for a \$15 jackpot. First-place winner is to receive a trophy buckle, and the second and third place winners will be awarded spurs and a belt, respectively.

Horse Show at 10
The final day of the celebration will be a big one. In addition to the barbecue, the sixth annual Quarter Horse Show and approved cutting horse contest begin at 10 a.m.

Trophies for the horse show have been donated by McLean business establishments.

Neville Back, horse show chairman, said indications point to another large number of entries.

There is no charge for admission (See **RODEO**, Page 2)

The latest shower, a slow soaking type of rain, increased to 5.13 inches the total moisture received here this year.

Runs Again Memorial Day Back's Le Bar Wins La Mesa Park Race

A registered Quarter Horse from McLean galloped 350 yards in 18.2 seconds Saturday to win in his first outing at La Mesa Park in Raton, N. M.

Back's Le Bar, owned by Neville and Ruby Back of McLean, crossed the wire far ahead of the rest of the field in winning in AAA time.

The Quarter Horse will race again Saturday at La Mesa Park. Mr. and Mrs. Back learned Wednesday.

Back's Le Bar began his training on Dec. 8 at the McLean Race Training Stables. Myrle Norman of McLean is now the horse's trainer at Raton.

For the Backs, who are well known in horse show circles, Back's Le Bar is the first race horse.

He will be 2 years old on June 2, and is scheduled to enter three futurities this year—at Raton, the All-American at Ruidoso, N. M., and the Golden Spread at Suland, near El Paso.

Back's Le Bar's dam is Miss Lee Bryant, also owned by Mr. and Mrs. Back. She also is the dam of the well known Poco Sheba, a show horse of the Backs.

The sire is Three Bears, a son of Three Bars.

Two other horses from Mr. and Mrs. Back's ranch placed well at the Sayre, Okla., Horse Show held Tuesday.

Poco Chamita was named grand champion of the show, while Poco Mr. Sheba took third place in his class of nine.

PAMPA RITES FOR LT. COOKE

Memorial services for Lt. Joe Cooke were held Wednesday afternoon at the Duenkel-Carmichael Funeral Home in Pampa.

Chaplain N. C. Starnes, naval reserve chaplain from Amarillo, officiated at the services.

Lt. Cooke, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Cooke, 429 Pitts, Pampa, was killed last Friday when the airplane he was flying fell into the sea near the Philippine Islands.

The flier was a grandson of Mrs. Henry Rosson of McLean.

Other survivors include his wife, Martha of Greenburg, Ky.; a brother, 2nd Lt. Harold L. Cooke of the U. S. Army, and a sister, Mrs. Paulette Reed of Pampa.

The engine of Lt. Cooke's Navy fighter plane failed while on a low-level training mission, about seven miles northeast of Panay Island in the Philippines.

Area Searched — Other aircraft searched the area following the accident, but were unable to locate his body.

Lt. Cooke had recently been named as one of six men who qualified for three openings on the United States astronaut team.

Whether he was to be accepted for the team was scheduled for announcement later this year.

Lt. Cooke was born in McLean and attended Texas Tech in Lubbock before entering the Navy.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Bill Crisp, who farms north of Alanreed, has completed 3,000 feet of 1½ inch underground plastic pipe for livestock water. Bill has also completed a new mill. He can water two pastures from this mill by putting in the underground pipe.

Sometimes it is much cheaper to put in underground pipe than to dig another well.

Bill is carrying out a complete conservation plan under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

D. W. Swain has completed 37 acres of graded borders. He will put bermudagrass in these borders.

Elmer Balch has just completed 10 acres of graded borders on the farm he operates southeast of Pampa. He plans to sprig these borders to bermudagrass.

Elmer also plans to sprig his waterway to bermuda. Elmer sowed 13 acres of rolling cropland to sideoats gramagrass.

Charles Cooke sowed 118 acres to weeping lovegrass on his ranch north of McLean.

Tony Smitherman sprigged 20 acres to bermudagrass on his farm south of McLean.

It costs about \$23 per acre to sprig and fertilize an acre of bermudagrass.

John Haynes is shaping some gullies on the Mullanax Farm southwest of McLean. Haynes is carrying out a complete conservation plan on this farm under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Brush Control — The following have sprayed sagebrush and shinnery: Tony Smitherman, John Rice, Mrs. James Noel, Harvey Hudgins, Billy Davis. Several others plan to spray if it rains.

Stubble-Mulch Farming — It will not be too long till wheat harvest on most dryland acreage. Since we appear to be in a dry cycle it would be a good idea to use sweeps on our wheat stubble. Stubble-mulch farming is the best way to get moisture into the ground. It is also the best insurance you can get against soil blowing.

C. C. Organ seeded approximately 40 acres of native grass on his farm south of Pampa. The land he seeded consists of old cultivated fields that are low in production due to the undesirable vegetation.

Establishing desirable grasses and a sound management program will improve productivity of this land.

Midland Bermudagrass — John Haynes sprigged 20 acres of Midland Bermudagrass on the M. G. Mullanax farm west of McLean. This grass will produce a large amount of grazing if properly man-

aged. It is very important to rotate grazing, fertilize and irrigate the grass regularly.

Tony Smitherman, Cecil Seaney, D. W. Swain, Elmer Balch and T. D. Anderwald plan to sprig Bermudagrass this year.

Brush Control—Billy Davis plans to start spraying sandsage brush this week. He has sprayed several acres in the past few years and has had excellent results.

Billy said that by killing competitive brush the more desirable forage plants will have a chance to grow. He recommends a three to five month deferment of the grass following spraying.

Livestock Water Development—Noble Fish has developed a livestock water well and constructed two storage facilities on the Johnson Ranch west of Alanreed. He is also constructing a pond and plans to construct several more livestock water facilities this year.

Noble firmly believes that adequate livestock water is essential for proper grazing management.

Bill Crisp installed 2,900 feet of pipeline for livestock water on his farm north of Alanreed. The pipeline will provide livestock water for his five pastures.

SCD Board Meeting—The Gray County Soil Conservation District held its monthly board meeting Wednesday, May 13, in the courthouse annex east of Pampa. The principal business included: Establishing operating procedures for new SCD carryall, Milton Carpenter and Curtis Schaffer reported on progress of the McClellan Creek watershed, Duane Bartee gave a status report of the Sweetwater Creek watershed and the SCD board prepared a contract agreement for publishing of the Gray County SCD News.

The birthday luncheon will be in the home of Mrs. Carpenter on June 9.

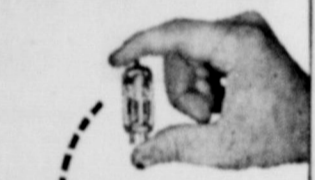

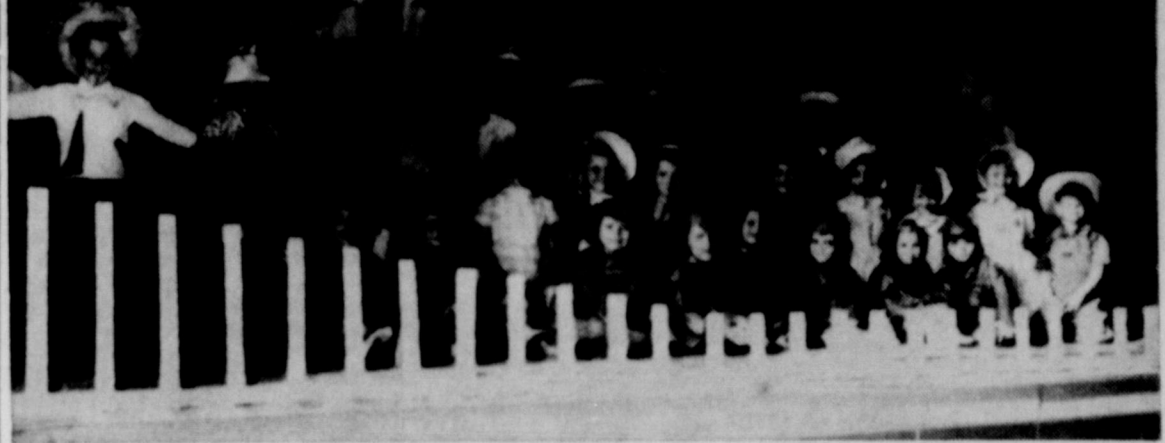

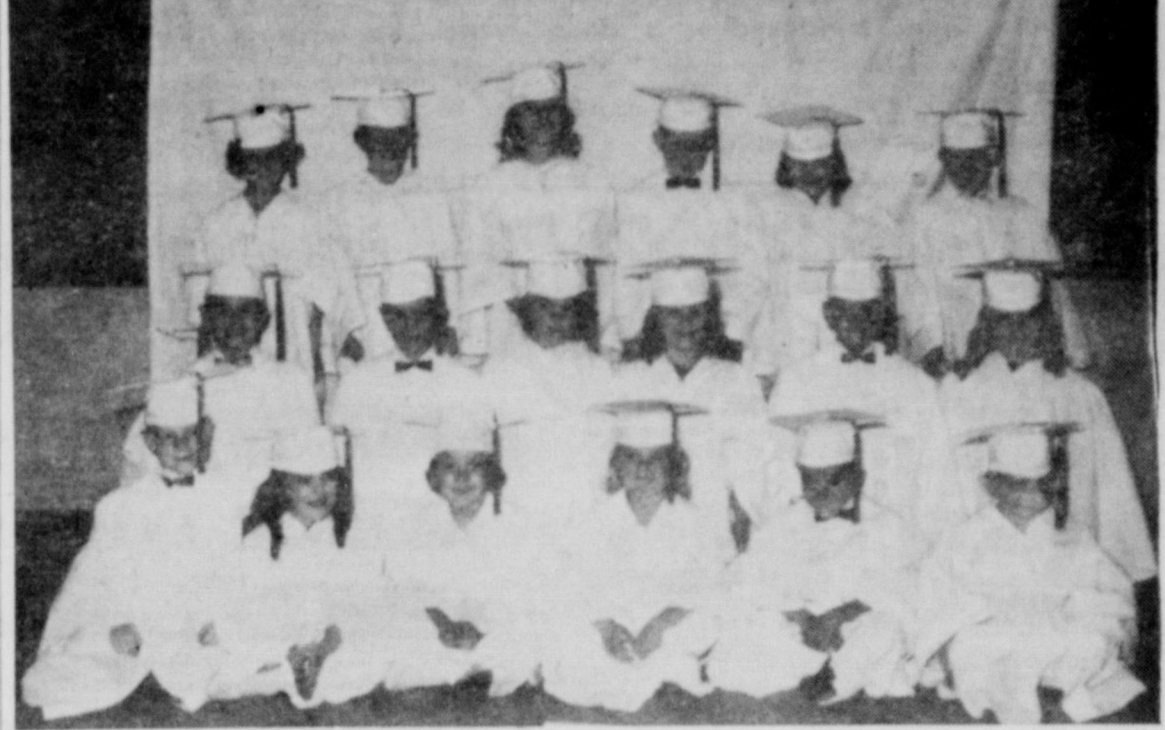
