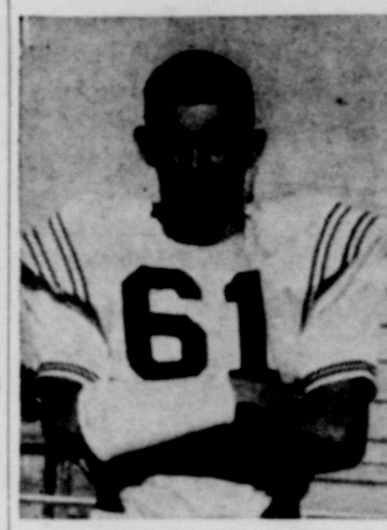

## Celebration Begins, But Rain Halts First Rodeo

### Festivities Continue Through Saturday

A thunderstorm flooded out Wednesday night's first rodeo performance, but the McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Celebration is off and running. Starting with the annual parade through downtown McLean Wednesday afternoon, the festivities continued with the registration of pioneers for the Old Settlers Reunion. Just before the rodeo was to have begun Wednesday night, however, a typical west Texas storm rolled across the area to halt the proceedings.

### WORK SLATED THIS SUMMER AT McCLELLAN

Long-sought improvements for Lake McClellan are scheduled this summer, Congressman Walter Rogers announced this week. The U.S. Forest Service will open bids on June 11 in Albuquerque, N. M., on a project expected to cost several hundred thousand dollars for the lake west of McLean.

Included in the work, according to Rogers, are: Construction of a new, enlarged concrete spillway and extending the dam across the existing emergency spillway. The Forest Service in the current fiscal year is adding additional picnic tables and fireplaces, sanitary facilities, a boat trailer parking area, boat ramps and another 1 1/2 miles of roadway. Work on the spillway and dam is expected to take 300 days from the date the contract is awarded. Facilities Improved Since 1959, Rep. Rogers pointed out, the Forest Service has improved facilities at Lake McClellan by (See LAKE, Page 5)

### FACTORY NEEDS MORE WOMEN

Area Residents Invited to Apply

Another call for more applications for employment went out this week from the Marie Foundations factory in Lubbock. Dale Greenhouse, production superintendent, said Wednesday that no applications have been received at the factory here lately, and there is a big need for more employees. Any woman in this area interested in working at the factory was invited to apply. Highest Number Ever The number of employees at Marie Foundations grew to 290 the past week—the highest ever—but Greenhouse said many more women are needed in order to keep production up with the demands. Currently, only women living in Pampa and the immediate vicinity are being hired for work in the new Marie Foundations factory which opened there recently. Thus, women from Lefors also are being employed for the McLean plant. Greenhouse said that some 65 women are now working in the Pampa factory, and more are being added as needed.

### Cunningham Files \$80,485 Damage Suit

L. N. Cunningham of McLean this week filed a suit asking \$80,485 in damages for his daughter, Dora Faye, against the Rock Island Railroad. The suit was filed in the 31st district court in Pampa. Dora Faye was injured in February, 1963, when a Rock Island train struck a car in which she was riding at a McLean railroad crossing. The car was driven by Robert McDonald of McLean. In the suit, Cunningham accuses the railroad of being negligent in its operation and charges that the train which struck the car failed to blow its whistle. As a result of the accident, Cunningham contends that his daughter suffered leg injuries, disfigurement and injuries to the hip and back, according to the suit.

### Rainy Week Brings 1.11 Inches Here

Rains came to McLean in valuable amounts during the past week, adding a grand total of 1.11 inch. A sometimes vicious-looking thunderstorm moved across the area just before 8 p.m. Wednesday, cancelling the first performance of the McLean 66 Rodeo before it got started. By the time the brilliant lightning display, rolling thunder, rain and light hail passed on to the northeast the city had received another .74 inch of moisture. This was enough to bring the total for the year to 6.24 inches, compared to 6.25 by this same date in 1963. More showers are forecast for portions of the Panhandle today, but planners of the McLean 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Celebration are hoping any more rain will hold off until after Saturday night. Westermen have predicted a wet month this June. Chilly temperatures came with the rain the past week and hung on for the most part. The high was 83 degrees on Wednesday, and the low 42 on Monday.
