Long-sought improvements for Lake McClellan are scheduled this summer, Congressman Walter Rogers announced this week.

The U.S. Forest Service will open bids on June 11 in Albuquerque, N. M., on a project expected to cost several hundred thousand collars for the lake west of McLean.

Included in the work, according o Rogers, are:

Construction of a new, enlarged oncrete spillway and extending the dam across the existing emergency

The Forest Service in the current fiscal year is adding additional picnic tables and fireplaces, sanitary facilities, a boat trailer parking area, boat ramps and another 1½ miles of roadway.


