Many had wondered how Goldwater would vote on the controversial and so-called civil rights bill passed last week. There is little doubt that he could have endeared himself to some foes in the Republican Party by a simple "yes" answer during the roll call vote on the bill in the Senate.

But the calibre of this man showed through when he had the courage to answer the roll call with a firm "no."

We read an article in Reader's Digest the other day that describes so well the present circumstances in America.

"One Man's Crusade for Everybody's Freedom" was the title of the piece. It was about Walter Knott, a former California farmer who through hard work and sweat under America's free enterprise system of the past became the owner of 20 dining rooms and a \$5 million dollar a year business.

Knott has established a Freedom Center in California, which contains books, magazines, mimeographed speeches and movie documentaries on American history and economics.

"We started out under a system where we the people were the government and delegated the authority," Knott is quoted as saying. "Now we have turned around and the government imposes its will on the people."

"We've seen government grow until it is all out of proportion. Every time it grows, it takes bits of freedom out of our lives, and we become more dependent on it and less on ourselves."

"There are certain things you have to have to make a productive society—incentives, competition, individual freedom to decide to do what you think is best. Those are the very things we are now losing to big government."

"Today we hear much talk about human rights versus property rights. Actually, property rights are among human rights. Without them our whole system will collapse."

This is exactly two inches more than had been recorded through June, 1963.

By this time in the year 1963 McLean had seen 8.72 inches of precipitation.

Temperatures have been on the cool side at night for the most part during the week ending Wednesday, with a low of 59 degrees registered in the wee hours of Wednesday morning.

The mercury did edge up to the 100-degree mark last Friday, but stayed below this figure the rest of the week.

## Westerly Route Wins Approval

The Texas Highway Commission Wednesday announced approval of the so-called "westerly route" for the McLean to Hedley Road, RM 2695.

Boyd Meador, a member of the McLean road committee, announced the commission's action this morning, settling a dispute that had arisen in Donley County over the road and clearing another hurdle in the move to get the new highway completed between here and Hedley.

At the same time the Highway Commission gave approval to two other projects in connection with

RM 2695, on which paving will end approximately 1 1/2 miles northeast of Hedley.

Another 3.3 miles of construction is planned from SH 203 north, then two miles back west to connect up with the new FM 2695.

At present the McLean to Hedley road is completed to within about 1 1/2 miles of the Salt Fork of Red River. The next project also will include work on this 1 1/2 miles and the new bridge across the river.

Donley County commissioners in a meeting recently agreed to furnish right-of-way for the projects announced Wednesday.

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# NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Leslie Darsey staked a dam and diversion terrace on his ranch north of Alanreed. He has constructed several dams in the last two years to control water erosion and distribute livestock grazing.

Management of livestock grazing is very important in proper utilization of native grass.

**IRRIGATION** — Drew Word, Harvey Taylor, Bill Crisp, Cecil Seay, James Cliett and Tony Smitherman have developed sprinkler irrigation systems in the McLean area.

Permanent pasture will be the primary irrigated crop because of the need for additional livestock forage. Irrigation wells are expensive investments and must be successfully used to be economically feasible in livestock farming operations.

Most of the time rainfall doesn't replace an irrigation water application, because very seldom does it provide the needed amount of moisture for growing crops. Each time a field or pasture is irrigated, there should be approximately three inches of water applied.

All sprinkler irrigation system operators should know the output of

their well and how much water they are applying to the soil. Technical assistance is available through the local Soil Conservation Service office in Pampa.

**EROSION** — Throughout the Gray County Soil Conservation District water erosion is a problem. There is one-sixteenth of an inch of top soil lost each year in the United States from erosion. This is a total of one inch in 16 years and it takes nature 500 to 1,000 years to build an inch of top soil.

The most common erosion problem we have is sheet erosion, which occurs on flat, gently sloping fields with long watersheds. This type of erosion is hard to see. Gully erosion is easy to see because gullies are hard to farm.

We try to control this type of erosion because it is for our convenience; however, sheet erosion can become a severe problem in a few years and will develop gullies. Sheet and gully erosion can be controlled by terracing to break up the long watersheds and proper management of crop residues.

We need to keep that raindrop where it falls to control erosion and increase crop production by conserving moisture rather than let it run off our fields.

Cost-share assistance is available through the ASCS and Great Plains Programs for erosion control practices. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service office for further information.

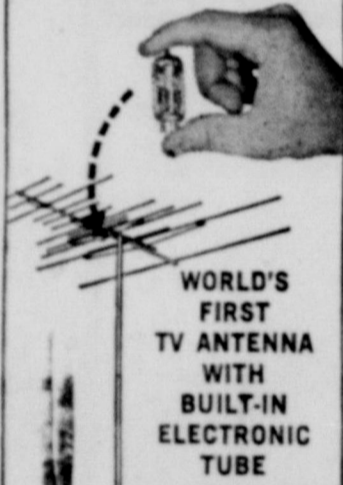
