Triumph 28-24





it certainly can slow them down. He mentioned that planes can't get off the ground, switches on railroad tracks can freeze up, trucks must move slowly and cau-



'Moving the Christmas mail is hard, titring job and the four local postal employes who work so diligently during this period deserve all the cooperation they can get," Simpson said.


