Hess appeared on the club's luncheon program to answer criticism leveled at the cattle industry recently by Dr. Ralph Durham, head of the Texas Tech animal husbandry department.

Durham had charged in a talk here that American cattlemen were not concentrating on producing lean meat in the feeding of beef cattle. At the same time he said too many ranchers are feeding their cattle for show rather than good meat.

Hess said all too often so-called experts with no money invested in a business come along and tell us we're all wet."

The McLean rancher declared that "red meat is a watery cell product," adding that cattle must have grain for good taste.


