WALTER ROGERS REPORTS

FOR "CLEAN" MAIL

The right of privacy and refuge in your home is a fundamental right. Still sound law today is the principle laid down by an English jurist more than 400 years ago: "The house of everyone is to him as his castle and fortress, as well for his defense against injury and violence as for his repose."

Our Constitution bars search and seizure without a warrant and guarantees each citizen the right to restrain and deny unauthorized persons from entering his home.

Certainly implicit, if not explicit, in the Constitution is the right to prevent entry into the home of harmful materials as well as persons. The right of an individual to protect his home and his children from damaging moral influences must prevail, both in reason and in law, over the right of another to send morally offensive mail into that home or to those children.

To provide this protection, to better enable Americans to protect themselves from these "smut peddlers," is the purpose of H. R. 319, a bill that has been approved by the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service and may come to the floor of the House when it returns from the two-week recess beginning this weekend.

In hearings on the bill, which was introduced by Congressman Cunningham of Nebraska, recognized authorities presented overwhelming evidence that a multi-million-dollar traffic in obscene and immoral products is still growing. Much of it is directed to debasement of the morals of the young and impressionable.

Disguised as "art" or "literature" or "culture" or "education," unsolicited obscene material will go through the mails this year to more than a million school children, according to a Post Office Department estimate.

While stepping up their campaign of distribution, the traffickers in obscenity have marshalled their high-paid legal staffs in a massive assault on penal statutes. While the so-called "hard core" of peddlers in smut can be successfully prosecuted, the public is now confronted by the threat of damage from the "gray areas" of indecent mailings.

Recently enacted postal obscenity laws have provided only partial protection. As the committee observed in its report on H. R. 319, "Gray can be a very dirty color."

It was the committee's conviction that what is now needed is a law applied from a different direction—with a preventive rather than a punitive purpose—a law enabling the public to participate in protecting its own interests.

Among the many groups and organizations in this country supporting "clean mail" legislation are employees and leaders of the great national postal organizations, whose members must act as unwitting and unwilling messengers of offensive material.

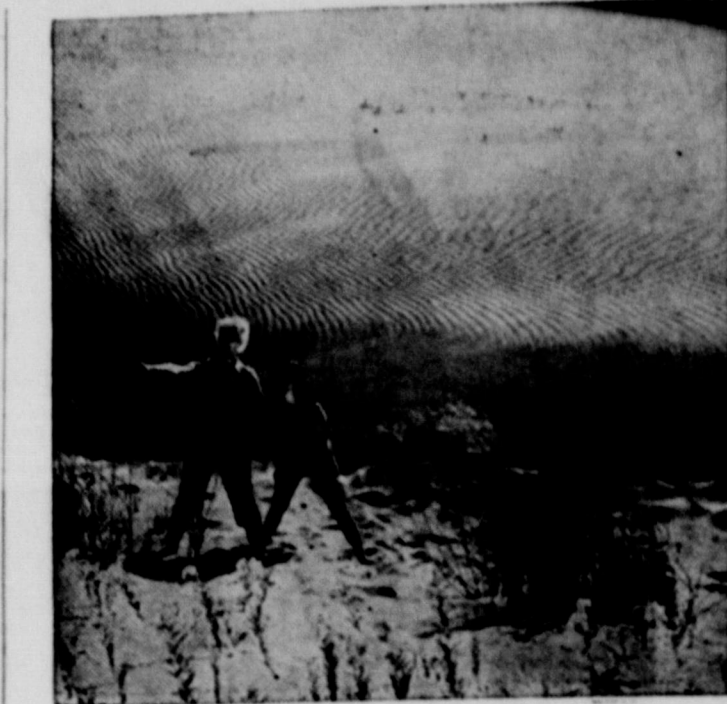
Said Jerome J. Keating, president of the National Association of Letter Carriers, "There must be some way to prevent the purveyors of filth from forcing their wares upon innocent victims. We know the dangers of censorship and the need of free speech. We believe in freedom of thought; however, there is such a thing as licentiousness."

The new proposed law would give any person the right, when he or his child receives mail which, in his opinion, is morally offensive, to ask the postmaster general to notify the sender to send no more mail to him or any child of his which he himself has not solicited.

The postmaster general then must give the sender notice of the request and its content, and direct the sender and anyone acting for him to send no more mail in violation of the request. If the notice is violated, the postmaster general may then serve a formal complaint, then request the attorney general to apply to a district court for an order directing compliance. Failure to obey such orders may be punished as contempt of court.

It is my opinion that this law could be strengthened further if persons violating its provisions were made subject to punishment by fine or imprisonment as well as by that section punishing them for contempt of court. I have long campaigned for stronger, more effective laws against morally offensive matter conveyed by mail or distributed in interstate commerce by any medium.

Congressman Rogers Introduces Bill On Labeling of Meat

Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa has introduced a bill to require that imported meat and meat products bear labels showing the countries of origin.

The congressman called for enactment of the bill so that American consumers can make a "clean choice" between competing products, domestic and foreign.

"Except in a small number of cities where local ordinances have been passed to require labeling, there is no way for a housewife to know whether the meat she buys was produced in the United States or abroad," the congressman said.

On March 11, Congressman Rogers introduced a bill to impose import limitations on certain meat and meat products. The bill, along with others of a similar nature, is before the House Ways and Means Committee but the committee has not as yet acted to refer the matter to the full House of Representatives.

The bill introduced by Congressman Rogers will be referred to the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which he is a member.

Congressman Rogers said the bill did not place an undue burden on merchants. "Its provisions are temperate and enforceable," he said.

The act, entitled the "Imported Meat and Meat Food Product Labeling Act," would empower the Federal Trade Commission to enforce labeling requirements on meat and meat products moving in interstate commerce.

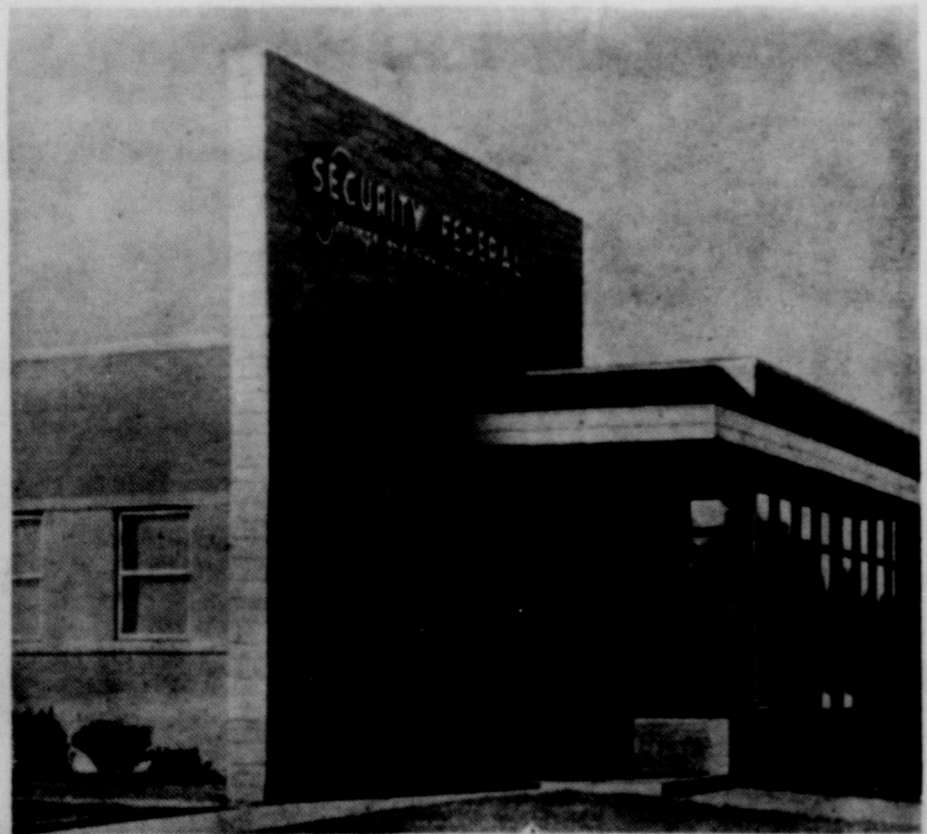

AUSTIN — (Special) — Local gov-
 ernments in Texas may be the
 main beneficiaries if state govern-
 ment winds up the current fiscal
 period with an \$80,000,000 surplus
 as Gov. John Connally predicts it
 might.
 Should such a surplus be reached,
 Connally told reporters, it is "fair-
 ly" certain he will recommend
 abolishing the ad valorem tax on
 property for state revenue pur-
 poses and leaving that source ex-
 clusively to local governments.
 Connally said \$20,000,000 of the
 expected surplus could be set aside
 in a special fund to retire college
 building bonds backed by ad valorem
 tax contributions.
 In predicting that the surplus will
 not be less than \$35,000,000 and
 probably will reach the \$80,000,000
 figure, the governor joined those
 who have contended all along that
 the general revenue fund will be
 so far in the black by 1965 that
 new tax problems will be eased if
 not erased.
 Connally also said he contem-
 plates submitting to the Legislature
 in stages the recommendations of
 his Committee on Education Beyond
 the High School.
 He still plans to call a confer-
 ence on morals and ethics but said
 he has not picked a time. How-
 ever, he declined to say whether
 he would recommend fair employ-
 ment and public accommodations
 legislation in order to maintain
 some state jurisdiction over civil
 rights under the new federal law.

CAPITOL HOSPITALITY—Texas

"Sir, all it would take to keep this family off poverty is permission to grow just five more acres of cotton."
