TEXAS A & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE



### By FOSTER WHALEY EXTENSION CONFERENCE

By the time you are reading this the bangs testing program is well underway. Also the extension conference at Texas A and M is half over. All the extension employees of Gray County are at A and M this week. We will be back in Pampa sometime this weekend.

Every other year we are called to Texas A and M for a one week conference. When plans were advanced one week on the bangs testing program it conflicted with our state extension conference. When you have good volunteer help such as Charles Webb, Harvey Taylor and Slick Boyd, things will run just as well as if you were there.

### BEEF CATTLE SHORT COURSE

We are trying something new in the form of extension adult education. Instead of having to go to A and M to attend a short course such as they have been having for some 30 years, we are bringing the campus of A and M to the counties. Some six months ago we requested that we be sent four top flight beef cattle and range management specialists to Gray County for a four night short course on the latest developments in the cattle business.

We are fortunate in having two of these specialists the first and second nights in McLean. Bob

Ragsdale, range management specialist, will be in charge of the first night's discussion. He will talk on "Range Management and Brush Control," starting at 7:30 p.m., Nov. 9. Unless John Haynes changes the meeting place, it will be at the city hall. The second night L. A. Maddox, beef cattle specialist, Texas A and M, will discuss "Feeding the Cow and Calf." It will also start at 7:30 p.m., on Nov. 10 in the city hall.

The last two nights will be held at the court house annex in Pampa. Dixon Hubbard, beef cattle specialist, will speak on "Commercial Cattle Feeding" at 7:30 p.m., Nov. 11, and Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, will speak on "Animal Health" at 7:30 p.m., on Nov. 12.

We hope every beef cattle producer in the McLean area will be in attendance. Many of you have a copy of a publication written by L. A. Maddox, a Miami, Texas, ranch boy product. The bulletin is B-966—"Cow-Calf Business." We consider it our best publication on this subject. I'd be glad to pass one along to you on request. Put the above dates on your calendar.

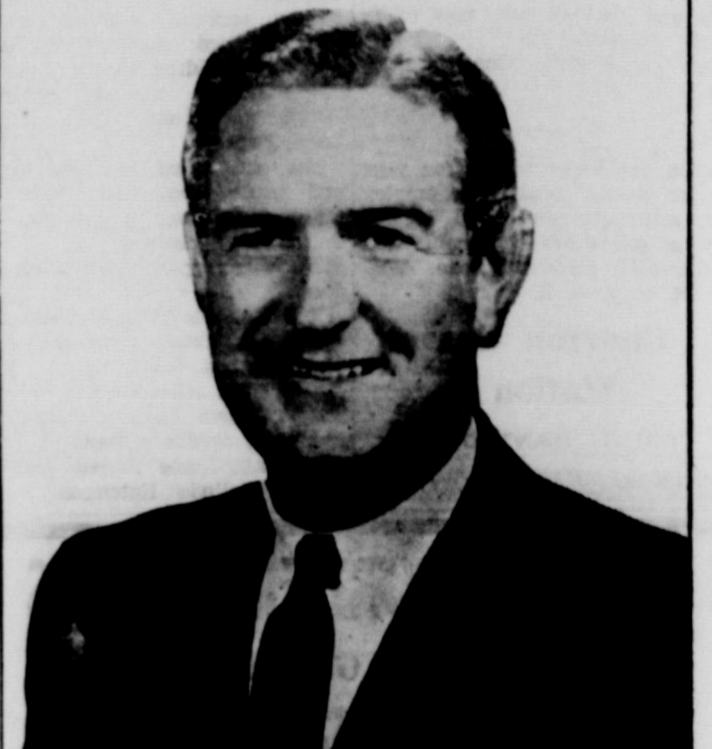

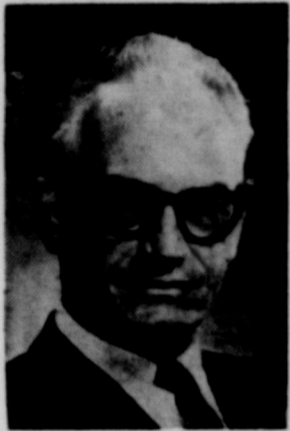

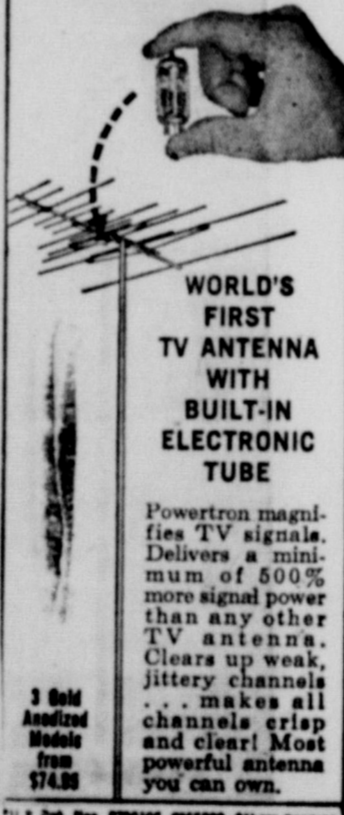
