federal integration guidelines by 48 Texas school districts.

Among the larger districts named as not in compliance were Amarillo, Austin, Odessa, Lubbock, Midland, Port Arthur, Beaumont (South Park), Temple, Richardson and Wichita Falls.

State education agencies, federal authorities noted, have control over local districts in such vital matters as state aid, accreditation and textbook distribution.

INSURANCE HEARING DELAYED
A delayed hearing date on auto insurance rate-making in effect assures Texas car owners that any premium hikes won't be effective until around December.

Two vital functions of state government alone - public education and welfare - are seeking \$677.5 million additional revenues. It is expected most of the other agencies request more than their appropriations instead of requests, as large as they are, do not take into consideration larger grants for the year.

Investment income hearing now likely will be set for September 9, and another hearing, will follow by a month or more. SCHOOL GROUP FORMED
A new statewide group called "Citizens Association for Public Schools" has been formed to oppose diversion of public funds to non-public elementary and secondary schools.

Organization made no secret of the fact that it will "work for keeping public tax money for schools confined to support of the public schools." Some private and church schools have indicated they will seek state assistance next year.

Affiliated organizations include Texas State Teachers Association, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, Anti-Defamation League, Baptist General Convention of Texas and Americans United for Separation of Church and State.

Two members of the Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Fr. Horace Cromer of Austin and Isaac Arnold Sr. of Houston, have resigned.

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is in the process of moving to the brand-new State Finance Building and will be followed quickly by Treasurer Jesse James.

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A team of 34 law enforcement leaders began their fight against organized crime in Texas, bolstered by a \$213,669 federal grant.

Texas ranks third in sales of fishing licenses and fourth in hunting licenses, according to Parks and Wildlife Department.

GMO's Clear 2,102 Cases

Game management officers for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department cleared 2,102 hunting, fishing, pollution and water safety violation cases from the books in May.

There were 133 convictions for hunting law violations, 52 for commercial fishing law violations, two for pollution law violations and 716 for water safety law violations.

Money accrued to the State as a result of these convictions amounted to \$30,580.89.

Alan L. Bean, third man to walk on the moon, keynoted the 42nd annual Future Farmers of America state convention in San Antonio July 15-17.

Bean, lunar module pilot of the Apollo XII flight, spoke at 9 a.m. Wednesday, (July 15) to some 5,000 members and their guests at the San Antonio Convention Center.

The veteran Navy test pilot and astronaut was asked to keynote the FFA session because of his outstanding accomplishments and his ability to relate those experiences to young people, according to Billy Conner, Texas Education Agency consultant and executive secretary of the Texas FFA.

The Story Behind Early Farm Program Payments

The story of how some 3 million farmers are receiving payments earned under the feed grain and cotton programs earlier, but most of the payments will be issued over a shorter period of time. Most should be in farmers' hands by mid-August - 6 weeks from the first day checks were distributed.

Cooperation by farmers has been a key element to success, because no individual payment could be released until the farmer had certified that he had complied with rules for planting and diverting acres and other program requirements. But a good share of credit also is due farmer committeemen, county and State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation staffs, and a variety of specialists in ASCS field and national offices.

On January 16 USDA made a commitment to farmers that farm program payments would begin as soon as possible after July 1. Budget restraints made advance partial payments impossible.

Lefors Resident Is Member Of Special A. F. Team

Master Sergeant Edward L. Buehrer, whose wife, Jaquita, is the daughter of Mrs. Geneva Lisenbee of Lefors, is a member of a special U.S. Air Force aerial survey team that has been conducting aerial mapping photography in South America.

Sergeant Buehrer is an aerospace ground equipment technician with the Air Force's Aerospace Cartographic and Geodetic Service (ACGS), headquartered at Forbes AFB, Kan, which has been flying over the towering, rugged peaks of the Andes Mountains to photograph some 25,000 square miles of the border between Chile and Argentina.

Aerial photography-the end result of the project-may better determine the exact international boundary between Argentina and Chile. Requested by the two South American countries, the project began in late January and was suspended in May because of snow cover and atmospheric conditions. ACGS personnel will return to complete the project in January 1971 when weather conditions improve.

ACGS was assigned the project since it is the only U.S. military agency capable of providing aerial cartographic and geodetic data on a worldwide basis and has the aircraft capable of attaining altitudes required to obtain photographs at the desired scale. Aircraft were flown at altitudes of 40,000 ft. above sea level to obtain acceptable photography of the border area.

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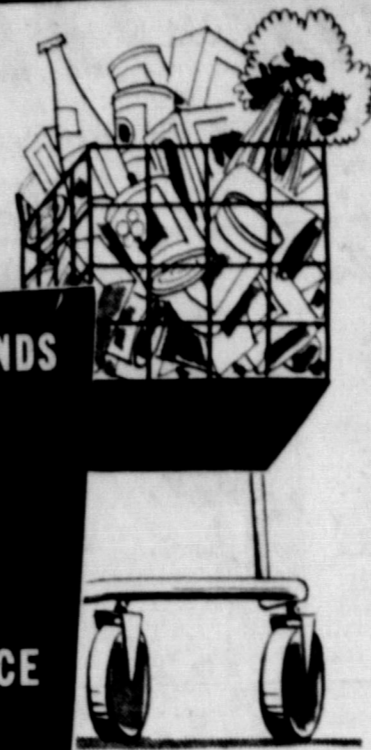

I visited with Evelyn Mason, ASC office manager, concerning the emergency drought designation that was requested by our Committee last week. So far no word has been received from the State office.

The benefit to be derived would not be great but it might help a few for such designation. The benefits might be enlarged at a later date. If approved to graze diverted acres, it would cost \$1.00 per acre per month for the first two months. Then fifty cents per acre thereafter. I'm not sure what the regulation would be on CAP land. We will keep you informed of any late developments.

Cattle are beginning to be moved from the droughted-out ranges into the feedlot. For sometime ranchers have been saying, "If I don't get a man by next week, I'm going to town." They're now to the point where they are acting and not just talking. Bill Stockstill, Heaton Cattle Company, says they are just about full.

A heavy movement of cattle in bunches to the feedlot is not good. In effect, it means steers that would have been marketed this fall weighing one hundred pounds more going into the feed lot, will now come out of the feed lot weighing a hundred pounds less. Cut off 100 pounds on all cattle slaughtered today and you would see some high-priced beef.

My personal opinion is that placements in the feed lot that were made over the last two months will realize a nice profit picture on anything going in. I'm not too sold on the profit picture on anything going in to the feed lot at present. Based on finished cattle price today, the going price of replacement steer is the most attractive to a feeder that I have seen in some time.
