NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Mr. and Mrs. Milton Carpenter and Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Schaffer of the Gray County SCD attended the Texas Association of Soil Conservation District's annual convention in Sherman last week.

Approximately 500 supervisors attended this annual three-day event. While attending this annual convention, supervisors across the state have an opportunity to work out problems that they have encountered through the year. Many resolutions are adopted to further the Soil and Water Conservation District program in Texas.

IRRIGATION—George Philpott plans to level 16 acres of irrigated land on his farm east of Pampa. Tom Anderwald plans to level 20 acres on his farm south of Kingsmill.

Turner Kirby recently completed 111 acres of irrigation land leveling on his farm east of Groom. Land leveling will aid in better distribution of irrigation water.

Verlin Dülger plans to lay out an irrigation system on his farm east of Pampa. Verlin drilled an irrigation well last month. The eight-inch well is above average in production for Gray County.

STUBBLE-MULCH FARMING—C. V. Forsman reported that he didn't lose any water from the last rain on his stubble-mulched cropland. He stated that this was a result of using sweep and chisel type equipment on his farm north-east of Pampa.

This type of farming will reduce wind and water erosion as well as conserve moisture.

STOCKWATER DEVELOPMENT—Milton Carpenter plans to construct a dam on his ranch north of McLean.

Glenn Dawkins plans to construct a pond on his ranch east of Pampa.

Noble Fish has recently constructed several ponds and wells on Johnson Ranch northwest of Alanreed.

C. V. Forsman plans to drill a well on his ranch east of Pampa. Ponds and wells will distribute livestock grazing and provide a permanent source of livestock water. Cost-share assistance is available through the Agricultural Conservation Program and Great Plains Program.

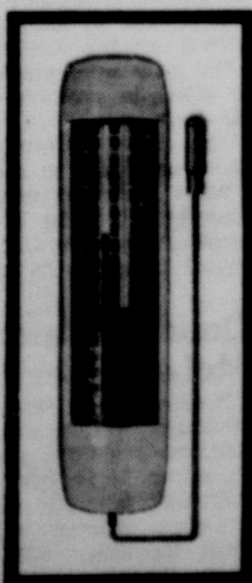

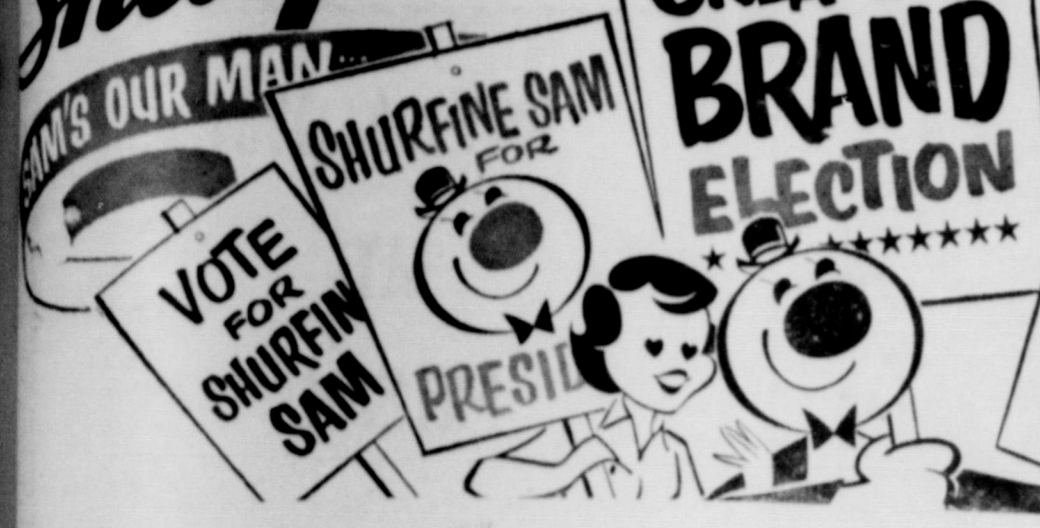
