ALANREED SETS CAGE TOURNEY

CITY PLANNING NEW GAS WELL

Board Discusses Increased Need

The possibility of drilling another well for addition to the McLean gas system was discussed Tuesday afternoon at the regular city commission meeting.

Need for more gas to serve the city's ever-increasing demands was noted by the commission after one well had been shut in.

Location of the new well has not been decided, but it will be drilled on land now under lease to the city. A careful study is planned before a definite location is selected.

Four city-owned wells are now in use, and an arrangement makes it possible to purchase gas from El Paso Natural Gas Co. when more is needed.

To Close Alley

Jesse (Chock) Smith and Mrs. Rosie Lee Young in a petition read by the commission Tuesday asked permission to close an alley in a block of property they own.

The commission voted to grant the request, provided the city receives an easement for access to a gas line located in the alley.

Rev. David Thomas, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, said the invocation to open Tuesday's meeting.

Tom Greenwood, former production superintendent of Marie Foundations factory in McLean, has rejoined the company, Owner Cal Fraser announced this week.

Greenwood left his position here in January, 1962, to assume similar duties with Burlington Mills, Inc., in Post.

Fraser said Greenwood and Dale Greenwood will manage the factory operations in McLean and Pampa, with added help from the "fine people we have."

"For many months we have needed added management help due to our present and future anticipated expansion," Fraser explained.

"Dale and I talked this over, and one evening Dale commented, 'Wouldn't it be great if we had Tom Greenwood back?' So we went and got Tom back."

'Great Team'

Fraser said he "confidently expects Dale and Tom to be a great team and to be effective in planning for the future. We were spread too thin, but now by dividing up responsibilities, can do a better job. It is a great relief to have this combination."

Greenwood came to McLean in 1957 to assume the duties of production superintendent when the Marie Foundations factory was opened here.

He holds a textile engineering degree from Texas Tech in Lubbock.

McLean's Tigers bring the 1964 football season to a close Friday night, when they travel to Canadian for a bout with the Wildcats.

Game time is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

Canadian was bounced 36-0 by the apparent District 2-A champions, the White Deer Bucks, last week. The Bucks are the only team able to defeat the Tigers in district play this season, eking out a 12-6 win last month.

White Deer closes at Memphis this Friday, and whether they win or lose there the Bucks will be the trophy winners, by virtue of that victory over the Tigers.

Whip Wellington 8-0 McLean edged Wellington 8-0 here last Friday on a muddy turf that kept both teams from moving well.

The Tigers crowned their football queen in ceremonies preceding the kickoff.

Sharon Sitter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Sitter, received the crown—a gold-plated and glitter-covered football helmet from Co-Capt. Johnny Fuller.

Miss Sitter is a senior in McLean High School and head twirler with the Tiger Band.

Other candidates for the crown were Sharon Goldston and Barbara McCurley, both juniors.

Miss Goldston, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Goldston of Alanreed, is a cheerleader, and Miss McCurley, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Hack McCurley, is active in the pep club.

Band Royalty

At halftime of the game, Miss Sitter also was introduced as Tiger Band queen, along with the band king, Don Stewart.

Stewart is the son of Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Stewart.

The Tigers scored their lone touchdown in the second quarter, after stopping the Wellington Skyrocks on the 11 in the opening period.

the singing of "The Old Gray Mare."

Late in the fourth quarter, the Tigers got down to within 3 1/2 inches of a TD just before the mud-fest ended.

McLean got its scoring effort underway as the second quarter began, starting from the locals' 47 after a Wellington punt.

5 Plays to Score
It took only five plays from that point.

Fullback Dickie Crockett circled right to the Wellington 38 for a first down, then scampered left to the 26 for another. Quarterback Johnny Fuller wheeled around the left side for another first and 10 on the 15.

Next it was Crockett again, this time on a 13-yard gainer. The power-running fullback jumped over one tackler to pick up an extra yard or so to the two.

And the remaining two yards were easy for Crockett to get, as he crossed over right tackle and went into the end zone.

Crockett also ran over the extra points, ending the scoring with nine minutes and one second still remaining in the first half.

In the final quarter, Crockett intercepted a Skyrocket pass on the Wellington 27 to start what appeared certain to be another scoring drive.

But try as they might, the Tigers were unable to push over. They did pick up a first down on the one-half yard line and Crockett blasted to within seven inches with seven seconds remaining in the game.

Wellington was penalized 3 1/2 inches—half the distance to the goal—for being offside, but on the next play the visitors recovered a fumble to halt the threat.

Two sparkling defensive plays were turned in during the game by Ed Harlon Pool and Johnny Fuller.

Pool was the last man between Halfback Chester McLain and the end zone, when McLain caught a pass in the second period and was heading for paydirt.

Pool stopped McLain on the Tiger 21 with a do-or-die tackle.

Wellington End Larry Henard had just hauled in an aerial from Quarterback Wayne Barton that covered 11 yards to the McLean 25.

Fuller immediately hit the carrier, stopping him cold, Henard was shaken up on the play and had to be taken from the game for a time.

Others outstanding on defense were Center Lynn Mays, Crockett, Halfback Eddy Windom, Halfback Robert McCabe, Guard Ronnie Hunt and Tackles George Green and Dwight Hathaway.

The mud slowed Crockett down considerably, preventing him for the first time in many games from netting more than 100 yards. He ended the evening with 87.

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Blindness Doesn't Keep Former McLean Girl From Success

Though blind, Mary Jane Cummings, the daughter of a former superintendent of schools in McLean, is receiving recognition as an outstanding pianist.

Miss Cummings is the 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Logan Cummings of Austin. She was born in a Pampa hospital while her father was serving as superintendent here.

The young pianist performed last Friday in the E. Clyde Whitlock Music Club's annual public guest presentation in Fort Worth.

Miss Cummings is a junior at the Texas School for the Blind in Austin. She lost her vision at the age of 3, and when she was 6 the family moved to Austin to have the advantage of the school there.

Her formal training in piano began in the second grade, and for nine years she has been a pupil of Forrest Goodenough, head of the School for the Blind music department.

Straight-A Student
She is a straight-A student at the school.

Miss Cummings has performed before two state conventions of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, four times on an educational television program in Austin and last September for the district convention of Kiwanis Clubs in Austin.

She has received superior ratings at the junior festival of the National Federation of Music Clubs and won second place in the federation's Still-man Kelley Young Artist Contest.

For eight years she has been awarded highest ratings in auditions of the National Guild of Piano Teachers. She also won first prize in a national convention for young blind musicians sponsored by the American Association of Instructors for the Blind last June.

That Christ has become of no effect unto us and we are fallen from grace if we try to justify ourselves by the Old Testament. (Gal. 5:4)

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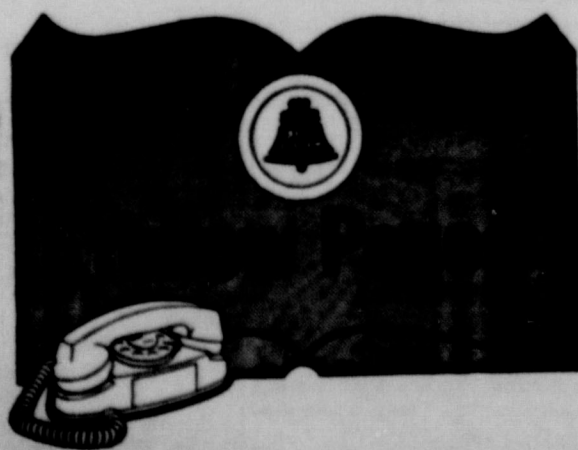

BEEF CATTLE SHORT COURSE

The first meeting of the Beef Cattle Short Course was held Monday night in the McLean city hall. Bob Ragsdale, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, presented research work from throughout the state on deferred rotation grazing and control of undesirable plants on range land.

BANG'S TESTING

A total of 143 herds of cattle have been tested in Gray County during the first two weeks of testing for Bang's disease. This represented 6,943 head of cattle. Blood samples totaling 4,797 were drawn. There were 11 suspects and 17 positive cases. Some 535 calves have been vaccinated.

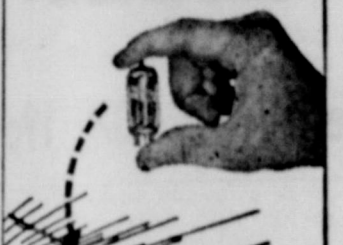

Post Office Helps To Count Livestock

Rural mail carrier Jim Hathaway from the McLean Post Office will have some livestock survey cards along his routes beginning Friday.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry in Texas farms," Acting Postmaster Frank Simpson explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Simpson said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so the USDA can get a true sample of the state's livestock holdings."

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and national pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

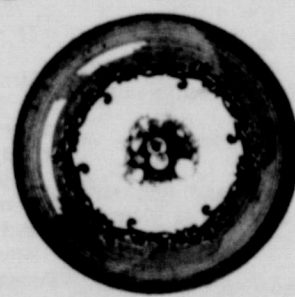
