At Doctor Hereford Ranch Hereford Field Day Will Be Saturday

Hundreds of youngsters from all across the Panhandle area will be in McLean Saturday for the third annual Texas Junior Hereford Association Field Day at the Doctor Hereford Ranch.

Registration starts at 8:30 a.m., and the program is to end at 4 p.m. with presentation of awards and introduction of speech and queen contest winners.

These contests were held last Saturday in Amarillo.

Hosts for the Field Day here will be Mr. and Mrs. Farris Hess, who are scheduled to welcome the visiting youths.

A judging contest will be from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., with a barbecue prepared by Flip Breedlove, Donley County agricultural agent, from noon to 1 p.m.

Demonstration Stations

Eight practical demonstration stations are to be set up for the visitors to hear the various phases of ranching discussed.

Paul Swaffler, secretary of the American Hereford Association, also is to speak to the group.

The eight stations will include: Station 1—Tattooing, horn-branding and horn-training; 2—Hereford promotion (registration and transfer of papers); 3—fitting, feeding and grooming; 4—hoof trimming; 5—Quarter Horse selection; 6—the Hereford bull; 7—vaccination, dehorning, castration and branding; 8—tips from the veterinarian and supplies.

As many as 1,000 youngsters and visitors—and possibly more—are expected here for the day.

School Registration Begins on Aug. 27

Registration for the 1964-65 school term in McLean begins on Aug. 27, with classes scheduled to open four days later.

Supt. Jack Riley announced Wednesday that high school students will register Thursday and Friday, Aug. 27 and 28.

Registration of grade school students will be on Saturday, Aug. 29, starting at 1 p.m.

Mrs. T. C. D'Spain also announced this week that kindergarten enrollment will be at the same time as registration for grade school students.

Additional information concerning the opening of school will be announced later, Riley said.

Monday, Aug. 31, will see the beginning of classes.

Riley said that a full day of school is scheduled for Monday. Buses will make their regular runs and the cafeteria will be open.

ORDINANCE ON MEAT LABELING IS INTRODUCED

Second Reading Slated at Next Commission Meet

The McLean city commission Tuesday night heard the first reading of an ordinance requiring the labeling of imported meats offered for sale here.

Second reading of the ordinance is scheduled at the next regular meeting of the commission.

The ordinance will become effective 10 days after its publication in the McLean News as a legal notice. The publication is scheduled following the second reading and adoption of the ordinance by the commission.

The ordinance, No. 118, provides that "every retailer who sells or offers for sale in the City of McLean, Texas, through a meat market, store or otherwise, any meats, either canned, frozen or cured, which are the products of any country foreign to the United States, shall clearly label such meat as 'imported,' naming the country of its origin . . . in letters not less than one-half inch in height."

Retail Trade

"A retailer" is described as "a person regularly engaged in the business of selling meat, canned, frozen or cured, at retail to the trade and public as such, and selling only to the user or consumer and not for resale."

The word "meat" includes the "dressed flesh of cattle, swine, horses, sheep or goats but shall not include fish or products of fish."

Persons who fail to comply with the ordinance are subject to a fine of not more than \$200.

The ordinance is patterned after similar ordinances adopted by Pampa and several other cities and towns in the United States.

During their meeting Tuesday night, the city aldermen also approved on the first reading the ordinance setting the city tax rate at \$1.25 per \$100 valuation.

Rev. Dan Beltz, pastor of the First Baptist Church, said the invocation to open Tuesday's meeting.

Hearing on Closing Of Depot Here Tuesday

Representatives of the Texas Railroad Commission will be in McLean next Tuesday to hear protests to the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad Co.'s plan for closing the depot here.

Many area ranchers, representatives of the Marie Foundations factory and other persons who make use of the railroad for shipping are expected to attend the hearing at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday in city hall.

The commission will hear all evidence and statements presented in favor of and in opposition to the closing of the depot.

The railroad several weeks ago filed its application with the Railroad Commission for permission to close the depot.

Members of the McLean city commission have gone on record as opposing the action and are preparing to voice their disapproval at the hearing.

The city commission has urged all persons who would be affected by the action to attend the session Tuesday.

If the Railroad Commission gives its approval to the application, the depot agent would be transferred and a "pre-pay station for the handling of carload shipments only" would be established.

Other business now carried on with the Rock Island here would have to be transacted in Shamrock.

With the opening of the football season just three weeks away, the McLean Tigers begin workouts next Monday—and under their new head coach.

Coach Fred Hedgecoke, coming to McLean from two years as first assistant grid coach at Panhandle, said Wednesday that all boys interested in playing football are invited to report for workouts Monday morning.

Practice sessions are scheduled on a two-day basis until the beginning of school on Aug. 31—at 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Hedgecoke succeeds Derral Davis as head coach in McLean. Davis, Tiger mentor, since 1960, has moved to California.

An outstanding football player at Stinnett and West Texas State University, Hedgecoke received his bachelor's degree from WT in 1961.

Formerly at Clarendon

He served as assistant coach at Clarendon two years before going to Panhandle.

Coach Hedgecoke, his wife, Connie, and young son, Rob, have already moved to McLean.

The Tigers kick off their 1964 season on Sept. 4 at Shamrock, and for the first time in many years the closing game will not be with the arch-rival Lefors Pirates.

Lefors enters Class B this year, making it necessary for the Tigers to meet the Bucs earlier in the season—before District 2-A play begins. McLean goes to Lefors on Sept. 25.

White Deer replaces Lefors in the district. Other 2-A schools are Memphis, Clarendon, Wellington and Canadian.

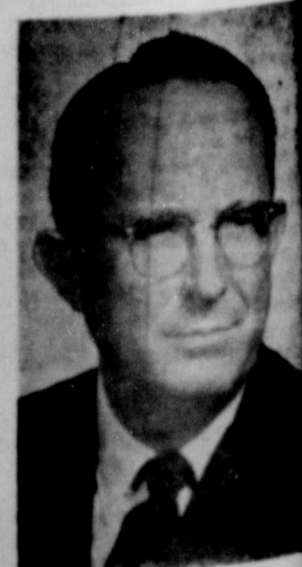

Clarendon JC Offers Driver Contracts

Transportation of students from surrounding towns to Clarendon Junior College is available through student car contracts, according to Weldon E. Day, college dean.

A student who resides in an area town may enter into a contract with the college to transport other students from his area.

The driver-student is paid according to the distance each student travels in his automobile to school. There must be a minimum of three students riding with the driver before a group is eligible for a contract.

The college will pay two cents per mile, plus the following amount each month:

60 miles or over traveled one way, \$10 per rider per month; 50 to 60 miles, \$9 per rider; 40 to 50 miles, \$8 per rider; 30 to 40 miles, \$7 per rider; under 30 miles, \$5 per rider.

Students who ride with a contract driver may also pay him a like amount each month.
