Second reading of the ordinance is scheduled at the next regular meeting of the commission.

The ordinance will become effective 10 days after its publication in the McLean News as a legal notice. The publication is scheduled following the second reading and adoption of the ordnance by the commission.

The ordinance, No. 118, provides that "every retailer who sells or offers for sale in the City of Mc-Lean, Texas, through a meat market, store or otherwise, any meats, either canned, frozen or cured, which are the products of any States, shall clearly label such meat as 'imported,' naming the country of its origin . . . in letters

Retail Trade

A "retailer" is described as "a person regularly engaged in the frozen or cured, at retail to the trade and public as such, and

The word "meat" includes the horses, sheep or goats but shall not include fish or products of

Persons who fail to comply with the ordinance are subject to fine of not more than \$200.
