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

A special truck is delivering the chemical and will be on hand from a.m. until 12 noon. If you have a bindweed problem on your cultivated fields, there is an ACP payment that will cover half the cost of this chemical.

Benzabor is a soil sterilant that comes in a 25-pound bag. One bag will eradicate the bindweed on one-tenth of an acre. The cost is not cheap, nor is any type of soil sterilant.

If you contact the ASCS office and get a purchase order you can sign the purchase order over every man, woman and child at to the Gray County 4-H boys and then make your check out at the rate of \$6 per bag.

If you do not go through the ASC office, the cost is \$12 per bag. The 4-H boys are reimbursed by the ASCS office at the rate of \$6 per bag on all purchase order

Another way is to pay the full \$12 per bag and make application for payment from the ASCS office. at two speeds-the lawful and the In this case the ASCS office will reimburse the farmer at the rate



### THE SPIRIT OF SONSHIP

"For ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but ye have received the spirit of adoption (Lit., sonship), whereby we cry, Abba, Father" (Rom. 8:15)

The position of the believer in the family of God is amply illustrated for us in the epistles of Paul. In Gal. 4:1-5 the apostle alludes to the fact that in the life of every Hebrew boy here came a time, appointed by the father, when the lad was formally declared to be a full-grown son, with all the rights and privileges

It was now assumed that the young man would no longer need overseers to keep him in check. There would be natural understanding and cooperation between father and son. And so the "adoption" (Gr. son-placing) proceedings took place, indicating that the child, now a full-grown son, was no longer under law, but under grace.

"And because ye are sons," says the apostle, "God hath sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying, Abba, Father. Wherefore thou are no more a servant, but a (full-grown) son"

This is the position of every believer in Christ. He may, like the Corinthians, still be a babe in his spiritual experience (I Cor. 3:1), but in Christ he occupies the position of a full-grown son, and to grow spiritually it will do him no good to go back under the law; he must rather recognize his standing before God in grace. This is why the apostle says in Rom. 8:15:

"Ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear, but ye have received the spirit of sonship, whereby we cry, Abba, Father."


