Rogers believes, and so do we, that the Supreme Court is usurping the legislative powers of Congress, and he thinks it is time the people did something about it. many decisions handed down by the highest court in the land have in recent years ruled unconstitutional the laws passed by Congress to deal with Communists.

one Archie Brown. who, our congressman points out, has been "an open and avowed Commuist for more than a quarter of a century." Brown served on the executive board of a union from 1959 until 1961, when he was indicted for knowingly and wilfully serving as a member of an executive board of a labor organization . . . while a member of the Communist Party. in wilfull violation of Title 29 United States Code, Section 504." Brown was found guilty and sentenced to six months imprisonment, but the Court of Appeals reversed the decision and ruled that the law under which he had been found guilty was unconsti-

The case was taken to the Supreme Court, and on June 7 of this year Chief Justice Earl Warren-one of the most controversial justices ever to serve on this high court—wrote an opinion confirming the Court of Appeals decision in setting aside the conviction.




