(Continued from Page 1) weekend, Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, warned Wednesday that 31 persons will die in traffic accidents.

Garrison said the estimate was compiled by the DPS statistical services on the basis of past experience and the present trend in traffic deaths.

Last year, 33 persons met death on Texas roads during the Independence Day holiday.

"Operation Motorcade" will go into effect at 12:01 a.m. Friday and continue through 11:59 p.m. July 4 in order to focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel.

During this statewide emphasis program, fatalities will be tabulated by the department and the totals announced officially three times daily as a means of trying to keep safety uppermost in the minds of the traveling public.

Col. Garrison said that over one-third of the deaths during the last Independence Day holiday were the result of one-car accidents.

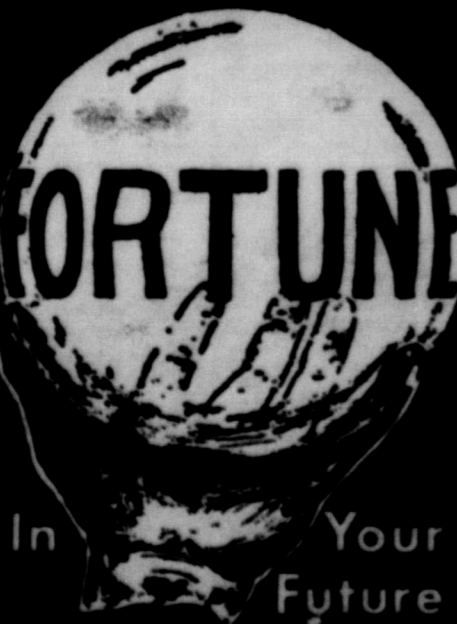

 Often farmers have had it in the McLean vicinity. There will probably be some stands salvaged but many will be skippy. Time is running out.
 If you do not have a stand at this time, I would give thought to planting a fast-maturing hybrid mink.
 Most commercial companies have a fast-maturing variety. If you want to plant a Texas Experiment Station variety, I would consider ES 608. If you plant DeKalb, plant C-4-B.
 We do not recommend any one variety over the other. However, in all fairness to the C-4-B we can point out that this variety did stand at the top of the list in

yield at the Bushland Experiment Station in 1963. It has been on top or near the top for some time. Check with your seed dealer and select one that is fast in maturity.

GRASS CONDITIONS
 I don't believe I've ever seen the grass as good as it is now. This has been one of the best years for seeding grass that I've seen in sometime. Let's not lose these stands of grass from weeds choking out the small grass.

Spray with 2, 4-D is the very best means of control. Use Amine if you are close to someone's cotton.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

George Philpott recently seeded 35 acres of forage sorghum on an area that he plans to plant to native grass next year. He has an excellent stand. This cover crop will protect the grass seedlings from wind erosion and will help conserve moisture.

John Haynes got a good stand of grass on his ranch north of McLean. He seeded an old field that was turned out to pasture several years ago. A seedbed was prepared with 48 inch sweeps prior to seeding. The grass seedlings are one to three inches tall and can be rowed. This type of seeding has proven to be an excellent method of establishing grasses in the Gray County Soil Conservation District.

RECREATION — Recreation is rapidly becoming a business for farmers and ranchers in many parts of the county. More and more people go to the country every weekend to participate in some recreational activity.

We receive reports occasionally about what other cities and states are doing about their recreational problems. One report told about a Texas farmer who has a 29-acre watershed lake on his property. This farmer developed an eight-acre recreational area along the shoreline of the lake. He constructed facilities for picnicking, camping, volleyball, softball and croquet. A fishing pier and diving platform was also constructed. He provides a club house and concession stand to groups for a small rental fee. These facilities are available through annual family membership. About 12 to 15 hundred people enjoy these facilities each year.

Local recreational facilities are

limited. Bill Bralley has fishing ponds available on his ranch east of Groom. His ranch is located between Highway 70 and Lake McClellan. Lake McClellan also provides facilities for picnicking, camping, fishing, boating and skiing. Some landowners lease hunting and fishing rights to residents of this county. We are fortunate to have these recreational opportunities in the Gray County Soil Conservation District. Due to the changing population, the need for recreational facilities are increasing.

Recreation can become a business for many landowners if properly developed. The Panhandle of Texas is limited in outdoor recreational facilities. Every city or community should make plans to provide facilities for their citizens or they will go to other places for their recreational enjoyment. Texas loses many dollars to Oklahoma every year because Texas people go there for fishing, boating, skiing and hunting.

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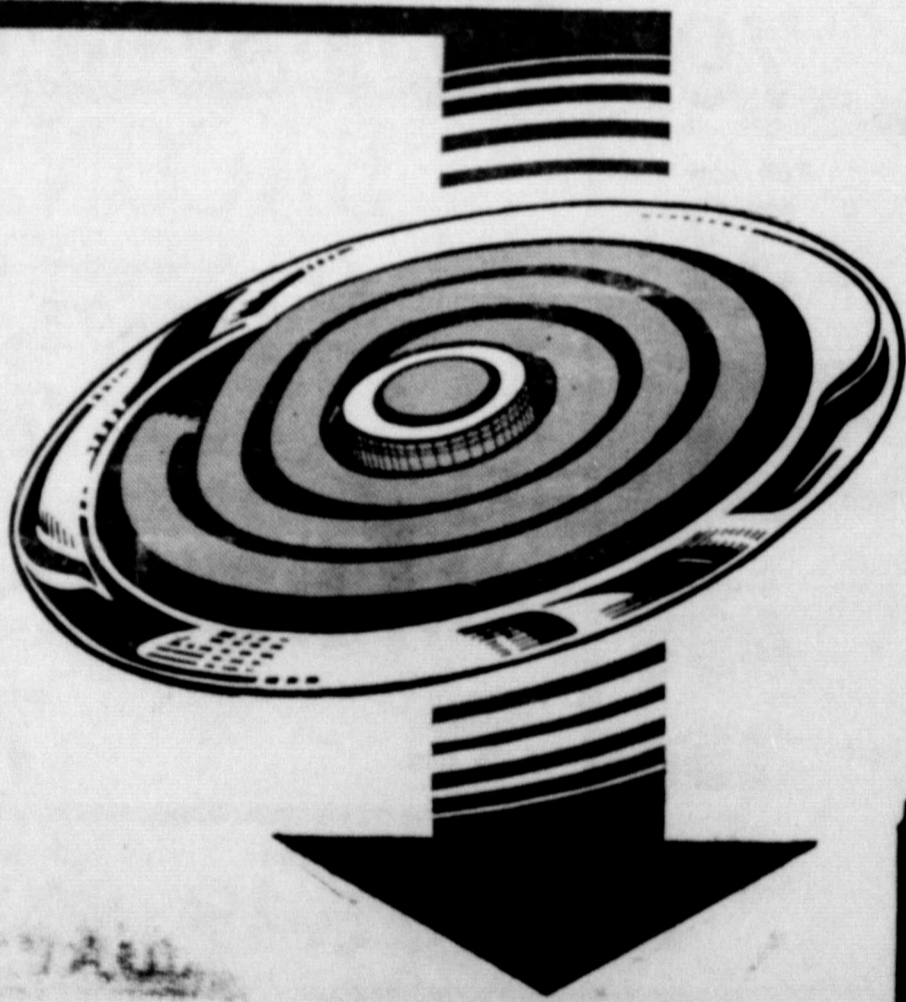

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.
