Dec. Savings Bond Sales Total \$41,981

December sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County totaled \$41,981, according to County Bond Chairman George B. Cree. Sales during 1971 amounted to \$489,263. This represents 116% of the sales goal of \$420,000.

Texasans purchased \$15,207,864 in Savings Bonds during the month. Total Bond sales for 1971 were \$199,830,508 for 110% of the state's goal of \$181.9 million. One hundred six counties and twelve districts in the state achieved their 1971 sales goal.

Nationwide, December sales totaled \$439 million - 14.4% increase above December 1970. During the calendar year 1971, sales of E and H Bonds amounted to \$5.5 billion. This is 114% of the National goal of \$4.8 billion.

One adverse federal court decision after another fuels the feud between Gov. Preston Smith and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. Smith was quick to blame on Barnes the failure of a 1971 filing fee statute which treats to force a special legislative session.

While that issue was still raging, another Dallas three-judge court struck down the legislature's congressional redistricting plan. Once more, Smith accused the lieutenant governor of "reluctance" and "inaction" on redistricting.

When a third court frowned on House of Representatives redistricting in major counties as done by a board Barnes served on, Smith once more leveled at the lieutenant governor charges of "immature action" and lack of leadership. Single-member districts were ordered for Bexar and Dallas counties.

Sen. J.P. Word of Meridian, speaking in Barnes' defense, said Smith offered the legislature no leadership himself and reminded that the governor could have vetoed the congressional redistricting measure if he didn't like it.

Meanwhile, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin succeeded in getting a temporary postponement of the congressional redistricting order. The U.S. Supreme Court agreed to delay the new plan pending appeal.

U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, who intervened as a friend of the court in support of the stay, said congressional candidates for this year, at least, can run in the districts given them by the legislature.

That would be a relief for Congressmen Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls and Omar Burleson of Anson; Jim Wright of Fort Worth and Ray Roberts of McKinney and O.C. Fisher of San Angelo and Abraham Kazen of Laredo who had been pitted against each other in the federal district court plan.

If he has to call a special session on primary election financing, said Smith, he will expect "those responsible for creating this problem" to come up with "workable alternatives."

**Pheasant Hunters Not
Not Too Successful**

The nine day Texas Panhandle pheasant harvest was down from last year, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

Hunters this year took approximately 7,000 birds compared to 12,000 last year.

Biologists for the department blamed the decrease in harvest on a number of things including a lower population of birds this year and rain and snow before and during the season.

The bad weather before the season prevented farmers from turning under the large tracts of crop stubble, and during the season, hunters had a difficult time driving to hunting areas due to the mud.

Only 35% of the hunters this year got birds compared to 57% last year.

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Public School Instrumental Music

By Jerry W. Jansa

Music in the public schools is classed in three basic categories: music as an activity, music as an art, and music as a skill. One of the attractions of music in the schools is that it promotes informality of atmosphere, creates situations in which cooperation is essential, makes use of some physically healthful activities, and involves some interrelationships with the student's home life. Music can provide the benefits of teamwork yet it has an advantage over competitive athletics in its utilization of larger numbers and wider ranges of ability. Compared to the first ten in basketball, the "first string" band contains a large number of students, many of whom have not developed skills at all comparable to the "first string" basketball team. Still they may derive the same feeling of accomplishment from concert and competition, even in last chair.

Music is both a "team sport" and an "individual sport". The player can enjoy his skill alone as well as with the group. For this reason, one may get enjoyment from music after graduation if he cares to. The fact that music can accommodate groups of widely varying size with a wide variety of ability levels and interest levels is strongly in its favor. In addition, one of the important benefits that the successful player acquires is a self-imposed discipline in developing the skills which allow music to be an emotional outlet and a means of self-expression.

Music's firm position may be due primarily to its power as an activity, but its basic essence is art. Public school music may seldom reach the level of art, yet it retains the drawing power of art — the ability to symbolize the feelings of man which cannot be put into conventional language. Like most adults, children are not aware of the symbolic quality of music, but they react to it. In recent years, leaders in the field have focused attention upon music as art, as an aesthetic experience. As parents and teachers, we must be concerned primarily with guiding the student's growth in aesthetic sensitivity and understanding.

Valid music programs need skill-oriented objectives. The student needs mental skills, aural skills, physical dexterity on his instrument, and musical understanding, which must be developed in the same manner as a skill. Knowledge of key signatures, time signatures, clefs, and tempo indications is not enough. The player must also hear the notes as he sees them on the page; he must listen intelligently to hear and understand key centers and modulations as well as meter changes, return of previous thematic materials and changes of mode and texture in the music. He must manage the technical requirements of his part -- of not the first time through, then with a little practice. He should be able to concentrate sufficiently on a short, three-minute piece of music and keep his mind on it actively from beginning to end. He ought to have sufficient tonal memory to retain obvious themes after he has heard them a few times. Any student making music is a performer, and performers possess skills. Each student must excel in his part, even though it may be simple; the necessity for excellence from everyone in the group is the primary reason why performance is of such

value to learning.

If our goals in instrumental music are realized, we can accept both the talented and the semi-talented student and find a place for them, so that they can have the experiences music offers which help them grow as an individual and a member of society.

How Is Your Family Communications?

Ever feel like you're just not getting through to someone in your family?

You've got to know how to communicate effectively if you want to be understood and want to understand someone else, according to Jane Fleischer, family life education specialist at Texas A&M.

"Only as you accurately understand and are understood can you achieve successful interpersonal relationships," Miss Fleischer said. "Communication is a process or a tool. And the degree of success with which we use it helps determine the degree of success achieved in family relationships.

The specialist suggested some ways of improve family communication:

"Respect the personality of each person as an individual. Answer the simple, direct questions children ask. Listen to what the person says -- both in words and gestures or expressions

"Try to prevent outbursts of anger and thoughtless remarks. If they do occur, follow with a sincere apology. When disagreements arise, talk them over before the molehill of bickering becomes a mountain of stony silence or an erupting volcano."

Miss Fleischer said that each husband and wife and every family member needs to discipline himself in the early stages of anger to avoid any ridicule or nagging. "The opposite of these -thoughtfulness, appreciation, courtesy and gratitude -- are like showers on parched land."

An additional way to improve communication is to say a considerate word or do some simple thing out of impulsive affection. "Don't put off until tomorrow the thoughtful words you can say today.
