Livestock Inspector Completes Training

Vernon Turner a Livestock Inspector with USDA Animal Plant Health Service (APHIS) at McLean has completed a training course in cattle scabies identification. Mr. Turner will be working in Gray County, Texas to help cattlemen move their livestock to market during the current cattle scabies quarantine.

The quarantine is aimed at halting the worst cattle scabies outbreak to hit the nation since 1959. The eradication effort needs specially trained men like Mr. Turner because the mites that cause cattle scab are hard to spot. The mites are often masked by pesticides used to kill ticks and lice.

Mr. Turner and the other inspectors in the quarantine area are helping cattle men identify infected animals and clean them of mites. If every head of infected and exposed cattle in the quarantine area is inspected and the affected animal is properly dipped for scabies the quarantine can be lifted.

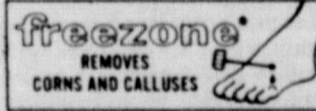

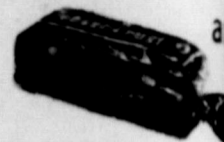

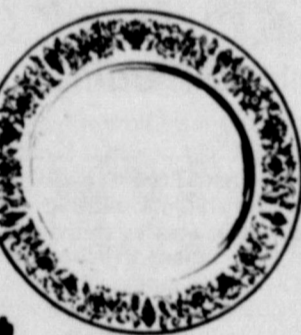

MILO HARVEST

Many farmers of irrigated milo are just now finishing the harvesting of their 1971 Milo crop. Losses from shrinkage have been tremendous. One farmer that had a 7,000 pound potential yield harvested only 4,300 pounds the last day of 1971.

Ole timers say fall moisture was the greatest since 1923. The old saying, "One extreme follows another" was very true in the 1971 weather pattern. Now that we have had extremely bad weather may be we can have some extremely good weather. Let's hope!

SCABIES

Vernon Turner, McLean, is your local inspector with the Animal Health Service of the USDA. We have run into Vernon while he was inspecting cattle recently. There is no charge for the service of his issuing a permit. If you have show cattle that will be going out of state, you should check with Vernon at once. These cattle may require a dipping, under the supervision of Vernon or other Animal Health inspectors.

HOG CHOLERA QUARANTINE

Due to several outbreaks over the state, we now have another quarantine imposed on the movement of swine. Any swine that are moved are held under quarantine for a 30-day period at their point of destination after arrival. Show hogs can move from show to show under certain conditions. They must have health certificates issued within 40 hours prior to the animal entering each show, showing herd of origin inspection (or initial movement), and the temperature of the swine being moved.

This quarantine is presently in effect and will remain so until further notice.

The welcome mat is always out for any new members.

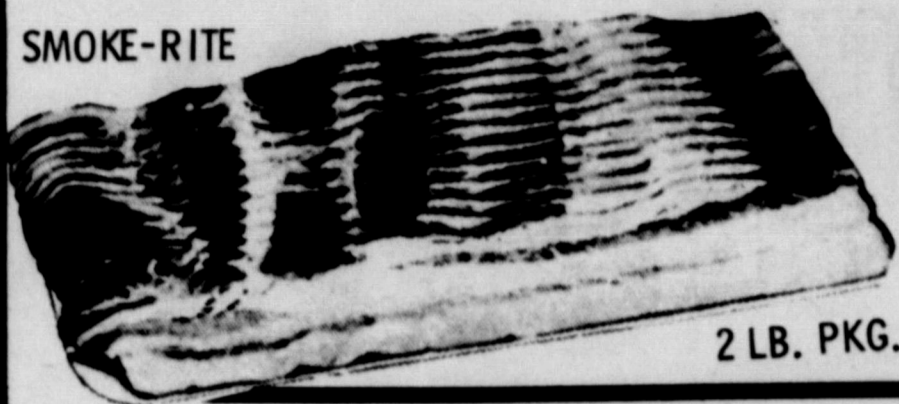

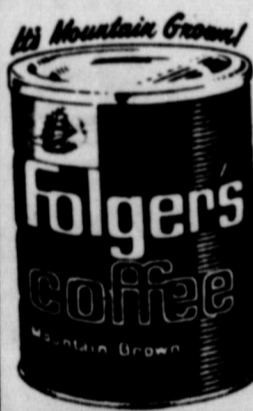

Telephone Increase Seen In McLean During 1971

More than 1,100 telephones were in service in McLean as of December 1, a healthy increase of two per cent during 1971, Gary Stevens, manager for Southwestern Bell, said recently.

"Telephone growth is considered a good indicator of overall economic growth," Stevens said. "The addition of 20 phones last year shows that McLean is on the grow."

Stevens said McLean residents are using their phones more, too. "In November, 4,264 calls were dialed here on an average business day. That's a 4.4% increase over November of 1970."

The 1972 budget includes expenses for central office equipment, buildings and additional plant facilities, such as telephone cable, in an area covering approximately the western two-thirds of Texas.

Candidates for the legislature are keeping an anxious eye on a federal court which last week heard massive, consolidated challenges to House and Senate redistricting.

The three judges listened to four days of testimony and arguments and took the case under study. A decision is expected in a week or two in order to allow time for appeals to the U. S. Supreme Court before the February 7 filing deadline.

Emphasis in the trail of suits filed in San Antonio, Tyler, Houston and Dallas was on the issue of single member vs. multi-member (county wide) House of Representatives districts for metropolitan areas.

Challengers of the 1971 reapportionment (based on the 1970 census) by a five-member board made these key claims:

* Countywide districts tend to prevent election of blacks, Mexican-Americans and Republicans.

* Single member or individual districts for the big counties insure a smaller constituency and thereby make legislators more available, responsive and accountable to the voters.

The state, in defense of the 1971 reapportionment, maintained:

* Multi-member districts are not discriminatory and do not dilute minority group representation.

* Prior Supreme Court rulings have held that either multi-or single-member districts are acceptable as long as they are fairly drawn.

* Single-member districts tend to fragment a county's representation and lessen chances of delegation harmony on key countywide issues.

Federal Circuit Judge Irving L. Goldberg of Dallas, U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler and U.S. District Judge John H. Wood Jr. of San Antonio must make the decision whether to invalidate the apportionment and draw new lines or let the board's plan stand.

CAMPAIGN REPORTS URGED
Secretary of State Bob Bullock has urged state and county political organization chairmen to report campaign contributions and expenditures as candidates are directed to.

He said 31 other states require such reports by law, though Texas does not. State Democratic Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto rebuked Bullock for "overreaching" his authority.

Bullock disclosed he is having legislation drafted to require full disclosure by political parties at the state and local levels. Until that legislation can be enacted, he recommended the political organizations make the reports voluntarily on contributions and expenditures after Jan. 1, 1972.

The secretary suggested filing reports on party funds used for county office campaigns with the county clerk, district or state office reports with the secretary of state here and reports of party money spend in local elections with the city secretary or city clerk.

MASS ASSEMBLY RULES STUDIED -- Texas Department of Public Safety set a February 20 hearing on proposed rules and regulations and minimum safety and good order standards for mass gatherings.

The 62nd Legislature directed DPS to promulgate such rules which must be met by promoters in order to get official permission to hold mass gatherings, such as out-door rock concerts.

Among the proposed rules those governing adequate parking, lighting, access by emergency vehicles and responsibility of the promoter to preserve order within the assigned area.

COURTS SPEAK
The Texas Supreme Court sustained lower court orders stopping sale of 500 magazines, films, books and cards found by a San Antonio judge to be "obscene."

The Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, whose judgment was affirmed, had earlier knocked down that part of the original trail-order prohibiting sale of "similar" material.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld the State Board of Examiners of Psychologists and refused to direct certification of a man who holds a doctorate in education and 127 hours of psychology graduate courses.

A Victoria County mother won in the Supreme Court a new trial of her suit to regain custody of five children adopted by grandparents.

AG OPINIONS - Resident aliens are eligible for old age assistance and aid to the blind, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held in light of U.S. Supreme Court decisions.
