The current state of High Plains agriculture will be the theme of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Panhandle Economic Program in Amarillo, March 17.

The Panhandle Economic Program was begun in 1964 in an attempt to furnish High Plains agricultural producers and homemakers the most current information available to increase income and raise the standard of home life, explains Foster Whaley, Gray County agricultural agent. The program is administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The conterence will be highlighted by reports of the various task forces, which serve as subcommittees of the program. These areas include agricultural industry, crop and livestock production, and family living

Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from College Station, will speak on "Building the Panhandle by Resource Development.

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

Children Should Know Bicycle Safety Rules

Everyone's riding bicycles, especially children who often must ride in heavy traffic.

Most children have some riding experience, but unless they learn the rules of safety, serious trouble lies ahead.

Like shoes, purchase bicycles to fit, not to grow into. Bikes too large for the rider are too hard to handle safely.

A bicycle is a vehicle, so teach the child to ride the bike on the right side of the street.

"Instruct your child in the use of hand signals. Teach them the meaning of such items as 'right-of-way' and 'intersec-

Are the seat and handle bars safe and comfortable? No one style is safer than the other -lightweight, middleweight, racing or touring bike or the lar high-rise bike.

Bicyclists are hard to see at night or in early morning

"Be sure your child wears light-colored clothing, has reflectors and lights on his bike or reflector tape on his bike or clothing. This precaution is especially important for youngsters with paper routes. It you have a paper boy in your home, remind him of this.

Repair and maintain a bicycle just like the family car. Good maintenance yeidls good, safe operational conditions. Check brakes to insure a smooth, safe stop.

If the bike has optional equipment such as gears, be certain to insure a smooth safe stop.

If the bike has optional equipment such as gears, be certain the child knows how to operate the bike without losing control.

State Capitol

Gov. Preston Smith left timing of a special legislative session up in the air after the Texas Supreme Court, in effect, said there has to be one.

The High Court, not unexpectedly, concluded that Secretary of State Bob Bullock could not order public financing of primary elections without prior legislative authority.

Smith conceded that apparently left him no alternative but to summon lawmakers back to work in advance of the May 6 primaries. He said he wanted to postpone the unhappy deed as long as possible and was not prepared to say when he would have to act.

Meanwhile, to help Smith with his decision, Bullock's staff compiled data on estimated costs of the May 6 and June 3 elections and when the bills would fall due.

Most legislators faced with election campaigns hoped the session would be limited to the primary finance issued alone -or perhaps that and highway bill board controls. The latter legislation is needed soon to avoid a threatened \$24 million cut in federal road building funds allot ed Texas.

Another special session will be needed later (unless Smith decides to lump all business into a single pre-election call) to approve a 1973 state appropriation act replacing the budget items vetoed last year by the govern-

Bitterness is expected to flare in the House of Representatives on opening day of the session -- whenever it is. An effort is almost certain to be made to oust Speaker Gus Mutscher who is being tried in Abilene on char ges of conspiring to accept a bribe in the form of 1969 bank loans and pre-arranged insurance stock profits.

A coalition, in an effort to avert the House clash, is pushing Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi as interim spesker. The leading speakership candi-date, Rep. Rayford Price of

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Palestine, wants a showdown vote on electing a new speaker immediately.

CRIMES INCREASE

More major crimes were committed in Texas in 1971 than in 1970, but the increase actually was the smallest since 1963, the Department of Public Safety

Cities over 100,000 popula tion reported fewer major crimes! - a total of 298, 033 as compared with 307, 140 in 1970. The overall crime rate for the big cities was up three-tenths of one per cent.

The DPS Crime Report based on information submitted by Texas sheriffs and chiefs of police shows 482, 386 major criminal offenses during 1971, an increase of 13, 324 over 1970. All categories except theft increased. There were 1,687 murders, 3, 054 rapes, 14, 386 robberies, 137, 140 burglaries, 34, 472 ag-grevated assaults, 48, 323 auto thefts and 243, 344 thefts. STORM INSURANCE CUT - A 26% reduction in windstorm insurance rates for nonbeach property in 14 coastal counties was ordered last week.

The cut, directed by the State Board of Insurance, takes effect before the hurricane season for those structures at least 2,500 feet from shore, 20 feet above mean sea level or protected by a seawall.

Property owners have been paying 150% above normal rates through the Texas Catastrophe Property Insurance Pool, Beachfront property will continue at three times standard rates.

The Insurance Board also raised the maximum amount of insurance available through the pool from \$100,000 to \$200,000 on dwellings and from \$500,000 to \$1 million on commercial properties including schools and public buildings.

VETERANS LAND BONDS SOLD Forty million dollars worth of Texas veterans land bonds to sold last week at the lowest finance the program which has enabled almost 46,000 Texas veterans to buy land.

SIGNS CHANGING - Watch for changes in traffic control devices, signs, signals and markings along Texas highways.

Texas Highway Commission ap-proved them in the manual on uniform traffic control devices. based on recommendations of the American Association of State Highway Officials and Federal Highway Administration.

Changeover will be from words to symbols and pictures as part of an international move toward ter uniformity and c road signs. The change will be gradual, with new signs going up initially on a replacement basis Panels explaining the new symbols will be placed under the signs at first, then removed in about five years.

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


