Rain Delays First Rodeo Performance

BUT 3 MORE NIGHTS SET AT WEBB ARENA

As it so often does, rain halted the first McLean 66 Rodeo performance Wednesday night even before it got started.

But, weather permitting, the top attraction of the annual McLean 66 Round-up Rodeo and Horse Show celebration will be staged tonight and for the next two nights at the Felton Webb Arena north of town.

A make-up rodeo performance also probably will be scheduled before the celebration ends.

In past years, when one night of the rodeo was rained out the fourth performance was held on Sunday afternoon, but it had not been announced this morning whether this would be the case again.

Rodeos are scheduled at 8 p.m. each day through Saturday, and more than 200 entries have been received for the events—saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heeling and bulldogging.

Top cowboys from Texas and surrounding states are in McLean to compete for the \$2,500 in prize money and \$225 trophy saddles. A saddle will be awarded to the cowboy with the best average time in each of the six events.

A saddle also is being offered for the first time to the winner, in two go-rounds, of the girls (See RAIN, Page 5)

Hail, Wind, Rains Hit City 2 Days

Booming thunderstorms roamed over McLean and the entire Panhandle Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, and were continuing to dump welcome moisture over this area in the wee hours of today.

One storm pelted the city with marble-sized hail and heavy, wind-driven rain late Tuesday afternoon, stripping leaves, small branches and fruit from trees.

A total of 1.50 inches of moisture was measured in town, but some rain gauges in the area showed two inches or more.

The hail was even heavier around Alanreed, which Gray County Agent Foster Whaley said resembled a ski resort.

Stops Rodeo

Wet weather returned at about 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, just in time to cancel out the first performance of the McLean 66 Rodeo. This time the moisture totaled .85 inch, bringing to 7.01 the amount McLean has received this year.

By this date last year, 5.50 inches had been recorded here.

Temperatures were on the warm side during the past week, reaching a high of 94 degrees on Tuesday. The low was 54 degrees last Friday and Saturday.

All three of the horses trained by Willoughby were ridden in the races by Ronald Bass of Shamrock.

All persons desiring to enroll should attend a meeting at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the grade school cafeteria.

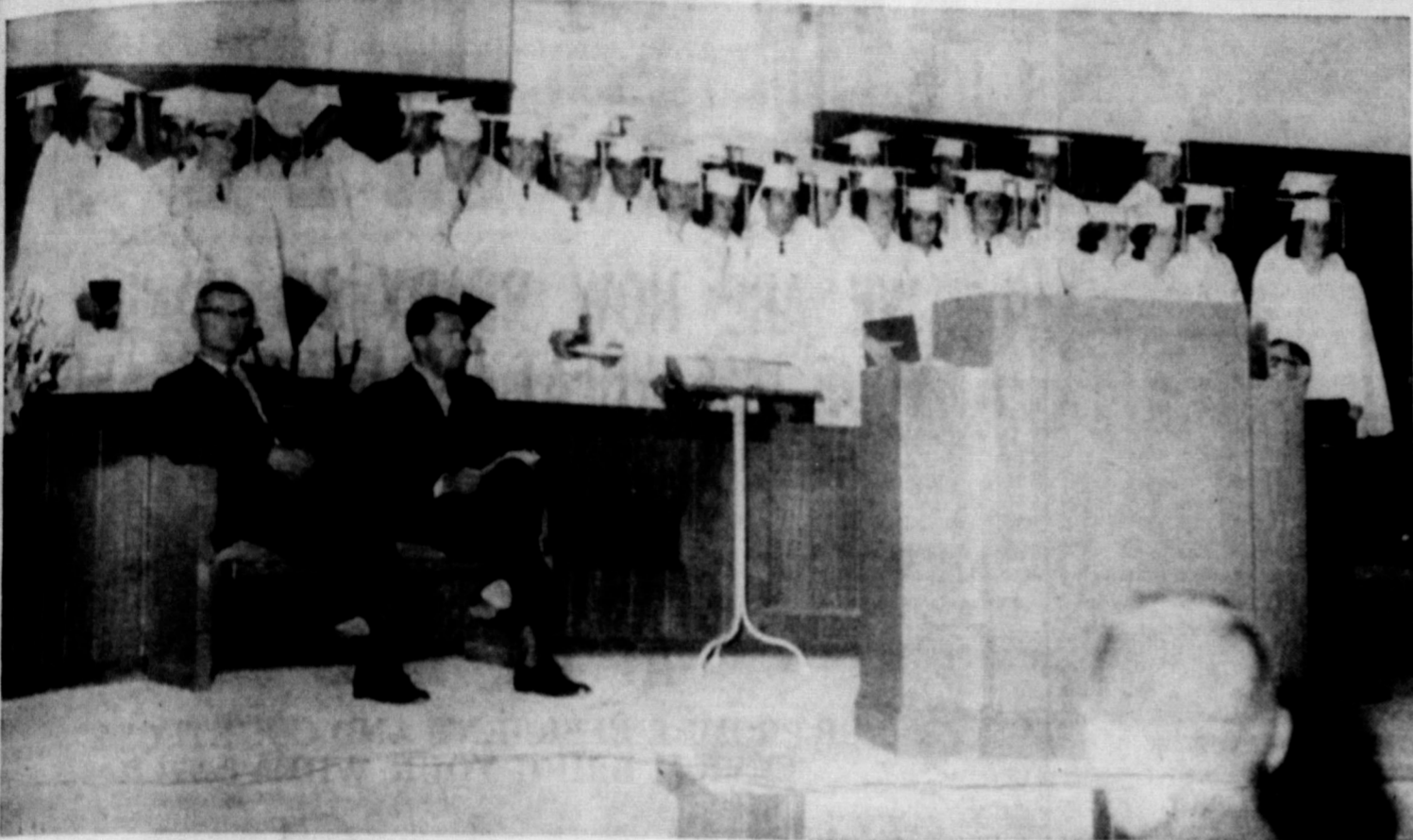
Those interested in taking the training may call Hedgecock at GR 9-2662.

RAIN

On Tuesday of this week I ran into one of the severest rain and hail storms that I have experienced in sometime.

Between Jericho and Alanreed the hail and rain were extremely bad. The hills in this area looked like a ski area for awhile.

It is now time to plant cotton the second time. I wouldn't put any seed or fertilizer in the boxes because we usually get hailed or rained out at least two times.

The rain was badly needed all over the range area.

WEED SPRAYING

Now that the cotton is washed out and the weeds are growing pretty fast, this would be an ideal time to spray your weeds. If your neighbor's cotton survived the storm you might want to use Amine type 2, 4-D.

Otherwise, I would use the Ester type of 2, 4-D. Use about one-half pound of chemical per acre. In other words, if your 2, 4-D contains four pounds per gallon of acid, use one pint per acre.

BINDWEED

Don't overlook the big danger from letting bindweed go without controlling it in this area. It has ruined many a field up on the hardlands.

It will likewise ruin your good cotton land.

Ross Collie and I plan to treat a small patch on Mrs. Trew's place. I have assisted Bryan McPherson in treating another small patch on his farm west of town.

SCREW WORM PROGRAM

Only seven cases of screwworms have been detected in Texas in 1965. Thanks to the efforts of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the thousands of ranchers who made this possible through their cooperation.

From our information specialist at College Station comes this bit of information, I quote:

Agriculture Secretaries Here Saturday

"Final preparations are being made for the visit of U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman and his counterpart in Mexico, Juan Gil Preciado, to the screwworm headquarters.

"Both secretaries are due to arrive at the eradication center at 10:30 this Saturday. Mrs. Freeman will also be there, along with members of the Senate and House of Representatives.

"Following a quick briefing and tour of the facilities, the cabinet officers and their party will drive to the Lloyd Benson Ranch for a barbecue luncheon sponsored by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. Both Secretary Freeman and Secretary Preciado are scheduled to speak at the luncheon.

"It will be the first time the two secretaries will have met, and their meeting will take place at the facilities of the program which promises to tie the Mexico and the United States even closer together in international cooperation. There has been strong sentiment by livestock industry representatives in both countries for expansion of the eradication program to include all of Mexico.

House Committee Cuts Screwworm Fund Request

"The screwworm eradication program will have to operate on considerably less money next fiscal year if the recommendation of the House Appropriations Committee is accepted by both House and Senate.

"The committee last week approved \$2,806,200 for operation of the barrier zone along the international border for the year beginning July 1. President Johnson in his budget message to Congress had requested \$5,056,000.

"The committee said the amount it approved would be sufficient to maintain a barrier 100 miles wide to prevent reinfestation of the Southwest. The money would not have to be matched by state or private funds.

"Reportedly, some committee members felt that if a barrier of greater width is required, Mexico should participate in financing the cost."

Highway Commission Approves New Road To Lake McClellan

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the spending of \$96,000 for construction of a new farm to market road to Lake McClellan, according to District Engineer Charles W. Smith of Amarillo.

Included in the project is the construction of 3.3 miles of new road in Gray County extending from the end of FM 2477, 4.5 miles southeast of SH 70, south-east to Lake McClellan.

The construction will include grading, structures and surfacing and will be under the supervision of G. K. Reading, supervising resident engineer from Pampa.

This will be a part of the 1965 farm to market road program in Texas.

It was also announced this week that a contract for 5.497 miles of construction on FM 282 in the county has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

To Perry LeFors Field
Cooper and Woodruff, Inc., of Amarillo submitted the low bid of \$143,118.15 on the project for re-construction, grading, structures, base and surfacing from SH 152 to Perry LeFors Air Field near Pampa.

The project is expected to take 100 working days, according to Smith.

Reading also will be in active charge of this work.

Highway construction authorized for Gray County is part of a 911.2-mile state-wide farm to market road-building program for this year.

The program will include 207 individual projects in 153 counties at an estimated cost of \$23.5 million.

The Highway Commission's action brings the total designated FM system to 37,779 miles, of which 35,026 had been built by April 30. Another 773 miles were under construction on that date.
