23% Of 1972 Savings Bond Goal Reached

February sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County totaled \$53,289 according to County Bond Chairman, George B. Cree. Sales for the two-month period were \$97,955 - 23% of the 1972 sales goal.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$19,273,003 compared to \$17,302,962 during February 1971 -- an increase of 11%. Sales for the first two months totaled \$38,638,596 for 19% of the yearly sales goal of \$202.3 million.

National sales during February were \$537 million, 24.5% above 1971 sales of \$431 million. The first two month sales totaled \$1,058 million, 22.9% above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$55 million were reported for the first two months of 1972 -- 32% above the \$42 million exchanged during 1971.

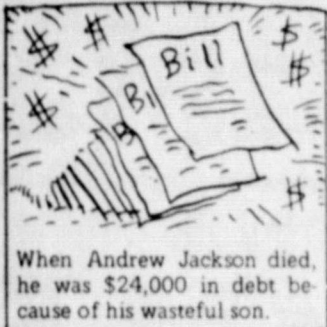

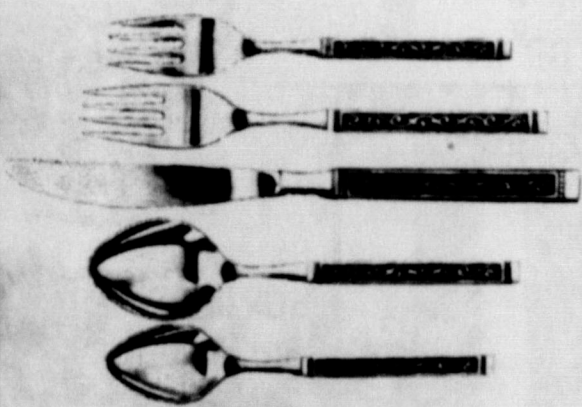

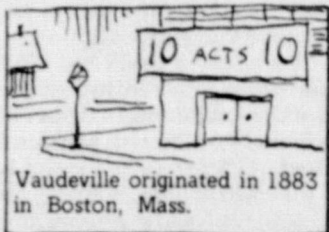
McLean Students Get Invitation to Model Congress In Pampa

Students from McLean High School have been invited to participate in a Model Congress to be held at Pampa High School on April 22, according to Pampa attorney, John W. Warner, who will be serving as general chairman.

The project is a joint project between the Pampa Jaycees and the Social Studies Department of Pampa High School.

The morning session will be devoted mainly to joint committee meetings working out the wording on bills relating to school busing, pollution, sky jacking, equal rights for women, gun laws, abortion, abolishing capital punishment and other bills of particular interest to students. Many bills that the students will consider will be the same as are presently pending before Congress.

In the afternoon part the students will divide into two groups to debate the bills in the same fashion the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives does.

County's Farms Now Total 503 Reports U. S. Census Bureau

Gray county showed a total of 503 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 421.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 381 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 311 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 1,153.9 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$141,306.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$28,607,402; in 1964, \$7,918,750.

2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$3,167,402; in 1964, \$2,020,869.

3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$25,440,000; in 1964 \$5,895,708.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 5 of the county's \$2,500 and-over farms are incorporated.

EXOTIC NEWCASTLE

The spread of exotic Newcastle disease in southern California has brought on a national emergency, but Texas should escape the threat of the poultry disease, says Dr. James Armstrong, Extension veterinarian. Although several cases of the disease were found in the El Paso area last December, these are under control. Sentinel birds susceptible to the disease were placed on the quarantined premises and to date they have remained healthy.

Workshop For Small Business's To Be Held At Dumas

A Small Business Administration Workshop, co-sponsored by the SBA and the Southwestern Public Service Company will be held in the Reddy Room of the Dumas office of Southwestern beginning at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, April 11.

"Money for Your Expansion Plans" will be the theme for the workshop which is designed to point out to present industries in the area the avenues for financial and technical assistance which will aid them in expanding their operations.

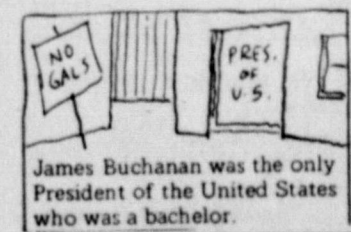
The speakers from the SBA, Lubbock office, including Phillip J. O'Jibway, district director, Jud Simpkins, loan specialist; Carl Lightner, community economic development specialist; and J.B. Hare, from the procurement and management assistance division, will advise participants on availability of direct government loans and community loans and how to get government contracts.

Bud Reed of the Texas Industrial Commission in Austin will discuss the sources of assistance in employee training and Peter Dallas, vice president of the First National Bank of Amarillo, will speak on what a banker wants to know.

The West Texas Business Development Corporation, a new industry-financing plan, will be explained by Bob Brummal, chairman of the new corporation. Brummal is Southern Division manager for Southwestern Public Service Company.

Larry Milner, manager of industrial development for Southwestern, said the workshop would be of interest to manufacturers, businessmen and community leaders throughout the area.

"The very heart of industrial development is for area and community leaders to help those industries they already have expand and develop so they can play a bigger role in the economic growth of the region. Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol

Texans have just a few days more -- until April 5 -- to register to vote in the May 6 primaries.

Major state candidates, including Gov. Preston Smith, viewed with alarm registration totals so far. They noted that less than 3.8 million had registered as of last weekend, although there are nearly 7.7 million qualified voters in the state.

Present registrations are trailing the corresponding period in 1968 by 294,000 and the 1970 figure by more than 370,000.

In 1968, observed gubernatorial candidate Frances Farenthold, 64% of qualified voters were registered before the primaries. This year, only 48% of the potentially-eligible are registered. Former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough pointed out that 63.4% of those qualified registered in 1970, and the 1972 dropoff is reflected in many "working class" neighborhoods.

Nearly one million more should register by April 5 if previous patterns are followed, Smith said.

Under the state's new voter registration system, which candidates Fraenhold and Yarborough lauded as one of the nation's best, citizens have until 30 days before any election to register and become eligible to vote.

The U.S. Supreme Court threw some confusion over the registration system with a ruling that 12 months' state and six months' local residency requirements for voter eligibility (like those of Texas) are unconstitutional.

The High Court said 30 days' residency is sufficient for any state. Secretary of State Bob Bullock took the case under study. Special legislative attention may be necessary. TPA POLLS NORTH AND EAST TEXAS -- Editors and publishers were polled at the annual meeting of the North and East Texas Press Association in Palestine last week.

First question was -- "Who will carry your county in the primary? In the Democratic Governor's race, the newsmen voted: Barnes, 25; Briscoe, 20; Smith, 8 and Farenthold, 3. Republican gubernatorial candidates rated were: Fay, 12; Grover and Reagan, 9 each.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race it was: Hall, 27, Connally, 14 and Hobby, 12.

The editors selected Sanders 28 and 19 over Yarborough in the U.S. Senate primary.

Asked whom they would vote for personally, the tally read: Briscoe, 19, Barnes, 14; Smith, 8 and Farenthold, 5.

They selected Hall, 26 over Hobby, 10 and Connally, 7. In the U.S. Senate primary they voted for Sanders 18 to 7 over Yarborough. In the 1972 General Election poll they voted for Tower 21 to 5 over Sanders.

INSURANCE RATES AGAIN -- Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver lambasted two Board colleagues for proposing a \$27 million homeowners increase which he termed "unnecessary, unjustifiable and an insult to the intelligence of the people of Texas."

Board members Ned Price and Durwood Manford denied any new rates have been finally adopted and said they likely won't be before June 1.

Teaver, who advocates a \$14 million decrease in fire and other building coverage, called another meeting for March 29 to review Board actions and to recommend an "economic trend factor" be kept out of rates pending a study of the price freeze and inflation.

COURTS SPEAK --

The State Supreme Court April 26 will hear a lawsuit concerning invasion of privacy and whether a telephone company owes customers protection from a wiretap by an employee.

HOSPITAL BUDGET COMPLETE

Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation will seek \$141.8 from the legislature for its 1973 fiscal year operations.

SPECIAL ELECTION SET -- A special election has been set for June 13 in Jefferson County to fill the unexpired term of the late Rep. Will Lee Smith of Beaumont.

Smith, dean of the House of Representatives, died March 17 of a heart attack. He was unopposed for a 13th term in the Democratic primary.

SHORT SNOOKS

More than \$1.5 billion in bonds have been approved by the attorney general in the last 15 months without a challenge.

Alabama Gov. George Wallace launched a campaign for Texas Democratic delegate votes in the presidential contest.

Texas construction indexes jumped to previously-unachieved heights due to new office-bank buildings and apartments.

A liberal group threatens a rump or challenge Texas delegation will go to the national convention unless new Democratic rules are altered.

A State Welfare Department employee cannot continue to work and draw his state salary while campaigning for city council, according to a new attorney general's opinion.

Department of Public Safety reported it received only 194 complaints as the result of more than 3.8 million contacts made by its four uniformed services with citizens during 1971.

Panhandle Pheasant Prospects Are Good

Texas is now known as a major pheasant-producer, but a modest colony of the colorful game birds is thriving in the Panhandle.

And so far, this spring has all the earmarks of a good production season for the birds, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Mild weather, a good standing crop of holdover birds and an expected good wheat crop all should combine to produce enough birds for a good hunting season next fall.

As usual, cover is the vital factor for the birds in the Panhandle flat-lands where most of the available acreage is plowed for agricultural production.

Department wildlife specialists recommend that landowners leave as much weedy cover as possible for the birds during the nesting season.

A variety of trees, shrubs and other plants are used by pheasants for food and cover. Some of the more popular cover are Russian olive, red juniper, fruit trees, wild plum and multiflora rose.

A successful nine-day season was held during December in most counties of the Panhandle Regulatory District, with a daily bag limit of two cocks and possession limit of four.

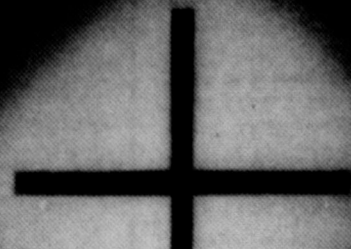
