Voter Registration Rules Changed

The decision of the United States Supreme Court has invalidated state laws which require more than 30 days residency in the state or locality

in order to be eligible to vote.

Persons who have resided in the state and locality for 30 day and have been registered for 30 days prior to the election in which they wish to vote are now eligible to vote in state and local elections. Persons entering the state may register to vote immediately upon their arrival.



Records Show Rabies On Increase

Rabies in man doesn't happen too often, but the disease still is one to be reckoned with because of its presence in wildlife and the increase in the number of pets owned by Texans.

Those who believe that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure should guard their pets against rabies by having them vaccinated, says the Texas State Department of Health. It is a good way of protecting your pets--and your self--against the threat of rabies.

Rabies last year was on the increase after a record low number of cases in 1970. Following a low of only 226 cases, laboratory confirmed animal rabies rose to 322 cases in 1971.

Surprisingly, cat rabies cases outnumbered the number of dog cases last year. This can be interpreted two ways. First, it could be interpreted to mean that the vaccination of dogs is showing results. Or, it could mean that cat exposure to rabies is increasing and that cat vaccinations aren't on par with those of dogs.

Whichever reason you choose, you'd be correct.

Of the 39 pets which came down with rabies, the cats outnumber the dogs 21 to 18. Dog rabies cases showed a decline by one case, but the number of rabid cats increased from 16 to 21 in one year.

The Veterinery Public Health Division of the State Health Department instituted a bite surveillance program during 1971, and the nine-month results showed the need for more pet rabies protection. Of 5, 119 dogs invloved in biting episodes only 34.1 per cent--or about one-third, were known to have been vaccinated. The percentage was much worse for cats. Of 835 cats involved in biting incidents, less than 10 per cent were known to have rabies pro-

As usual, wildlife rabies cases took the spotlight in 1971 with 252 cases. Rabid skunks headed the list with 186 of the 252 confirmed cases. Thirty-one cases of rabies were confirmed in livestock last year.

To protect the public, the State Health Department fumished 689 anti-rabies treatment series (14 Injections) to bite victims last year. This treatment is doing the job, and the last human fatality to naturally acquired rabies in Texas was in 1962.

The record is good, but Health Department officials believe that the odds against rabies can be better if all petsdogs and cats--are protected against rabies.

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

Library Week Set April 16-22 In Texas

"Reading Makes the World Go Round,"

That's what Texas librarians will be saying April 16 through 22 when they take part in this year's observance of National Library Week.

Libraries of all kinds are observing the week that calls special attention to libraries as sources of information and recreation. In addition to the state's 380 public libraries, there are also more than 70 college and university libraries as well as libraries in nearly all of the 1,200 school districts.

In his proclamation Governor Preston Smith pointed out that "through organization into systems, libraries look forward to sharing of resources in order to equalize the opportunity for all citizens to have access to the best services,"

Since January, ten library systems have been organized under the Texas Library Systems Act passed by the legislature in 1969. The legislation permits public libraries that reach specified levels of local support to enter into agreements with one another and to receive State funds when they are appropriated to carry out cooperative activities.

"The Library Systems Act and the cooperative activities it provides can have a significant impact on library service for all Texans, "said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library, the state agency that administers the legislation. "Although all system members are public libraries, the cooperative programs developed by the systems may also include other kinds of libraries."

CATTLE SCABIES

It is my understanding Vernon Turner has resigned as inspector for Texas animal Health Commission. As of this date, I have not been advised as to who his replacement will be. I plan to contact them in the near future in an effort to have a representative for this area.

Effective June 1st dipping of all cattle in movement or cattle changing ownership will be required. There are a long list of exceptions, so don't panic until you have checked your situation with the local inspector or me. Basic cow herds will not be required to be dipped unless ownership is changed or if you are moving the cattle,

WHEAT PASTURE

An abundant supply of wheat pasture is available in spite of dry weather. Some dry land but excellent rank pasture is going for \$6.00 per acre. This makes wheat pasture for less than 50¢ per cut.
