Gov. Ben Barnes Make Copter Tour

Gov. Ben Barnes, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas, today announced plans to tour ten Panhandle counties by helicopter Thursday, April 20.

Barnes, who was highly enthusiastic about the crowds his campaign for Governor was drawing across the state, told reporters and supporters earlier this week that his campaign was gaining momentum daily.

The Lt. Governor and his wife are expected to land in McLean near the downtown area of each city.

Gov. Barnes, all-pro defense lawyer, is expected to travel with Lt. Gov. Barnes.

Tender Loving Care & The Hungry Child

It's common knowledge that when children don't eat enough they don't grow properly.

However, the reason for their inadequate food intake is frequently misunderstood, according to foods and nutrition specialist Sally Springer.

"In certain circumstances, infants unexpectedly become dwarfed and remain grossly underweight, weighing perhaps as little as 15 pounds at 18 months instead of the normal 25 or 30 pounds," said Miss Springer, who works for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Although this type of condi-

tion has been observed and recorded for over 60 years, the simple reason for it has been overlooked, according to the specialist.

"It has always been thought that the baffling starvation which occurs in children who maternally deprived is due solely to the lack of tender loving care, social contact, physical handling and sensory stimulation," Miss Springer said. "Recent observations have shown, however, that lack of mothering by itself doesn't cause physical stunting and growth failure unless a adequate food is withheld, or less frequently, unless the child's appetite suffers."

A recent research report demonstrated that when infants

who had been subjected to maternal deprivation in their homes were fed as much as they wanted to eat in the hospital, the majority gained weight at an accelerated rate.

"Futhermore," Miss Springer said, "the amounts the infants gained when they were grossly undermothered equaled the amount they gained when placed in a setting where nurses provided a high level of fondling and handling and social contact in the form of talking and playing games. The amount of food eaten under these two types of mothering was also the same."

Now Is The Time For Farmers To Think About Brush Control

Now is the time to think about brush control in our area says Phil Richey, Range Conservationist with the SCS in Pampa. We have something like 105,000 acres of brush in Gray County about 90% of which is sand sage and shinoak.

Some may ask why control brush of this type. True, sage and shinoak provide good habitat for wildlife such as quail. Shinoak will produce feed for cattle in the late spring and summer. However, brush chokes out desirable grasses which also make wildlife habitat and very excellent grazing for cattle. A pasture without brush produce far more grazing than one with brush. More grass means more grazing for cattle and thus higher income.

Aerial spraying is probably the cheapest and most beneficial methods of control for sage and shinoak Richey goes on to say. Shinoak can be controlled with 2,4,5-T or silvex applied late in the spring. Sand sage is susceptible to 2,4-D applied late in the spring. Soil temperature and moisture are important considerations and the plants need to be in vigorous growth.

The SCS can provide technical assistance and cost-share help through the Great Plains Conservation Program. The ASCS also has assistance available through the Rural Environmental Assistance Program. Weekly Market Report

Fresh asparagus is a sign of spring and this vegetable is now more plentiful, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt.

"Look for moderate price tags on cabbage, carrots, celery, dry yellow onions and cooking greens.

Strawberries add choice and color to fruit baskets. Grapefruit and oranges hold good choices of citrus items. Apples, bananas, tangerines, lemons and pineapples are other fruit choices.

Mrs. Clyatt said that eggs, fryers and turkeys are available at prices that should satisfy the budget-conscious food shopper. These products will remain food bargains. The egg supply continues to be large and egg prices will stay low.

"There will most likely be some retail specials on eggs during the coming week to provide some good bargains in this popular protein food.

Milk and cheese continue to be popular stand-bys.

"Quality and food values remain so consistently high that sometimes we don't realize what a bargain we do get when we put milk and cheese in our market basket," she said.

Beef prices are about the same as last week. There are fewer beef cuts in the ads, but features will be found on whole briskets, chuck steaks, Boston roll roasts, standing rib roasts, ground beef and beef liver.

Several pork cuts are featured this week, but these are scattered. They include loins cut into chops and boneless Boston butt roasts. Smoked hams of all kinds, bacon, frankfurters and sausage are also being featured.

"Remember, a curing solu-

tion -- salt and water -- is injected into hams to produce their familiar color and flavor. Most or all of this added moisture is subsequently lost during the curing and smoking process.

Federal regulations require that "smoked hams" weigh no more than their original or "green weight." Those with one to 10% added water must be labeled "smoked ham with water added."

The term "imitation ham" is generally used to describe hams containing more than 10% added moisture.



Make Sure Of Your Needs Before Choosing A Boat

Getting ready to buy a boat? It's a good idea for potential boat buyers to determine their needs carefully before plunking down hard cash for a boat-motor combination. And safety should be a prime consideration.

One step in the right direction is to first determine the activities for which the boat will be used, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Boats of different designs will be best suited for different activities such as fishing, family cruising, skiing, beach picnics, skindiving, photography or racing. A combination of these activities might dictate a compromise selection.

Equally important is the size

of the water body on which the boat will be used. Fresh or salt water, large open bays or lake or shallow sheltered rivers are factors which should be considered when selecting boat design and size.

Powering the boat is another important consideration. Underpowering as well as overpowering your new boat can be dangerous. Do not exceed the manufacturer's power recommendations.

How fast is fast on the water? To avoid monotony on long runs and to negotiate strong tidal currents, 15 miles per hour is sufficient. To tow a water skier, speeds of 20 to 25 miles per hour are ample, and 30 miles per hour is exhilarating.

Speeds of more than 30 miles per hour on other than very smooth water are likely to be uncomfortable as well as dangerous.

"I remember when"
 "When I was your age"
 Statements such as these and other nostalgic glances into the past don't have a place in child rearing, according to family education specialist Dorothy Taylor.

Miss Taylor, who works for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, explained that parents who apply solutions that originated in their childhood to present situations simply aren't in tune with today's world.

"Sure, some things haven't changed," Miss Taylor said. "These are basic interpersonal relations, learning how to get along with people, ethical concepts, honesty and dishonesty

and religious training. People also still need to acquire certain basic skills such as learning how to cook or fix a flat tire, sharing experiences and telling children about safety."

The specialist said that the same can be said for educational opportunities.

"They're still important," she explained. "For the parents these were probably limited -- even more so for the mother. So, many parents just don't feel comfortable with the thought that their child isn't going to college. In fact, they're horrified."

Yet many young people today desire to enter a trade and become a craftsman. The child believes (and rightly so, according to many experts) that America has quickly become top heavy with intellectual brain

machines and has a critical need for intellectually endowed craftsmen and people who operate in a practical world.

If a son or daughter goes off to college, many parents aren't comfortable on today's college campus -- especially if either of them attended the same school.

"I remember when this was a small, quiet campus. Look at it now," they say.

Another aspect that parents can't solve with yesterday's solutions involves the appropriate amount of spending money for miscellaneous activities.

"Stop and consider what your teenager spends money for," Miss Taylor advised. "Most of the activities weren't even thought to be possible 26 years ago."

Other areas of possible conflict include how youth feel about the draft, civil rights, styles of dress, personal appearance, authority, pressure to get good marks in school and the position of the female in society.

The specialist said that "I remember when" may work in some cases, but before applying it or using it as a solution to a problem today, consider if the problem you're trying to solve is really the same as it was when you were a child or whether anyone even thought this situation would ever occur.

Food Guide For Older Folks

A food guide designed to help older people plan and prepare nutritious meals has been issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The revised "Food Guide for Older Folks," developed by nutritionists in USDA's Agricultural Research Service, gives tips on buying food, time and energy - saving hints and tells how to plan and prepare menus to meet specific needs.

Whether a person is eight or 80, good food remains important. It adds to the joy of living, promotes good health and normal weight and a feeling of well-being.

Although people choose from the same foods as they grow older, their needs for some of the nutrients and for food energy (calories) change. A daily food guide shows how to meet these needs. The four food groups -- milk, vegetable-fruit, bread-cereal and meat -- are explained in the pamphlet, and a list of foods that satisfy requirements in each group is included along with recommended daily amounts.

The booklet offers sample menus based on the food guide with more than 30 recipes that require a minimum of time, preparation and equipment. Most of the recipes include suggestions and ideas for using left-overs.

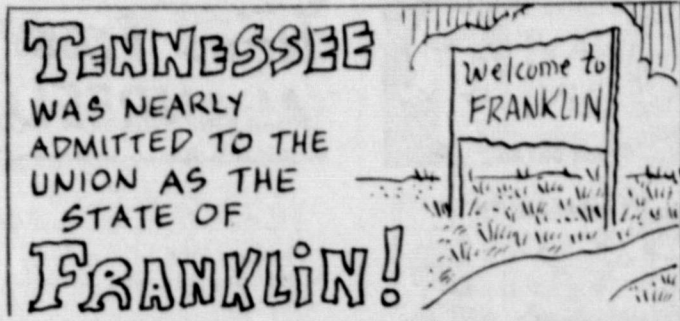

REAP PROGRAM By Evelyn Mason

The next quarter of REAP practices will be April, May and June. The signup period for practices to be carried out in this quarter is the week of April 3 through 7.

You are reminded that burning stubble is not considered a good farming practice and producers who do this will be ineligible to receive any payments under REAP on any farm.

CC LOAN PROGRAM
It has been determined that 1971 crop of grain sorghum, wheat and oats under farm storage loan is eligible for resale loan for one year.

On warehouse storage wheat loans, the crops of 1970 and 1971 may be extended for one year. 1971 crop of grain sorghum warehouse loans may be extended---but not the 1970 crop. Loans not eligible for extension will need to be settled by repayment or forfeiture. Maturity date on wheat loans is April 30 and the final date on grain sorghum loans is June 30, 1972 PROGRAMS

Signup on these programs was completed on March 10 with most producers in the county signed in the program.

Final date to report your wheat acres is May 1. All producers must report the wheat for harvest and the set-aside acres for the farm by May 1. This is very important. Please be sure to do this in order to receive your program payments. Your wheat acreage was not recorded when you signed up in the program even though you may have told us where it was. You still need to come in and report by May 1. Grain sorghum and cotton must be reported by July 15. Both these dates are earlier than last year.

Additional 5% or 10% has been accepted by the Secretary. We have just been advised that this acreage has been accepted. In a few days we will send you a copy of the form you signed showing the total set-aside and conserving acres for your farm long with set-aside and conserving base requirements. This will be sent to all farm operators who signed in the program.

Additional wheat set-aside acres has been checked and producers are now free to destroy this acreage at any time.

Some cotton acreage has been released to the county committee. The last day to request more cotton is May 3.

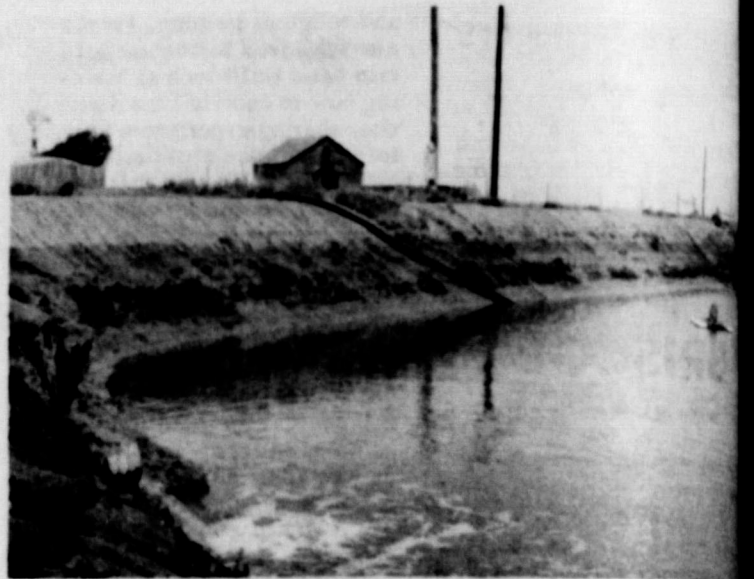

"Turned On" Wedding

"I do," solemnly spoken by bride and groom, is usually enough to make a legally valid marriage. But suppose one or both of the parties is "turned on," either by drugs or by alcohol. This may create a situation once described as follows by Euripides:

"The tongue hath sworn, but the mind is unsworn."



Marriage is a contract—a special kind, to be sure, but a contract nonetheless. The key to a contract is mutual assent, a meeting of the minds. And a mind not competent to assent is not competent to make a contract, no matter what the tongue says.

How clear must the mind be? The law's test is whether the person is able to understand the nature of a marriage contract at the moment he says "I do." If he is not, the marriage may be annulled.

But intoxication short of that will usually be overlooked. Since the law gives matrimony the benefit of the doubt, courts generally will not grant an annulment merely because the bride or the groom was a little high.

Furthermore, even if one of the parties was indeed "out of it" at the time of the wedding, the marriage may become valid because of what happens afterward. Take this case:

A man married a girl he scarcely knew, as the climax of a protracted drinking party. Seeking an annulment later, he pleaded in court that he had been in an alcoholic stupor at the time of the wedding.

But the girl pointed out that he had continued to cohabit with her for several days after he had sobered up. Result: annulment denied, because the marriage had been "ratified" by subsequent events.

What if one of the parties, although in good shape at the wedding itself, had concealed the fact that he was an alcoholic or a dope addict? Under these circumstances, most courts will grant an annulment to the spouse who has been deceived.

Thus, a bride won an annulment when she discovered after the nuptials that her bridegroom was a heroin addict. The court said this was the kind of vital information that, in all fairness, any bride had a right to know.

County political party chairmen have been advised how they can collect state funds for paying May 6 primary election expenses.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock advised the local party officials to prepare immediately detailed estimates of their outlays.

Bullock sent out forms and these instructions immediately after Gov. Preston Smith signed a new law providing \$2 million in state aid to finance the primaries:

"Only when sworn estimates are returned and reviewed will state checks be prepared in the amount of three-fourths of the total expense. Additional warrants will be drawn after the election.

"Prior expenses (before the new state financing law) which exceed the amount of candidates' filing fees and contributions will not be paid by the state - unless cancelled and re-negotiated on new contracts.

"The new state law does not permit any state reimbursement of expenditures for precinct or county conventions or for paying executive committee members for attending meetings.

"State funds can be used to pay for "necessary and legitimate primary expenses" like ballot printing, polling place and voting machine rental, purchase of election sets, stationery, telephones, office rental and compensation of election clerks and judges.

"After the primaries, the secretary of state will require sworn verification of every expenditure made out of the primary fund, together with supporting receipts and cancelled vouchers.

"Estimates of June 3 runoff primary expenses will be required at a later date through the same procedures.

EMPLOYERS PAYING LESS

Texas employers are paying less unemployment tax per worker than those of any other state Texas Employment Commission reports.

The state average is \$9.17 per worker covered by unemployment insurance, according to a 1970 TEC survey.

Comparatively, Alaska, at the top of the scale, pays out \$276.18 per worker to support state benefits; California, \$97.41 and Virginia (next lowest to Texas), \$11.89.

W. S. Birdwell Jr., TEC employer representative, credited the low rate to unusual stability in employers and the work force, as well as a high degree of cooperation in the U. I. Program

TEC collects taxes from more than 162,000 Texas employers covered by the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act. Taxes are based on rate of worker turnover generally. The minimum tax is 0.1 per cent and the maximum four per cent.

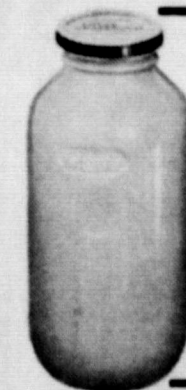

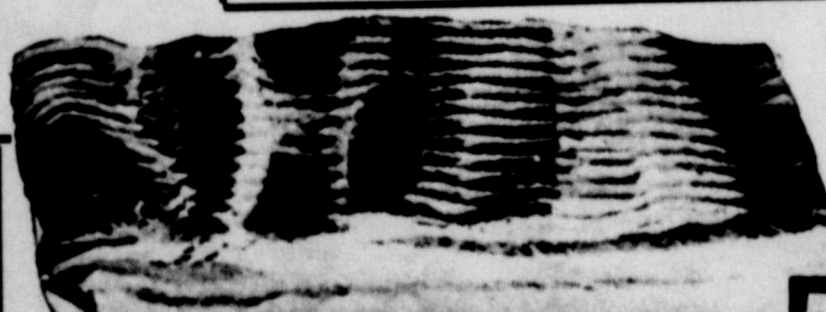

observed a "slight" rise in radioactive fallout which they attributed to the Chinese Lop Nor nuclear test of March 18.

"Held a Lubbock policeman had a right to reinstatement in his job after 18 years' active duty with the Air Force.

AG OPINIONS

The Texas Department of Public Safety may administer certain tests to determine whether accident-prone drivers can operate cars safely on completion of a rehabilitation program and courts can require attendance at the latter, Atty. Gen Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

"License fees imposed on nursing home administrators may not be paid by a state agency.

"Hemphill County commissioners may spend money to pay part of a museum manager's salary in Canadian.

"Persons treating lawns or trees around homes with pesticide, and who are not regular employees of the owner or tenant, or otherwise exempt, are subject to licensing under the Texas Structural Pest Control Act.

VISITORS BOOM ECONOMY

More than 22.6 million visitors came to Texas last year and spent an estimated \$1.85 billion. The number was up seven per cent over 1970 and the dollar amount 25 per cent. Both figures were records, according to Texas Tourist Development Agency and Texas Highway Department. Last year's visitors paid \$166 million in direct state taxes. The Highway Department figured average spending per person per day among auto travelers was \$14.92. Visitor spending has increased 170 per cent since 1964.

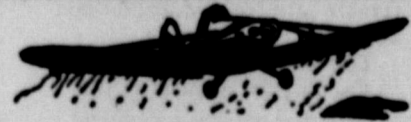

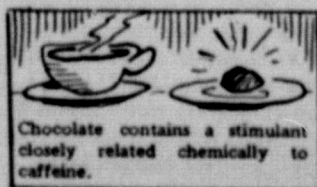

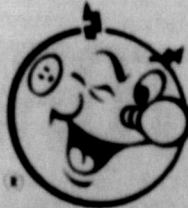

SCABIES INSPECTION
 Red Easton is the new inspector for the Texas Animal Health Commission. He replaces Vernon Turner who resigned. In the Groom vicinity, Jack Barnett replaces Jim Hopkins, who resigned. Barnett's telephone is out of Groom. Monroe Reagers replaces Bill Langley, who resigned. Dipping regulations are to take affect June 1st. I wouldn't get too excited about having to dip because there are a long list of exceptions. If cattle doesn't change ownership no dipping is necessary. Basic Cow herds do not have to be dipped unless there is a change of ownership. Entire herds will have to be dipped if an infected animal is found. Scabies goes dormant in summer. Therefore the real clean up program cannot get underway until early next winter.

CATTLE MARKET
 After last week's sag in the Market it appears some new life is about to take place. Most Commercial feeders realize they must fill their feed lots within the next few weeks since the wheat pasture cattle are slowly being sold. Cattle going off wheat pasture move in cycles. March 1st to 15th is take off date for many. Many others take off April 1st now that many graze later. Cattle are then shipped to market or they move over to wheat intended for graze out. From here they move to market as the wheat is grazed off. Should it continue dry you won't see a handful of stocker cattle on dryland wheat pasture by May 15th final take off date on diverted acres. Wheat pasture is usually gone by May 20 even with good moisture conditions.

For a number of years it was the feeling of cattlemen in the livestock organization that ranchers should never debate with the packers or retailer over who was getting the gravy in the Beef Business. Now that we have had all the controversy over who is making the money in the Beef Business I feel we should air the whole subject once and for all. Let the chips fall where they may. Certainly the cattle producers have not been responsible for excessive profits. I see no reason why the producers have anything to hide from the hearings. It was the big chains that dropped the price by 10¢ per pound to get the heat off their back. Of the recent \$23.00 rise per 1000 pound steer the consumer pays. The producer received only \$5.00. It takes about 25
