Representatives To Attend State FHA Convention

"We Can If I Will" is the theme of the 1972 state meeting of the Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America to be held at the Convention Center in Fort Worth, April 21-22.

More than 5,000 members and advisors representing 65,000 members in 1,600 chapters throughout the state are expected to attend. Members are homemaking students in junior and senior high schools. Home-making teachers serve as advisors.

Representatives of the McLean chapter will be Marsha Phillips, President, local chapter; and Cheryl Holmes, 5th Vice President, Advisor, Mrs. Mary V. Brown and Senior Mother, Mrs. Bob Phillips.

Keynote speaker will be Don Williams, Pepperdine University, Los Angeles, California. Mr. Williams will challenge the group to accept their responsibilities and to work together for the betterment of our world.

Other highlights of the convention include a talk by Mrs. Kathryn Cawley, Home Economist with the Lone Star Gas Company, Abilene; and a special presentation on HERO-FHA chapters.

State Degrees of Achievement, the highest award of the organization, will be awarded to more than 300 Future Homemakers from over the state.

A State Chorus composed of 125 Future Homemakers chosen by their areas will be featured. This group will be under the direction of Dr. Scotty Gray, Professor of Music, Southwestern Theological Seminary, Fort Worth.

Installation of the 1972-73 state officers will climax the Saturday morning business session. At this time, ten officers elected through chapter participation throughout the state will be placed in office. A newly elected president will receive the gavel from Jennifer Dujka, East Bernard, outgoing president.

Pampa Hospital School Of Nursing Are Taking Applications

Applications will be taken from 8:00 A.M. - 4:00 P.M. beginning Monday, April 17 through Friday, April 28, for the 1972-73 class of Vocational Nurses. A \$10.00 application fee is required but if the applicant is not accepted, the fee is refunded. The total cost of this program is approximately \$350. This includes tuition fee, uniforms, textbooks and graduation expense. An L.V.N. can expect to earn between \$4,200-\$4,700 per year, after graduation.

Highland General Hospital School of Vocational Nursing is a State accredited school. This means the school is one that has met the requirements established by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. Highland Hospital School has had eight classes to graduate and presently has thirteen students who will graduate in August and will be eligible to take the exam given by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. Upon successful completion of this exam the student becomes an L.V.N.

The purpose of this program is to train men and women as Vocational Nurses to give nursing care under the supervision of professional registered nurses or a physician. The length of the school is 40 hours per week for twelve months and the applicant must be between the ages of 18 and 55 years; have completed the tenth grade or the equivalent; be a U.S. citizen; be in good physical and mental health; and be able to pass the Texas Employment Commission test. 14 Rural Accidents In Gray County During March

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 14 accident on rural highways in Gray County during the month of March, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and 12 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1972 shows a total of 48 accidents resulting in one person killed, and 18 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1972 shows a total of 420 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 218 persons injured as compared to March, 1971 with 521 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 251 persons injured.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Montague, four; Hale and Dallam, three each; Briscoe, Gray, Hardeman, Hutchinson, Parmer, Wheeler, Crosby, Floyd, Garza, Hockley, Knox, Lynn, and Young, one each.

Scour Vaccine Shows Promise

The possibility of a vaccine or vaccines to control calf scours may soon be a reality.

Scours, an intestinal ailment characterized by severe diarrhea is a costly problem in the cattle industry as it causes high death losses in calves, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with The Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Many infected calves which do not die suffer retarded gains in weight and often we as much as 100 pounds less than normal at weaning time.

Regarding a vaccine for scours Armstrong alludes to research conducted in Nebraska. During the past two years, some 13,000 calves on 30 Nebraska ranches

with a history of severe scouring were checked. Orally administered scour vaccines were given to pregnant cows 60 to 90 days before calving. Later research proved that only one vaccination was needed.

The vaccination program gave 75 percent effective control. A herd wherein scour infection reached a 90 to 100 percent incidence reported only 10 percent after the treatment.

Research in Nebraska is continuing to find an agent, or

agents, affecting the 25 percent of the herds in which the scour vaccine failed to perform, notes the veterinarian.

The studies indicate that there will be two vaccines to help control scours, points out Armstrong. One will be given cows orally 60 to 90 days before calving to protect their calves against the scour-causing viruses which otherwise might be in the colostrum and milk. The other vaccine will be for the calves and be given orally 24 hours after birth.

The Pioneer Study Club met April 6th in the Hospitality room of the American National Bank.

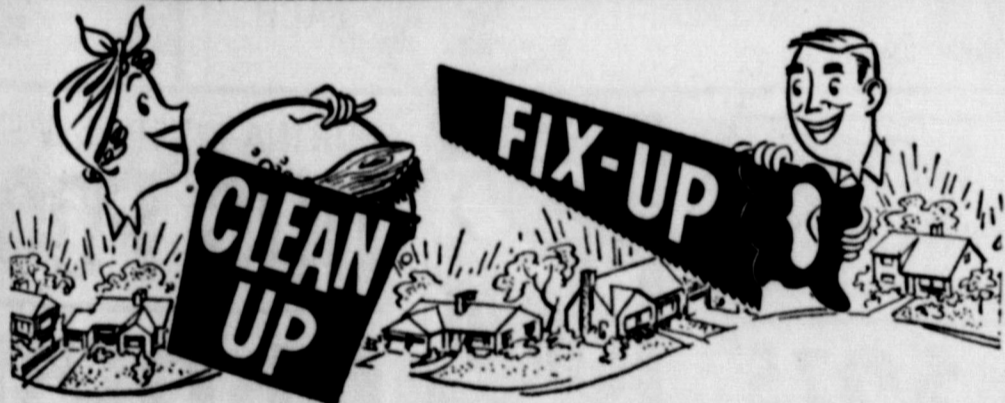

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

"The State Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals should be merged into a single court of last resort.

"Fourteen Courts of Civil Appeals should be given jurisdiction over criminal as well as civil cases.

"There should be fewer levels of lower courts with less overlapping jurisdiction.

"Appeal procedure should be simpler and speedier."

"Judges and cases should be transferred to match resources with needs in keeping with better management of the court system.

The 63rd Legislature, Reavley said, should be asked next year to submit the constitutional amendment proposing court reorganization and modernization.

SPECIAL TRAINING APPROVED

The State Board of Education approved contracts for special training next year of 2,611 children in non-public schools.

Largest single group involved is the trainable mentally retarded category, with 1,887 youngsters.

Pupils, from pre-school age through high school level, will attend 12 schools operated under the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and 35 independent non-public schools.

An ancient legal dispute involving Texas' sovereignty over its tidelands is in court again.

The U.S. Justice Department has filed a suit against Texas, challenging the state's regulation of fishing within the farthest two leagues (six marine miles) of the historic three-league (nine-marine-mile) boundary.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has requested President Nixon to intervene in the latest federal attack.

The Attorney General further requested an opportunity for the state to present its position to the State Department and Justice Department. The state, he noted in a letter to Nixon, was not notified prior to filing of the action.

Martin claimed the new action is contrary to the position taken by the Eisenhower-Nixon administration in 1953 and in 1957.

He submitted to the President excerpts from the state's brief filed in the original boundary

suit which was decided in Texas' favor by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1958. He also included a 1957 letter from the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower to then-Gov. Price Daniel. Eisenhower expressed the opinion that Texas should "have the right to explore and exploit the submerged lands extending seaward of (its) coastline for a distance of three marine leagues into the Gulf of Mexico."

Martin urged Nixon to inform him if his position as president is the same as that expressed by President Eisenhower.

HEALTH STUDY LAUNCHED
State, local and federal health officials this week began an intensive study to determine if health hazards exist for workers in the American Smelting and Refining Company plant in El Paso.

Air samples will be taken within the plant to discover possible toxic materials, and blood and urine samples will be taken from about 800 employees.

The survey will complement a comprehensive health study to evaluate lead hazards in the plant vicinity which was initiated by local health officials several weeks ago in cooperation with the State Health Department. A.S.R.C. is cooperating in the survey.

PARTIES SLOW
Secretary of State Bob Bullock complained about early response to his request that county political party officers submit early estimates of May primary election expenses.

Bullock said a week after he asked for the estimates only 99 (of 254) counties were represented in replies. He warned again no state funds will be allocated to local parties until estimated expenditures are submitted on prescribed forms.

Some county chairmen explained they were taking their time since the new state primary financing act makes them responsible for inaccuracies in their figures. **JUNE 1 PUPIL TRANSFER DEADLINE**--Texas Education Agency has held parents who want to transfer their children from their home school to a nearby district must submit requests by June 1.

Once approved by the receiving school board, the request must also be cleared by T.E.A. State approval is a term of a U.S. District Court order filed in Tyler relating to desegregation of schools. Under the order transfers are not to be permitted to reduce or impede desegregation or encourage discrimination.

Accent on Health

"Vaccinate now for VEE" is the theme of a new campaign urging vaccination of horses for the sleeping sickness disease Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE).

The 1972 campaign calls for vaccination of all equines (horses, mules, donkeys, etc.) not vaccinated in 1971, in Texas, the Gulf Coast States and States adjoining Mexico. These States are designated "high risk" States for the disease.

There are four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now. They are: (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the area, (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive, (3) foals vaccinated too young to develop lasting immunity (under 6 months old when vaccinated), and (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Scientists believe VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. The time to vaccinate is now, before mosquitoes emerge in the warm months ahead.

Texas has a horse population of about 625,000 animals. With nearly 800 Texas veterinarians participating, about 575,000 horses, or 92 per cent of the total population, were vaccinated in Texas last year.

However, the State of Texas remains under Federal quarantine for VEE. This means that horses must be vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the State for other areas. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo, or other means.

The current program calls for vaccination at horse owners' expense. Federal emergency funds were used for that purpose last year.

VEE vaccine will provide immunity for over one year and possibly longer. The commercial product now available can safely be administered to horses previously vaccinated with Government-furnished vaccine. If it is uncertain that a horse has been vaccinated, it is bet-

ter to vaccinate again. Vaccine must be administered by a veterinarian. VEE vaccine was used on more than 2.8 million horses in 19 states and the District of Columbia last year. Studies on the vaccine are continuing, to check safety and to determine duration of immunity.

Gray County Farm Newsletter

By Evelyn Mason

REPORT WHEAT AND BARLEY ACRES BY MAY 1

The wheat acreage and barley acres must be reported by May 1. This is earlier than in the past several years. Failure to report by this date will lose the payment for this year.

Very few have made this report. If you got a card from us, you have not reported. These reports were not started until after sign-up ended. You may have discussed your wheat when you signed up--but you did not report it to us unless you have been in recently.

Please come in and report to avoid the rush on the last few days.

SET-ASIDE ACRES

Productivity of the set-aside acres must be at least equal to the other land on which your crops are planted. This is very important. Producers should locate their set-aside now and be sure they have enough acres since there is no tolerance on these acres. Set-aside must be in large regular shaped areas of good quality land.

If irrigation has been considered in the normal yield for the farm, some or all set-aside requirement are not met.

Set-aside acres must NOT BE GRAZED BETWEEN MAY 15 and OCTOBER 15. A crop cannot be harvested from set-aside acres at any time. If you put cane on set-aside acres you can graze it after October

The specialist pointed out that it's possible to sell any type of item in a garage sale when it might be of interest to someone else. This includes toys, books, records, knick-knacks, household and sports equipment, furniture and clothes. Use a garage sale to raise money for the family or a favorite charity.

"If your friends and neighbors are in the midst of spring cleaning, join forces to offer a variety of merchandise," Mrs. Fowler suggested.

Keep in mind that low prices attract bargain hunters. However, extremely low prices often fail to make the venture financially worthwhile. Check the cost of items at local thrift and second-hand shops for a pricing guide.

Mend and clean clothing before putting it up for sale. Pin the correct size on garments.

Tie or pin pairs of shoes together. Clean and repair toys, records, kitchen equipment and books. Steer clear of selling unrepared or damaged goods.

"Don't forget advertising for the sale," the specialist reminded. "Neighborhood signs can help. You can also consider placing a small ad in the newspaper."

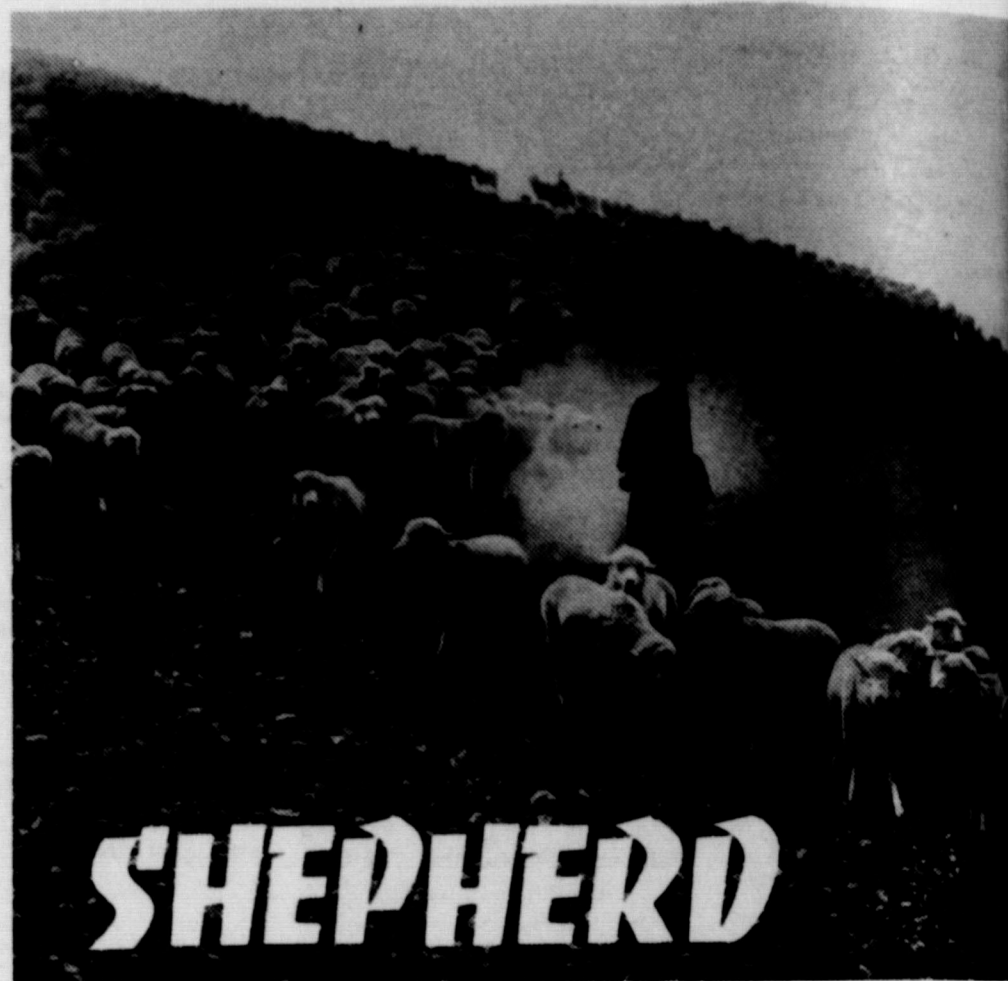
