

A total of 651 voters in Mc-Lean and 51 voters in Alanreed went to the polls Saturday to reelect Mrs. Mary Dwyer as commissioner and J. D. Fish as constable.

Mrs. Mary Dwyer, avoided a runoff election by six votes over her two opponents for the nomination, Hershel McCarty and Joe D. Billingsley.

Mrs. Dwyer received 352 votes Billingsley 188, and McCarty 158.

Approval of Gray County under the emergency drought status has been assured by both the District Field man as well as official of state ASCS office at College Station Texas. The minimum cost will be one dollar per acre or at the rate the County Committee determines.

We have been assured that approval will be granted thro ugh June 14th. A request has been made to graze CAP acres as well as diverted acres. Since grazing is now permitted through May 14. We feel the only difference will be the charge of \$1.00 per acre or whatever the County Committee sets. The true facts are the designation of Gray County as eligible for emergency drought assistance will be of little help unless it rains over much of the county. We have been lucky in the McLean area by receiving over three inches of rain. The rest of the county hasn't faired nearly so well. Much of the area has received less than one-half inch. The diverted acres that is now in wheat will be grazed out by May 15 or soon thereafter. Therefore being able to graze diverted acres will be of little help on the High Plains. In this area where you have had good rain this will help. SCREWWORM THREAT Livestock Producers need to be on the lookout for possible screwworm outbreaks in area animals. A constant vigil needs to be maintained to eliminate the chance for this important pest becoming a problem in this area. 

AN OPEN LETTER

The City Council and Nayor of the City of Mctean wish to make a statement in order to clear up any misunderstanding that might exist.

First, your City Councilmen and Major are elected by the people living within the corrorate limits of the City of McLan for the sole nurnose of looking after the City's business, and to operate same to the best of their ability--always striving to give the people the best nossible service they can from the income received.

As you know, the City owns some gas wells that formerly furnished all the gas the City needed, but these wells are almost depleted; therefore, it is necessary for the City to buy about 90 or 55% of the gas required, which makes a big difference in our economy. Since October 1, 1971 we have maid more than \$20,000.00 for gas. Also the maintenance is a lot more than it was, since our gas system is more than 40 years old, mlus the fact that all materials and labor have gone up considerably in the last few years.

Our water is costing more, due to the fact that labor and materials are higher, and the system is getting old and requires extra maintenance.

The Ambulance business is costing the City of McLean 15,100.00 annually, which was not anticipated. Also, we have less than a year now to get everything at the dump ground buried, and this i an accumulation of about +0 years; then we must keep it buried. This means nurchasing a Bulldozer and requiring the services of a full time employee. 10

There are other things too numerous to mention that cost money, plus many free services where no revenue at all is received; such as street maintenance, seal costing the naving which we now have to keep it from deteriorating, and as you 'new, a lot our our present paving needs to be replaced.

It is the feeling of the Council that with everyone cooperating and helping, we can continue to make Molean a better and safer o in which to live--that is our nurpose. We trust that you will understand, and that each of you will help us and not knock us. nlace

The spiraling cost of welfare in Texas has leveled off, and no reduction in grants will be necessary this year, according to reports reaching Gov. Preston Smith.

Welfare demands are slowing down for the first time in a decade, and expenditures for 1973 may be less than in 1972, the Governor said.

Smith's reports indicated the cost of programs in fiscal 1973 may be \$75 million less than the \$347 million estimated a year ago.

"It now appears most likely that grant payments to welfare recipents will not have to be cut, and we will still be able to stay within the constitutional limitation on spending, " the Governor said.

Due to a state constitutional ceiling on general revenue state expenditures for welfare assistance, a reduction in grants beginning September 1 had been regarded as unavoidable.

Main reason for the slowdown in weltare's cost climb is a decline in old age assistance rolls and the fact increase in Aid to Families with Dependent Children eligibility has not been as large as anticipated.

AFDC rolls, expected to expand by 10,000 a month, acutally grew about 5,000 monthly.

"There is still much work that needs to be done, but for the first time in recent years, I believe we now have a handle on the problems and have finally brought them under control," Smith stated,

He credited these factors as contributing to the cost leveling: New controls over medical as-

sistance expenses, improved amnagement techniques, a program utili zation review, more effective use of electronic data processing and a reduction of program abuse.

STARTS ALL OVER AGAIN With the hard-fought first primary election just behind them, some candidates plunged right into the June 3 runoff campaign.

Of one thing they can be sure: the cost of campaigning, like everything else, is rising.

A hasty total of first primary expense-contribution reports indicates spending by the statewide candidates in contested races totaled more than \$5 million. There is now telling how many millions were spent by congressional, legislative and localcounty candidates in the rush to be first at the ballot box. Governor Smith, meanwhile, called on Teaver to intensify efforts to bring lower insurance



rates for responsible young and elderly drivers. A reduction in rates for drivers under 25 would encourage them to drive safely and curb the accident toll, Smith contended.

DEATH RATE LOWER

Department of Public Safety reports the death rate from auto accidents last year was the lowest since 1962.

The number of deaths per 100 million travel miles was 5.1. This is the best figure since 1962'3 4.9 per 100 million miles.

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

WHO PAID FOR THE TUNNELS? It is my understanding that most, if not all the tunnels under McLean were excavated by and with city-owned machinery ... Some ten years ago a group of five men demanded of the managing officer that the tunnels be closed immediately. To which the managing officer bargained that if they would give him one year in which to fill the holes, then he would stop saying I was crazy. But the tunnels remained and it was not until April and May of 1972 that they were closed.

Two men told me that the city paid slightly less than \$4.00 per cubit foot for filling the excavations ... Suppose the tunnels were two feet wide and five feet high, we would be paying \$40,00 per running foot. Thus, on 10,000 feet of tunnel; we would pay \$400,000 ..
