## Tennis Tournament Slated For June

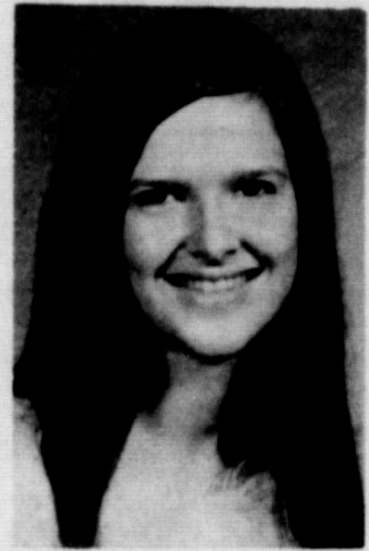
A tennis tournament, sponsored by the Lions Club, will be held the first weekend in June through the second weekend in June.

**Learning To Swim Good Insurance**

More than the 7,000 drowning victims in the U.S. each year couldn't swim 20 feet to save their lives.

These drowning victims were only 20 feet from safety and yet couldn't make the distance, according to James U. Cross, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"Three-fourths of the earth's surface is covered by water," said Cross. "It stands to reason that you're going to come in contact with it some time. So it just makes good sense to learn to swim."

Cross said swimming could not only help you to live longer, but it could also help you enjoy life more.

"If you can't swim, practically the whole world of outdoor recreation is closed to you," he said. "By learning to swim, you trade your fear of water for a healthy respect for it."

**Hog Cholera Still Problem In Texas**

Hog cholera is still on the loose in Texas and unless farmers and others use certain precautions, the situation could get much worse, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The most recent case of hog cholera has come up in Nueces County. That county was placed under a state quarantine on May 6. Moore County in the Panhandle was also quarantined recently when an infected hog was found. Five other counties in the state remain under state quarantine. They are all in South Texas and include Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Webb and Willacy.

Armstrong emphasizes that the purpose of the quarantine is to limit the movement of hogs. Then, if sick animals are detected, animal health officials can be notified and the animals can be properly disposed of. "This is the only way Texas will be able to move toward 'hog cholera free' status," he contends.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

State agencies received a recent warning to renew efforts to recruit minority group and women employees "before they are confronted with ultimatums and deadlines" from Washington and federal courts.

The agencies were reminded by the Governor's Committee on Human Relations staff that jurisdiction of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has been extended to cover local and state governments.

EEOC will be giving "very critical examinations" to state employment practices, Committee on Human Relations Director James R. Ray wrote the agencies and departments.

Federal law goes farther than the state statute making it unlawful to discriminate against a person of race, religion, color or national origin. The U.S. law also bars discrimination on the basis of sex.

Each state agency, advised Ray, will have to submit a detailed action plan to prove non-discrimination.

"In other words, you will not be able to prove non-discrimination without a federally-approved plan for recruitment of minorities and women for all levels of employment in your agency or department," the state units of government were told.

"Historically, the main concern of (EEOC) has been with numbers or quotas, and claims of recruitment difficulties have been summarily rejected as valid excuses," the Human Relations Committee staff maintained.

"Significant steps" were applauded within the state government during recent years to achieve equal employment op-

portunities.

However, department heads were placed on notice they must be sure each house "is in order and can stand the test (of non-discrimination) in federal court."

AG OPINIONS

County taxing bodies do not have authority to levy a fee on a mixed beverage late-hours permit and a caterer's permit for the first three years of a permit, Atty. Gen Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

"Creation of a salary grievance committee for public employees in each county is unconstitutional."

"The county tax assessor-collector is generally immune from liability on claims of their parties where title is issued in good faith and within the scope of his official authority under the certificate of title act."

"A Midland County domestic relations court judge is entitled to the same salary as that paid the 142nd district court judge."

COURTS SPEAK

State Supreme Court upheld a lower court finding that the State Board of Medical Examiners acted properly in revoking the license of San Antonio Dr. J. J. Martinez for alleged sexual assaults on patients and an attempted abortion.

COURT OVERHAUL RECOMMENDED

A task force composed of legal professional leaders, judges and legislators has joined in recommending modernization of the Texas court system.

The group, headed by State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert, released a draft of its proposal at a

Merging the State Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals, giving courts of civil appeals authority to hear criminal as well as civil cases, merging overlapping district courts and providing a single district court with multiple judges for metropolitan counties, creating a statewide system of new county-level courts with judges who are lawyers to replace all present courts below district level, setting up a system of administration by a statewide administrator and deputies under the chief justice of Texas selection of judges in non-partisan elections or by gubernatorial appointments and requiring that all judges be lawyers. **FIFTY-ONE COUNTIES NOW PROVERTY AREAS**

Fifty-one counties are now designated as poverty areas for Hill-Burton hospital construction aid. Those counties may receive up to 90 per cent of money for constructing hospital and related facilities from the federal program.

**SCREW WORM INFESTATIONS WORSENS**

Texas Farmers Union has warned that a screw worm fly infestation will get worse rapidly between early summer and the first frost.

TFU says it is imperative that Gov. Preston Smith ask increased state appropriations for the control program at the special legislative session. Congressmen have been asked for more federal aid to increase sterile fly production to the maximum level at the production plant in Mission and for fly drops in outbreak areas.

Ranchers and farmers have been urged to report all suspected cases of crew worm outbreak in their animals to county agents. Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association joined in the warning to livestock producers.

**COMPANIES MUST PAY**

State Board of Insurance announced it has received complaints that some insurance companies are requiring customers to pay costs of physical examinations before renewing coverage.

"Physical examinations used for automobile insurance underwriting by licensed Texas companies have a similar purpose to that of securing credit reports, and as such must be directly paid for by the insurance company concerned," the Board stated in an official memorandum to companies writing auto insurance.

**SHORT SNORTS**

State Sen. Barbara Jordan, a new congressional nominee and the first black elected to the Texas Senate since 1883, will serve as governor-for-a-day June 10.

Bureau of Mines forecasts June demand for Texas crude oil of 3,460,000 barrels daily, an increase of 700,000 barrels over May.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock urged county political party chairmen to hurry return of forms reports requesting the party chairmen to hurry return of forms detailing anticipated expenses for the June 3 runoff primary.

Thirty-three criminal justice action grants totalling more than \$1.1 million received recent approval of Criminal Justice Council executive committee.

The U.S. Department of Transportation has accepted Texas' agreement for carrying out the highway beautification act, preventing loss of \$24 million to the state.

Recently we learned of a weather modification project that will originate in Gray, Wheeler and Hemphill Counties. This project is sponsored by the Bureau of Reclamation. The main purpose is to increase rainfall in the watershed that spills into Lake Altus. They are very concerned that the water level is very low in this lake.

A public notice was recently run in the Pampa News declaring the intent to start this program. I've had an inquiry as to what affect this project could have on our weather in Gray County. Recently, I telephoned Mr. John Carr, weather modification Division, Texas Water Development Board. He gave me the above information. I asked him what affect this would have on weather in Gray County. His reply was that we could get some side benefits. This depended greatly on prevailing winds and many factors. However, the idea of seeding the clouds in this area was to make them shed their moisture by the time they reached the target area in Southwestern Oklahoma. Again the idea was to fill Lake Altus.

Since I talked with Carr there has been another call by a concerned person. We are very anxious to know how this project will turn out.

## SCREWORM SITUATION

For the first time in a decade the screwworm threat is with us in Gray County and the entire state. There have been over one thousand cases reported in Texas. One of these was as close as Spur. I've heard of unconfirmed cases in Oklahoma. There have been a few cases in Arizona, two in New Mexico and one in California.

It will pay big dividends for each and every rancher to inspect their cattle daily. Should you have a suspected case, collect samples and place in an alcohol solution and bring to me. I will send the sample in for positive identification.

James Calaway, phone 826-3169, Wheeler, Texas, animal Health Inspector advises me he is to assist with any outbreaks that might occur in Wheeler, Gray, Collingsworth or Hemphill Counties. Calaway is the new supervisor for Scabies in the above four county area.

## CATTLE PRICES

A further indication of a miscalculation on the cow population was ruled recent-

ly on the receipts of cattle at the Texas Livestock Auction Market report published by Agricultural statistician office in Austin. Records with reference to livestock auction reports are considered totally accurate since they are taken from the official papers of the Texas Animal Health Commission. In April 1972 there was a total of 511,000 cattle sold through Texas auctions. During April of 1971 over 630,000 head of cattle passed through Texas Auction Sales. This is a nineteen percent drop from one year earlier, with the drought so wide spread over much of Texas during this period one would anticipate an increase in marketing. We think it would be alarming if we really had an authentic figure on number of cattle in U.S.

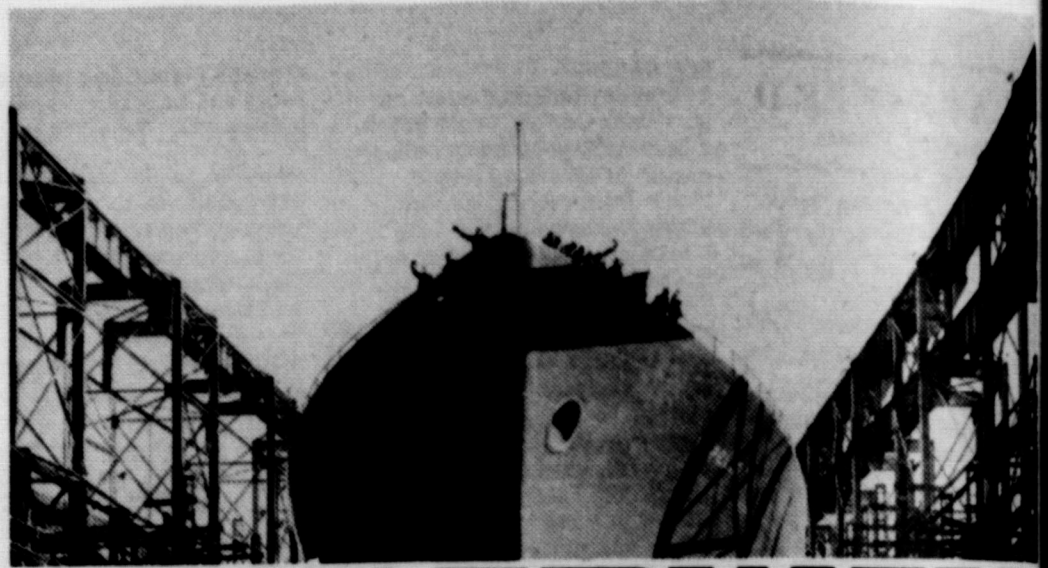

### Brent Thacker, A Former Resident Receives Award

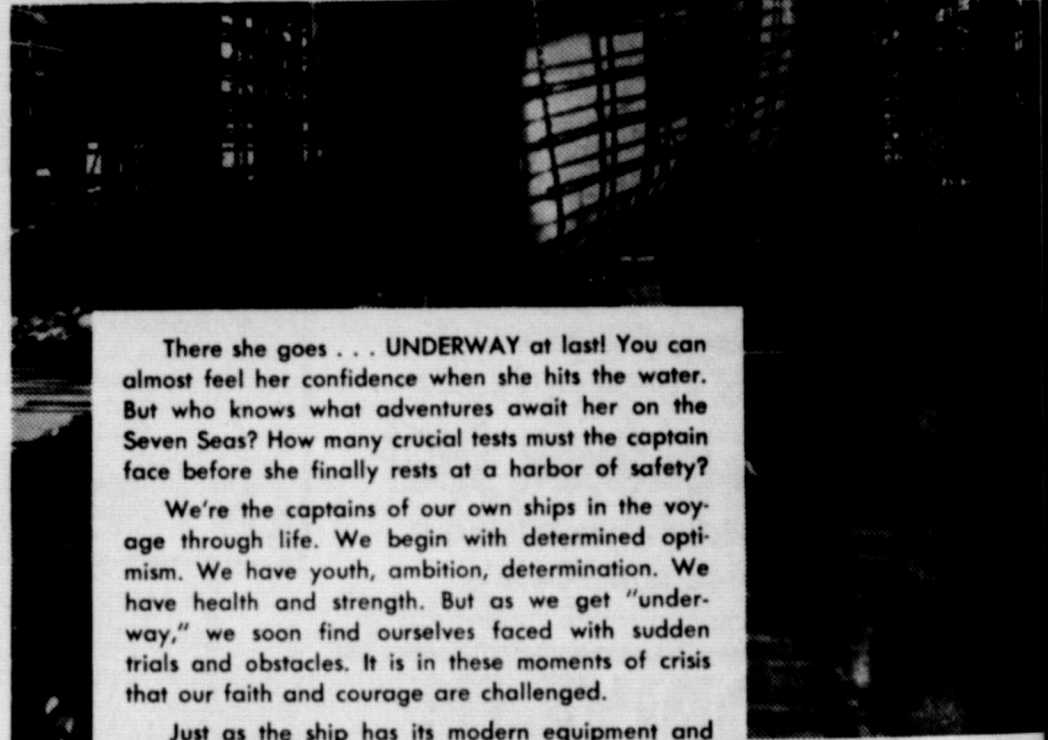
Brent Thacker former McLean student and freshman attending Shidler Okla. High School, received an award for outstanding Leadership.
