## State Capital NEWS

Several financial business factors are being considered by the Legislature on their return to the capitol after spending the Easter holiday with the members.

A senate sub-committee immediately began drafting a tax bill which is expected to exceed \$50 million. That is the minimum amount needed to balance the upper house version of the budget -- from a smorgasbord of proposals already aired. Both the House and the Senate are due to take up and as their respective appropriations bills, already drafted, and move the issue of budgeting into a 19-member conference committee of top legislators.

Big battle in the Senate, over revenue-raising, may be on a liberal-backed proposal to levy a new corporation income tax. More than a dozen votes are regarded as firm for the corporate profits tax, with three or four more senators rated as possibilities.

Senators are cool toward the \$492.5 million tax package sent over earlier from the House -- first, because they regard it as inadequate and, second, because it places the bulk of the load on consumers and students. Bill would raise the sales tax three-fourths of one per cent to four percent, like college tuitions and mark up the corporate franchise tax 30 cents per \$1.00.

Earlier, and for the first time, the Senate voted against permitting floor amendments on tax proposals which have not been subject to public hearing.

Here are some of the major tax proposals which have been made to the Senate State Affairs Committee:

- \* A corporate profits tax of 5%, which would produce an estimated \$600 million in two years.
- \* A corporate profits tax boost, to gross about \$39.5 million.
- \* Increase the sales tax to four per cent, to bring in \$279.8 million.
- \* Two cents a gallon gasoline tax increase, to promote \$92 million to the state and \$30 million to cities and counties for highway matters.
- \* A beer tax boost to \$10 a barrel, \$95 million.
- \* A Pipeline tax, \$30 million.

**APPOINTMENTS**

Rep. Menton J. Murray of Hartlingen was named to head the new five-member House general investigation committee.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher Reps. Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth and Phil Gates of Lefors will serve on a committee to select an official Texas State Artist. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes will designate two Senators and Governor Smith will appoint the fifth member.

**AMENDMENT FIGHT LOOMS**

Battle lines are forming for the May 18 constitutional amendments election.

Conservation leaders and Texas AFL-CIO executive board have declared war on Proposition 4, which would create a \$100 million bond fund to assist local governmental units with sewage treatment plant construction.

AFL-CIO also announced opposition to an amendment creating a state commission to set legislators' pay and ethical standards for officials. Support was given to raising the welfare ceiling and the amendment which would allow constitutional changes to be proposed in special sessions as well as regular legislative sessions.

Governor Smith announced appointment of Richard D. Brown, executive director of Texas Municipal League, to head a Committee on Clean Water promoting passage of the water bond amendment which would also raise the maximum interest rate on Texas Water Development Board bonds from four to six per cent.

A committee of 12 will serve as the coordinators of Texas Citizens for Welfare Reform, promoting passage of Amendment 3 to raise the aid ceiling.

### First Aid Course To Be Held In Pampa

A practical course on emergency care and transportation of the sick and injured to be held in the Panhandle area is scheduled April 21, 22, 23, 26, 27, 28, 1971, in the Cabot Auditorium of the Hughes Building, Kingsmill and Somerville streets in Pampa, Texas. Registration will begin April 21, at 6:30 p. m. Sessions will run from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m.

Invited to attend the six-night course of lectures and demonstrations are ambulance attendants, policemen, firemen, safety engineers, rescue squads, nurses, public health officials, civil defense officials and other officials and private citizens interested in emergency care. The course is offered free of charge and is expected to attract attendance from a seventy-five mile area around Pampa. The State Department of Health and the Top O' Texas County Medical Society are co-sponsoring the program.

The death rate from accidental injuries can be reduced by improved training of emergency personnel. A fast ride to the hospital is no substitute for appropriate attention to the victim at the scene of the emergency, according to Dr. J. R. Donaldson, a Pampa physician who is Program Chairman for the training school.

Emergency care personnel must be able to make a quick survey, determine medical priority, and take the necessary life-saving measures. The urgency of this need is expressed all across the country, and physicians and other medical personnel from throughout the state of Texas are giving their time to provide the necessary knowledge to erase the senseless statistics of dead and disabled which appear needlessly each year. Students in this program will learn techniques in resuscitation, cardiac massage, splinting of fractures, and other medical emergencies. Aid to snake and spider bite victims, handling of emotionally disturbed patients, emergency childbirth and traffic control will also be covered.

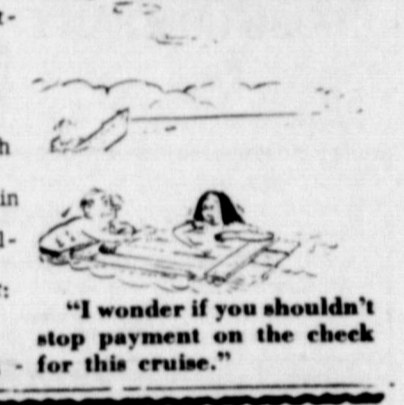

# Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

How many times have you noticed a label on your new mattress, pillow, or sofa cushion that loudly proclaimed "Do Not Remove Upon Penalty of Law"?

The State Health Department would like to see more people begin checking those labels before making their purchases in the stores. Those labels indicate

whether the material used passes both state and federal safety requirements.

The federal government is now moving to strengthen some of those requirements. Analysis by the Department of Commerce has led it to conclude that the existing standard does not adequately protect children against flammable sleepwear.

Research showed that purchased items of children's sleepwear were readily ignited when exposed to a small natural gas flame for as little as three seconds. Such fabrics are capable of producing severe injury, or even death.

Recent federal tests indicate that more than 37% of the blankets now on the market failed to comply with the present flammability standards for wearing apparel.

Standards are also being formulated for mattresses and other bedding materials. At present, there are no such regulations.

The Southwest Research Institute of San Antonio has conducted several experiments in which bed assemblies were ignited by one of several small ignition sources such as cigarette or matches. Measurements showed that hazards to life developed in such fires from toxic fumes, reduced oxygen in the atmosphere, suffocating concentrations of carbon dioxide smoke, and excessive temperatures. Lethal conditions were developed in each experiment, except one which used blankets, sheets and mattresses treated with flame-retarded chemicals.

The burning mattresses were found to be the primary causes of the lethal conditions.

Standards are also being formulated to measure the surface flammability of carpets and rugs. Again, no such standards exist at present.
